Founding member and longtime chairperson Phyllis Olson has officially retired from Gimli's Age Friendly Advisory Committee.

Olson was honoured for her service at a luncheon hosted by the committee in the Evergreen Basic Needs building on Sept. 18.

Olson, Valerie Swanson and Sharon Peichl were charter members in 2005 when the committee was formed in 2005 to provide advice to the RM of Gimli council and also tackle projects to benefit Gimli residents of all ages.

Olson led the committee in 2013 when it presented awards to Gimli businesses chosen by the public for their good service and easy accessibility to residents. From a family of community activists, she worked as community care co-ordinator for the Interlake Regional Health Authority while her husband Al Olson was superintendent of the Evergreen School Division.

"I am really going to miss my community contact," Olson said after receiving a retirement gift from current chair Swanson, who is also manager of the Gimli Senior Resource Council. While Olson has been missed since recently reducing her activity, the Age Friendly Committee has remained busy lobbying for everything from better sidewalks to improved public transportation. Under Swanson's leadership, committee members have also produced a directory of community services and hosted a large reception to honour the community's volunteers. Both these projects are scheduled to be repeated in the next 18 months.

Swanson said Age Friendly is always looking for new members to help the committee with its work. Volunteers will have a major opportunity to join at age friendly's annual meeting which has been scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 20 at 6.30 p.m. at the New Iceland Heritage Museum's Lady of the Lake Theatre. The agenda will include the presentation of an action plan, a guest speaker and refreshments.

Newcomers will join current members of the committee. Along with Swanson is Gimli Coun. Thora Palson, RM representative Brittany Isfeld, Karen Bowman, Jan Keryluk, Jennnifer Campbell, Brenna Philp, Isabel Peterson, Marlene Whitby and Roger Newman.

Fraserwood country singer releases new album

Up-and-coming country and western singer Kevin Peters of Fraserwood has released a second album of his own song compositions.

It's called *Farmers Hall Recording Session* because he recorded it at this Gimli area hall in the spring and introduced it with a live show at the same hall on a recent Saturday.

" It's all original songs about love and break-ups, " says Peters, who shared the album introduction concert bill with Fraserwood's Billy Dudek and Dawn plus Grunthal's Richard Inman.

"I'm a fan of country legend Hank Williams and not a screamer." His latest shows have extended far beyond the Farmers Hall on PR 231 just west of Gimli. He recently toured Saskatchewan and Alberta, giving 10 shows in places like Gravelbourg, Lethbridge, Red Deer and Edmonton.

This added to a resumé that already includes a previous western tour and appearances in Winnipeg bars such as Transcona's Royal George Hotel, St.Boniface's Le Garage Restaurant and downtown Winnipeg's Times Changed Club.

"My next show is coming up on Oct. 12 at Gimli's Ship and Plough pub," says the country singer who also sang at the Gimli Ice Festival in March. He developed a love for music while growing up in a family with eight children in the Interlake village of Okno north of Arborg. He first enjoyed gospel songs at Okno's Mennonite church and then embraced western music as a teenager when he heard it on country station CFRY in Portage La Prairie.

"That station exposed me to all the greats — Williams, Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson and Kris Kristofferson,"

says the western performer who was writing gospel songs and strumming a guitar by the age of eight or nine.

He also has a back-up trade — carpentry — which he learned from his father. That comes in handy to help feed a family that includes his wife Judy and four young children.

"I like carpentry and love music," says the versatile singer.



Lakeshore School Division debuts new website

Lakeshore School Division's website got an upgrade recently to a more current and contemporary design that will give parents, students and staff more relevant information in an easy-to-find way.

The website was redesigned by Lakeshore's technology supervisor Justin Critch, who began working on the project back in December of last year. He said the site was in need of a refresh and figured that he might as well make it more intuitive and relevant while he was at it.

The website is actually two-fold with an outwardfacing version for the general public and an internal site only accessible by teachers and other Lakeshore staff. The aim is to give staff the ability to post to the outward-facing site so the info they feel is most relevant for parents can be seen. Critch said that this way there isn't just one person who can post an event or other content to the website.

"There is an approval process for submissions, but anyone can put stuff up on the site now," said Critch.

"I wanted something that was much simpler in design. If there's too much, it can be confusing, and we don't want people to not be able to find what's important. The nice thing about it is that it's easy to add new things to it if we need."

Critch explained that the outward-facing site went live at the beginning of the school year. He will monitor the traffic and will watch how people use it before jumping in to make changes. One of the new features of the site is how quickly it loads, which has been much improved from the past version.

"I wanted to make sure this was pure program-

ming so that it would be lightning fast," said Critch. Those who have any familiarity with the old site should see a difference in loading speed when accessing the new version.

This version is a work in progress and Critch said that he worked a lot over the summer to polish the site to make it functional.

"I still have a list of a bunch of things to do like the

calendar and events system. But, really, it's a question of how people use the site. It's something that can be adjusted to work however we want it to," said Critch.

All candidates forum for RM of Gimli next Thursday

An all candidates forum for the RM of Gimli will be take place next Thursday, Oct. 4, which will allow election candidates the chance to make their ideas known to Gimli taxpayers before advanced polling stations open.

The event will be hosted by the Gimli Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Club of Gimli and CJ 107 Radio at the Sigurbjorg Stefansson Early School from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

Stephen Bannister, president of the Gimli Chamber of Commerce, explained that the intent of the forum is to better inform the public on where candidates for mayor and council stand on the most important issues for the RM. Bannister said that residents who attend will be able to write questions on cards that will be collected by volunteers and given to moderators Signe Holstein and Jim Mosher to ask of candidates.

"We'll start with the mayors and then we'll proceed to the councillors," said Bannister.

"We'll be running it that was so that everyone will have an opportunity to provide their views on the issues." Those issues will be brought up by those who attend and there is no theme to the event. Questions can be asked about anything, and Bannister hopes that a variety of topics will be discussed so that voters can get a sense of a candidate as a whole. The forum is not an open house and will be moderated so that candidates can speak to the questions without interruption.

Bannister said that attendees will get multiple cards to write questions on and advises people to hold onto a few in case an answer a candidate gives, or another question asked, sparks an idea for a further query.

Advanced polls open a few days after the event on Oct. 13. Bannister hopes that those looking to take part in early voting will come out and hear from their candidates.

"So that's really the intent behind it is that when they go to the polls, they'll be better informed on who to vote for and they'll have a better picture of what each candidate is standing for and what they plan to do if elected," said Bannister.

Surviving a stormy situation

Hi gang.

Come experience with me how a Lowe Farm prairie boy wound up fearing for his life desperately navigating an old canvas-covered, wooden-ribbed canoe in a vicious storm on the Lake of the Woods.

Ernie Reimer was a young, strong, slim guy with short brown hair and an intense nature some 50 years ago as he fished from his canoe off the Clearwater shore. His canoe was well built with high sides dispelling any concern for the wind that was stirring the water up into high, choppy turbulent waves. He had caught one pickerel and as he gazed from the restless water to the heavy clouds darkening the sky his rod dove into a wave out of sight. He tightened the drag on his reel and hauled up.

A huge pickerel on the end of his line tore from the top of a wave peak, twisting wildly, its white belly stark against the dark blue, low clouds. He wasn't anchored, and as he bent over, to unhook his landed fish, the canoe lurched to the left, almost throwing him overboard. Looking up, he could see sheets of rain riding on gale-force winds coming at him. He strung and tossed the fish to the front of the canoe and then grabbed his oars, locking them into the oar locks. He knew he was in trouble. He swung the boat

into the wind as the rain hit seemingly from all directions.

The water began churning. He braced his legs against the sides of the canoe, dug his feet into the edges of the wooden webs and began pushing and pulling with his oars, jockeying his craft like a kayak in the rapids. He ducked his head, squinting trying to see through the now-biting sheets of pounding rain. The water seemed like mountains above him. Walls of water slammed over the side of the craft. He scanned over his shoulders, getting his bearings for a shoreline the wind would take him to. So he worked his oars backward and forward facing the wind, he and his canoe tossing wildly high and low but always falling back shoreward.

In time, Ernie could hear the waves crashing against the banks behind him. A sideways wave hit the boat, slamming Ernie's shoulder into the side of the craft. His arm went numb. He couldn't work the oar. Then another wave hit, turning the canoe over as he felt and heard its side scraping the mud and stones at shore. He crawled, submerged from under the canoe and rising with his back to the wind, and grabbed the canoe with his good arm. He hauled it to solid land on its side. He pushed it over with the bow on high ground, so as he crouched shivering under it for shelter, he could see at the shore's edge his two fish on his string being tossed at him from a cascading wave!

I have always admired business folks who, through sheer drive, make something out of nothing. I was talking to Larry Chesley of Petersfield a while back who has a resort and campground on Netley Creek and learned something new. It seems, years ago, he held gigantic private fishing derbies. He would have hundreds of ice fishing holes drilled then do something I had never heard of before. He would red tag and release some fish before the derby, and if you caught one, you would get \$50 cash. He also had a yellow tagged fish worth \$1,000 if you caught it.

"Our efforts worked out to about \$0.14 per hour then, but that's how we got our operation going," Larry said with a hearty laugh.

Last Tuesday, I met a couple of real fun-loving characters, Wayne and Jim Klimchuk from Stony Mountain, who were just landing their boat off the Red at Breezy Point. After introductions, Wayne told how one day not long ago he was sitting on the bank not far from here and Jim was sitting in the back of their boat they had beached. Wayne caught something that jumped high out of the water.

"Do carp jump in the air like that?" Wayne asked.

"I don't think so," Jim came back.

"Well, it's got be a sturgeon then," Wayne said.

Without warning and for no apparent reason, Jim jumped into the water wet up to his waist and grabbed the beast in a bear hug. The sturgeon didn't like that and Wayne screamed in laughter as he watched Jim getting smacked in the face with its head and in a lower place with its tail. Jim walked it to shore and unhooked it, but as he released it, it gave him one last smack in the face with its tail for good measure.

Conserving land for wetlands more important than ever

Dear Editor,

Ducks Unlimited Canada is pleased with the findings of a recent Insurance Bureau of Canada (IBC) report that identifies a greater need for wetlands and other natural infrastructure as a cost-effective way to limit the expensive damage done by floods and extreme weather.

We hope the report --- combined with recent funding announcements for green infrastructure and initiatives that reduce the potential impacts of natural disaster and the recently passed Sustainable Watersheds Act — will encourage governments, municipalities and conservation groups to pursue new projects together.

In its report, Combatting Canada's Rising Flood Costs: Natural infrastructure is an underutilized option, released on Sept. 18, IBC provides a way to assess the total economic value, benefits and potential for natural infrastructure such as wetlands. It concludes that governments and water managers need to consider these natural alternatives, alongside concrete and steel solutions, for managing water on the landscape.

This new assessment tool will allow governments, municipalities and conservation groups to make a business case for preserving and restoring wetlands.

Further, in new funding under the Canada Infrastructure Program, DUC sees an opportunity to partner with Manitoba municipalities and watershed districts.

We already have successful programs in place. As a conservation leader with more than 80 years of experience, DUC is in a strong position to provide natural solutions that address flooding and extreme weather. In fact, we've worked with landowners to protect and restore wetlands for decades, and we're constantly seeking new partners to continue that work.

Not only do wetlands slow the flow of water and help prevent flooding, they filter nutrients and provide clean water, supply wildlife habitat and store climate-changing carbon.

Wetlands continue to be lost, but we hope the report, recent funding announcements, and the new act will foster the culture of conservation that continues to grow in Manitoba.

Winnipeg Beach CAO brings wealth of experience to her job

Kathy Magnusson has settled in smoothly as chief administrative officer (CAO) for the Town of Winnipeg Beach.

Magnusson was promoted to the town's top administrative job in May after serving four years as the assistant CAO. Previous to that, she worked in the RM of Gimli municipal office for six years.

"I enjoy working in municipal government and wish I had been in it even longer than 10 years," the CAO says." It's an interesting mix of administration and doing things for people through customer service."

She acquired a background in administration while working for the Investors Group and Assante financial services companies for 23 years after growing up in the North End of Winnipeg. She became familiar with Lake Winnipeg at her parents' Dunnottar cottage and she and her husband Brian Magnusson have been permanent Ponemah residents since the mid-1990s.

"I love the lake lifestyle and the

beautiful surroundings," says the chief administrator who is the co-parent of four adult children, two living in Winnipeg and the other two in Saskatchewan.

Brian Magnusson works at Winnipeg Beach's UDO Lumber Sales while she leads the town staff in implementing the beach council's decisions and initiatives. She says the growing town with 1,700 property owners and a 13 per cent increase in growth between 2011 and 2016 — is currently focusing on such priorities as increasing tourism and upgrading infrastructure.

"We'd like to attract more winter events so we would have year-round tourism," Magnusson said "We're hoping for a new 10-12 unit motel in the near future and we're definitely open to even more development."

In the case of infrastructure improvements, she says the town has been concentrating on lagoon improvements and tendering a project to improve Kernsted Road drainage from Highway 9 to the lake.

"Our public works department under foreman Ron Domino — concentrates on the replacement of assets that need improving," said Magnusson.

The town's new council, elected in July, has wasted no time getting down to business. Newcomers Larry Banks and Frank Masi joined council with returnees Mayor Tony Pimentel and councillors Daryl Carry and Pat Green.

"Larry and Frank have brought some great ideas and new perspectives to the table," she says.

Magnusson's only regret is that only a few beach taxpayers turn up to observe open council meetings.

"I believe communication is a twoway street and would like residents to be aware of what's happening in town."

There will be two October meetings at 6 p.m. on the second and fourth Wednesdays.

"I hope more members of the public will attend so they can see the council process and how decisions are made," said Magnusson.

Craving Change workshop and free bootcamp coming to Eriksdale

A free hour-long exercise bootcamp is coming to Eriksdale next month that will also feature a how-to workshop on changing your relationship with food.

Rae said the bootcamp and workshop go hand-in-hand and are a great starting point for those looking to take their health into their own hands and currently her course in Lundar is full of people doing just that.

"Both courses filled up so quickly, so it was very encouraging," said Rae, who added that there is a waiting list to get in for those who aren't already signed up.

"We had no idea what the response would be like. I do offer the bootcamp as a class for my business, but for the free bootcamp here in Lundar, I'd say 75 per cent of the people are newcomers and that's great to see."

Rae said that the class is for people of all ages and fitness levels. She said that when she does a bootcamp, she always shows two different variations of a move so that those who are new are able to complete the action without hurting themselves and those who are familiar with the class can push their abilities with a more difficult variation.

Rae said she hopes to be able to offer the program again once the Eriksdale sessions are complete but is unsure how funding will work. Large kindergarten enrolment encouraging for Winnipeg Beach

Jamie Gilbart is off to a good start in his new role as the of Winnipeg Beach School principal.

Gilbart welcomed a class of 27 kindergarten students in early September, which is a significant increase from the average number of 15 students.

The upward burst gives the school 173 students in classes from junior kindergarten to Grade 8 from the Winnipeg Beach and Dunnottar catchment area.

This is close to the school's enrolment record of 180 students in 1990, a statistic recently recalled by retired Winnipeg Beach principal-teacher Larry Moore. It's good news too for the Evergreen School Division, which has had declining enrolment for more than a decade.

Gilbart started the new school year with the same anticipation as his students.

"I am very excited to become part of the Winnipeg Beach School family," said the new principal who is heading a staff of 20 with the help of vice-principal Alison Lubinski and busier than ever kindergarten

teacher Bev Braga."It's a good sign that more young families are coming into the area."

While Gilbart is new to Winnipeg Beach, he is no stranger to the Interlake. His family owns Gilbart Funeral Homes in Selkirk, Gimli and Winnipeg. This long-established business was started by Ray Gilbart, continued by Wes Gilbart and now employs his brother. But Jamie Gilbart ultimately decided to go in a different direction and was a teacher with physical education credentials in Winnipeg's Seven Oaks School Division before he was chosen for the Winnipeg Beach principal's job.

He will now have a much shorter commute to work from his home north of Gimli.

"I started as a Lake Winnipeg cottager and have lived at Arnes with my wife and three children for the past six years," Gilbart said.

With the larger kindergarten enrolment and a promising 13 students registered in the school's junior kindergarten, he may well whistle on his way to work.

Sandy Hook gears for centennial with unique board

They say that two heads are better than one.

Sandy Hook Community Club has taken that idea a step farther by deciding that four heads are better than two. Four people — made up of two husband and wife teams — serve as president and vice-president in a perhaps unique arrangement at this popular summer club in the south end of the RM of Gimli.

Presidents Joyce and Jim Ericson and vice-presidents Shera and Jim Stroet lead a large board at the busy club on the lakefront on 10th Avenue in Sandy Hook.

"We're like the heads of household for a big club serving 250 families," says president Joyce Ericson while explaining the rationale for having a quartet of leaders.

All the manpower is needed on the executive and board for a club that arguably has the largest program of

any summer cottage community on the shore of Lake Winnipeg. This past summer, for example, the Sandy Hook clubhouse and grounds were the site of multiple events including Canada Day celebrations, a kids' day camp, bingo, weekly movie nights, a paint night, a talent show, a music festival, a field day, a pancake breakfast and a corn roast.

The club remained open as late as mid-September when it hosted the first RM of Gimli council debate for the Oct. 24 election. One debate participant was current RM Coun. Thora Palson who represents Sandy Hook and is regarded by the club as a strong ally.

Most club events, however, are more light-hearted.

"We have a great deal of fun together. We come here as friends and leave as family," says vice-president Jim Stroet of a club membership mostly of cottagers but a minority of permanent

residents like treasurer Erin Good and board member Maureen Eskow.

This summer's full slate of events precede an even busier 2019 when the Sandy Hook club will celebrate its 100th anniversary of its establishment in 1919. There are tales that the 10th Avenue property was owned by the defunct *Winnipeg Tribune* newspaper in the early 1900s, but the names of club founders have faded from memory. Still, this will not detract from an all-out centennial celebration scheduled for the July long weekend next year.

"It will be a homecoming and we would like as many for-

mer Sandy Hookers as possible to return to relive their memories," says a long-time club member.

"There is a real sense of history in Sandy Hook. Some families are fifth generation — their great-grandparents had cottages. This creates a sense of legacy that is unique and special."

Centennial celebrants will come back to see a clubhouse changed considerably since the first club was erected in 1928. Recent renovations include the addition of a shed, improvements to the front wall of the club and work on the floor to be completed this fall. All this has been accomplished with the help an internet GoFundMe page and a grant from Gimli's Westshore Foundation. Members pay no dues except for the cost of an annual club calendar.

"We are a club where people support and help each other," said co-club president Jim Ericson.

Dunnottar plans reconciliation with Indigenous community

The Village of Dunnottar Council is establishing a reconciliation committee to build bridges with the village's Indigenous community.

Council members set up the committee at their September meeting last Wednesday appointing Bruce Smith as the initial chairperson. Smith is a community volunteer who earlier played a key role in the development of Dunnottar's railway station museum in Ponemah.

Mayor Rick Gamble said Dunnottar will reconcile with its Indigenous community by implementing some of the 94 recommendations in a national report prepared by Judge Murray Sinclair.

"We believe this report is important to everybody and we'll bring forward the recommendations applying to our community," said Gamble while noting Dunnottar has a small but distinguished Indigenous population and is also close to former Aboriginal land south of Matlock's Chalet Beach.

The village took the first step towards reconciliation in late August when it named a new Whytewold park in honour of the memory of Linda Park who grew up in Dunnottar and went on to a successful career in banking and helping her Indigenous community. To be named the Linda Park Promenade, the park on the south side of Tugela Creek will be officially dedicated this fall to Park who died at age 58 in 2007.

While that will be a joyous occasion, there was recent sadness due to the death in mid-September of Matlock's Jenny Park, 93, the matriarch of the Park family. She leaves behind a large family, some of whom still live in Dunnottar.

In other business, Dunnottar Council has:

- Learned that changes to the province's Manitoba Education Tax Credit may result in additional costs for some residents. Apparently taxpayers ineligible for the full \$700 credit may have to make up the difference. CAO Janice Thevenot said a fuller explanation will appear in the village's next publication.

- Appointed Coun. Rosalyn Howard to be Dunnottar's board member on the Gimli-based Interlake Women's Resource Centre.
