Family offering \$2,000 reward for missing dog

An Eriksdale family is looking to the public for any info on their golden retriever Maci, who has been missing since July, and are now offering a \$2,000 reward for any info that leads to Maci retuning home.

Kenzie Clarkson, who lives just west of Eriksdale, said her dog Maci went missing on July 7. Her boyfriend had gone for a ride on his ATV during the day and when he returned, Maci was gone. Clarkson's dog wasn't one to wander off, she said, and never left the yard where she had plenty of space to run around. Clarkson believes her dog was stolen as the road they live on leads to a beach and was highly trafficked on that day. Their dog hasn't been seen since and the family, most notably Clarkson's two-and-a-half-year-old son, misses the dog greatly.

"She was very territorial of her yard and never left," said Clarkson.

"It's tough for us not to know where

she is or what happened. She's just gone. She was such a big part of our family and we got her when I was pregnant and when my son was born, they immediately became best friends."

Clarkson said that when they brought their son Brey home from the hospital, Maci immediately started licking him. The instantly loyal dog and Brey were attached at the hip from then on and the loss has been particularly hard on Brey, who still has hope.

"Every time we come home he says 'Maci will be back.' It's hard to go from seeing her every day when you get home to where we are now and we haven't seen her in months."

Clarkson said that she had some leads on the dog over the summer but nothing concrete. Some people have said she was spotted near Lake Manitoba First Nation, but it never panned out.

Maci is a purebred female golden retriever. She doesn't have a collar or tattoo but does have a scar on her belly from an issue the family had when getting her spayed. There is also a small circular scar on her upper lip

and Maci's coat is a much darker red than what is common.

"We hope that people see this and have seen our dog and let us know. The reward is no questions asked. We just want her home," said Clarkson. If you have seen Maci, you can call Kenzie Clarkson at 204-572-5705.

Randy Helgason not running for reeve of West Interlake

After 22 years of service to his community as a former councillor and current reeve, Randy Helgason is walking away from municipal politics to focus on family.

Helgason said that he's had enough

of the political life, and although he doesn't regret his time on the council of the former RM of Siglunes and the current RM of West Interlake, he just knew it was time to move on.

The last four years for Helgason has been the most tumultuous of his career. In 2014, the RM of Eriksdale and Siglunes were officially slated for amalgamation following

the election. The decision by the then NDP government did not sit well with many residents from both communities. To this day, Helgason still doesn't see why it was necessary.

His election win was by the slimmest margin possible with only one vote separating him from the other candidate from Eriksdale, Arne Lindell. Following the election was a slew of long meetings with council to rewrite bylaws and essentially build a new RM from scratch.

"The early days were very tough, no question about it," said Helgason.

"I don't blame anyone for their frustrations because I think we were all frustrated by the situation. But from

Jan. 1, 2015, to where we are today, it's completely different and I think we weathered the storm."

In the first year, council faced pressures from all over most notably, the nowdefunct West Interlake Citizens Group, which worked hard to try and dissolve the amalgamation and one point had the full support of

council, although it ultimately failed. Now, Helgason said it's business as usual in meetings, and while there are still some who are unhappy, it feels more like a functional RM than it did four years ago.

Helgason is walking away with a few things left unfinished that he wanted to see completed before he left. Chief among them is the DFA money for the boundary line drain project.

"We've been trying to appeal that for years and have heard nothing from the province on that. I wanted to see it done and not have to pass that off to the next council. It's \$800,000 that Ward 2 is responsible for," said Helgason.

The soon-to-be former reeve is walking away after a year of health issues and after over two decades of service to his community. He said he enjoyed his time and he loves the work, but at some point, he just felt it was time to move on. He plans to spend more time with family and his horses and do some commercial fishing.

He said that he hasn't thought about what it would be like to not be a part of the process after pulling the strings for so long.

"I think it will probably be a little weird. When the deadline passed, I thought I would be sorry that I didn't put papers in, but I don't regret it. It's the right choice for me."

Helgason said that if he has any advice for whoever the new council is, it is that they should come in with an open mind, a willingness to work together and to work for the community as a whole. The days of the RMs of Eriksdale and Siglunes are over and the work done by council needs to benefit

all of West Interlake as a whole.

"The best avenue is to listen and take in as much info as you can to make informed choices. This is our municipality and it's up to them to do what's right," said Helgason.

Province invests nearly \$10 million to upgrade health facilities

Much-needed investments will benefit patients across the province

The Manitoba government will upgrade health-care facilities across the province by investing approximately \$9.7 million in 13 new projects, Health, Seniors and Active Living Minister Cameron Friesen announced earlier this week.

"Proper building maintenance and upgrades are needed to make sure the facilities remain in good repair, are safe for patients, staff and visitors, and continue to ensure the provision of quality care," said Friesen. "These much-needed investments will benefit patients across the province."

The minister noted several of the projects include work to improve fire safety and sprinkler systems in personal care homes and health-care facilities, as well as upgrades to emergency medical service (ambulance) facilities.

The projects include:

the second phase of a sprinkler installation project at E.M. Crowe

Hospital and Personal Care Home in Eriksdale;

- a new fire alarm system for Rosewood Lodge in Stonewall;
- a new fire alarm system for Arborg and District Health Centre;
- a new, two-bay emergency medical services facility in Easterville;
- asbestos removal in the kitchen area at The Pas Health Complex, as well as upgrades to humidity control in the operating room;
- a hot water system replacement at Winnipegosis Health Centre;
- a fire stop and fire separation installation at Children's Hospital in Winnipeg;
- the second phase of a sprinkler installation project at Victoria General Hospital in Winnipeg;
- a new oper-

ating room air-handling unit and dehumidification control installation at Winnipeg's St. Boniface General Hospital;

- a new air conditioner at Actionmarguerite St. Joseph in Winnipeg;
- the upgrading of suicide prevention equipment at the PsycHealth Centre and Addictions Unit at Health Sciences Centre Winnipeg.

Each year, the regional health authorities, CancerCare Manitoba, Shared Health and the Addictions Foundation of Manitoba submit requests for safety and security projects at sites across the province. Timely equipment replacements, upgrades and repairs ensure services continue

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Work will begin once the projects are publicly tendered and awarded, the minister noted.

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Newspapers matter, now more than ever

Oct. 1 marks the start of National Newspaper Week and the launch of a new campaign to rally Canadians' support for newspaper journalism — and the in-depth, credible, independent reporting that newspapers provide. The campaign, dubbed #NowMoreThanEver, is inviting Canadians to show their support for the news media industry at the newly launched newspapersmatter.ca.

"Every day, newspapers work to bring Canadians from coast to coast to coast real, trusted, truthful news which is as vital to democracy as clean air, safe streets, good schools and public health. The role of newspapers has never been so crucial," said Bob Cox, chair of the board of directors of News Media Canada, the national association that represents Canadian newspapers.

"Every day, newspapers work to bring Canadians from coast to coast to coast real, trusted, truthful news —

which is as vital to democracy as clean air, safe streets, good schools and public health."

Recent research conducted last year found that 63 per cent of Canadians were unable to distinguish between legitimate news websites and fake news stories, and 65 per cent of Canadians are worried that false information or fake news is being used as a weapon.

Access to truthful news is under threat. For years, the credible, independent news reporting that newspapers provide has been funded by local and national advertiser support. But as readership moved online, Canadian brands and companies moved their advertising dollars to global conglomerates: 70 per cent of Canada's online ad revenue goes to Facebook and Google — despite the fact that ads in either digital or print newspapers are the most trusted of all ad

"Newspapers do not have a readership problem," explains Cox, who points to recent research that shows that eight in 10 Canadians — and 85 per cent of millennials — still read a newspaper every week.

This National Newspaper Week, Canadians are asked to simply sign a pledge of support at newspapersmatter.ca and send a message — to Canadian businesses, advertisers, to all levels of government, to newspaper journalists and all Canadians — that newspapers matter, now more than ever. The campaign includes print and digital ads running in newspapers across the country and is extending into social media, with a call-toaction that invites newspaper readers to share a photo of themselves with their favourite paper on their social channels — using #NewspapersMatter and #NowMoreThanEver.

National Newspaper Week in Canada runs from Oct. 1 to Oct. 7, 2018.

Manitoba cottage owners punished by double taxation

Thousands of Manitoba cottage owners are being placed in financial jeopardy due to double taxation, says the Manitoba Association of Cottage Owners (MACO).

"Disturbingly, Manitoba is the only province or territory to still levy two education property taxes," says MACO president Dave Crabb. "All Canadian provinces, except Manitoba, have moved to a full provincial school funding model. Our members are telling us this double levy is causing great financial stress. Moving forward, many cottage owners will be forced to sell their property. Future generations

will find it very difficult to handle the mounting costs.

"It's well documented that Manitoba's cottage industry has a financial spinoff of millions of dollars yearly. As cottage owners are forced out, this will undoubtedly have a financial impact on neighbouring communities and their business community."

Disturbingly, Manitoba has the highest education property taxes of all Canadian provinces and territories. A recent Fraser Institute report tracked the Canadian Consumer Tax Index between last year (2017) and 1961. The report stated that the cost of all taxes had increased by 2,112 per cent over

that time frame.

Shockingly, the average Canadian family now spends 43.1 per cent of its income on taxes.

"Double taxation is a major concern for membership," said Crabb. "It's punitive by its very nature. Even more disturbing is that cottage owners are expected to pay their school tax in their respective municipality but are not allowed to send their children to schools in the area, or vote for school trustees. This is taxation without representation."

MACO represents more than 3,600

Some guys have all the luck

Welcome, fellow fishers.

Some guys are pretty lucky. Not all of us have a job where you can move around southern Manitoba working as an electronics technician and if you're close to a fishing spot you just break out your gear and drop a line in while chomping on a noon-hour

Nathan Morgan is kind of a lucky man. I met him mid-day on the Hnausa pier sitting in his van, his rod sticking out his driver's window as he was finishing eating. We began shouting at each other through open windows as he reeled in his line. He said it was time for him to get along but when he realized I wrote a fishing column he took a few minutes to share a picture of one of his catches here. He lives with his wife in Woodlands northwest of Stonewall and loves to fish. He asked me where the big pickerel were and I told him the commercial boys at Balsam Bay and Gimli that I talked to say they're coming down from the north a little sooner than usual because the water is so low it's cooling off faster. That brightened his day.

Down along the rocky shoreline on the downside of the Powerview Dam on the Winnipeg River last Saturday, a bunch of us watched shaking our heads in disbelief as two guys, one in a bathtub-sized dingy and the other in the turbulent water wearing hip waders were net fishing.

"Doesn't that guy know if he goes under by those whirlpools, the waders

will fill up and keep him down?" a guy behind me wondered out loud. Just as he said it, it happened. We all held our breath until we saw him pop up and hang onto the side of the dingy as the guy in the "tub" poled to shore. Wow.

I left the gang muttering amongst themselves and walking north along the shore saw a chap laying on a big flat rock his rod stuck in a crack beside him. I went up to him to strike up a conversation. He rolled his lanky body my way, revealing a prominent chin, nose and forehead framed by dark black, straight hair.

"How's the fishing?" I asked. He smiled, hesitating, and then in broken English said, "Good, maybe," as he pointed to two small pickerel on a string in the water.

One could see he wanted desperately to talk to me but trying to speak in nervous haste only served to make it harder for him.

I tried to put him at ease, asking, "Did you fish when you were a kid?"

He beamed, smiling, nodding his head up and down vigorously. "Yeah, in Latvia, we had nothing for fishing so we catch fish with hands."

He struggled, trying to express himself. He went on describing how when he was about 10, there was no money for fishing gear so he and his friends devised a way to catch fish in the local marshfields along the edge of a creek. They would tramp the marsh weeds down in a circle roughly the area of a car and then fan out from it still in a circular formation. They would then turn toward the stomped circle and splash with their feet and hands disturbing the ankle-deep water, scaring the fish to the centre.

Reaching the flattened weeds, they would sit down in the water, spread their legs wide and, "walking on their butts," move to the centre catching the corralled fish by hand and throwing them up onto the creek bank. I asked him for his name but he frantically shook his hands in refusal so we'll just have to nickname him "Bert" as we have others in the past.

By Selkirk, on the Red River bank where the 509 and the 204 meet, I saw a fellow standing obviously waiting for someone last Thursday. I drove down the steep road and as I came up to him rolled down my window, asking,"Are you going fishing?"

"Yeah, I'm waiting for my buddy," responded a slim, brown-haired guy with a touch of grey in his day-old face stubble. I got out of the car and offered my card as our new friend said,"I'm Dean Senek from just across the river."

"You've fished this river all your life?" I asked.

"Yep," he said. We looked out across the river, the cold swirling wind scared up little wave patches. "I and my friends used to fish off the Red banks by Calder and Craig Road every afternoon till dark," he reflected.

"Many was the time our parents came looking for us and gave us 'what

for' as they chased us home. That was until we started catching fish. Then staying out till dark was OK, including Uncle Dave who loved to smoke the Goldeye we caught. Sometimes we would come in cold and tired with a few fish and he would say, 'Is that all? why didn't you stay out longer?""

See you next week, friends. Bye now.

According to the most recent enrolment report from the province, Evergreen is among 14 other school divisions who experienced a decline in student enrolments, with a 0.8% decrease in 2017 (12 students), 0.1% decrease in 2016 (2 students), 3.0% decrease in 2015 (45 students), and 3.0% decrease in 2014 (46 students). That equates to a loss of 105 students over the past 4 years, with an enrolment of 1443 students ending in 2017.

Lower enrolments also mean less funding, thus creating greater challenges in providing quality programs and services to students.

Debt is clearly an issue, and though the financial position is not quite as dire as some believe, it isn't good, either. I'm not going to criticize what's been done in the past; it's seldom helpful. 

Lundar RCMP stop speeder and seize cash and drugs

On September 20, 2018, Lundar RCMP were conducting speed enforcement on Highway 6 near Deer Horn Line when they stopped a northbound vehicle going 132 km/h in a 100 km/h zone.

The RCMP officer could smell marihuana from inside the vehicle and when asked about it, the driver produced a burnt marihuana joint. The male was arrested for possession of a controlled substance under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. A subsequent search of the driver and the vehicle turned up a large amount of Canadian currency sealed in a plastic bag and just over 2000 grams of vacuumed sealed marihuana.



54-year-old Anthony Ross of The Pas was charged with possession for the purpose of trafficking under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act as well as for speeding and driving while disqualified under the Highway Traffic Act.

Anthony Ross is to appear in court on November 15, 2018 in Lundar Manitoba. Investigation is ongoing.

"She had so many friends at our school and she was loved by everyone. Everyone has beautiful memories of Nicolina."

Students helped McDevitt create a "wall of love" to cherish the moments they spent with Nicolina. It contains heartfelt messages and photos of the youngster with her friends and teachers. One student wrote, "I miss you, Nicky. I wish you didn't have to go." The school also had a plaque made in her honour. And Nicolina's classmates carried banners with her photos and name as they walked along the beachside boardwalk.

Nicolina is remembered through a wall of love.

Phyllis Webstad had her new orange shirt stripped from her at a British Columbia residential school in 1973.

Its theme, Every Child Matter, is something Winnipeg Beach School takes to heart, said Gilbart.

"It's meant to continue the communication about residential schools and bring about reconciliation among everyone," he said. "This date was chosen because it's the time of year when children were taken from their homes to residential school."

Algae and sewage inundate Grindstone on Lake Winnipeg

Lake Winnipeg commercial fishers say they're being inundated with algae and sewage near Grindstone, between the lake's north and south basins, and it's like nothing they've ever seen before.

They're pointing the finger at the City of Winnipeg for its dozens of annual raw sewage dumps into the Red River, which flows north into the lake, bringing with it millions of litres of human excrement, commercial and industrial waste, pharmaceuticals, debris such as tampons and sanitary napkins and whatever else people flush down their toilets.

The city's 79 antiquated combined sewers, which collect both rain and snow runoff and sewage, overflow either during power failures or rainfall events. It occurs about 22 times a year on average.

Robert T. Kristjanson, 84, who fishes close to shore near Grindstone says he's been sidelined a number of times this month by algae and other material that comes and goes depending on wave action and currents.

"I went to lift my nets and I couldn't even get them up there was so much algae in them," he said mid-September, a few weeks after the fall commercial fishing season opened on Lake Winnipeg. "And yesterday I had to pull 'er up. I was so fit be tied, I didn't know what to do with myself."

A week later, Kristjanson said he went out very early in the morning to try to set his nets but had to turn back to shore because the algae and whatever else was in the water was "as thick as soup." His grandson, who also fishes in the area, couldn't get his nets in the water either.

Kristjanson, who's been fishing since he was eight and earned the Order of Manitoba this July for raising awareness about algae on Lake Winnipeg, said fishers are living in a sewer with "no right to say anything."

Phosphorus in wastewater contributes to the growth of algae. The adage "the solution to pollution is dilution" has failed as far as Lake Winnipeg is concerned. It has experienced toxic algal blooms that can kill fish and poison humans and animals.

In 2017, the provincial department of Sustainable Development made matters worse for the lake by giving the city 27 years to fix its combined sewers, and it also extended the city's 2014 phosphorus-reduction deadline (which it didn't meet) to 2019. The city's North End wastewater treatment plant is the fourth largest phosphorus polluter of all treatment plants

in Canada.

"I don't care if it's expensive to fix it," said Kristjanson, referring to the city's oft-repeated claims. "Let's take a load of this stuff and dump it on Winnipeg, down Main Street, and see how they like it because that's exactly what they're doing to us.

"The water from Winnipeg runs thousands of miles right up to the ocean, and there are people all along the line using the lake. What are we going to do, walk around with masks over our faces? Is that the next thing we'll have to do?"

A lack of rain this summer and extraordinary low lake levels have compounded the pollution, according to Bill Buckels, who fishes in the middle of the lake near Grindstone. In addition to algae, he said he's pulled up moss and what looks like fecal matter in his nets.

"It's like a frigging sewage lagoon out here," he said. "All summer long sewage has been flowing into Lake Winnipeg from the city and other points. There hasn't been much rain this summer so all that flowed was sewage. And we ended up with concentrated sewage — human shit."

Rural areas, he said, also contribute to pollutants flowing into the lake. Drainage ditches in some municipalities have no wetlands — which act as a buffer for nutrients — where they empty into the lake. That's like a "sewer pipe" straight to the lake. The RM of Gimli sent raw sewage into the lake this summer when a utility company punctured a line in town.

Comparing it to one of those massive piles of garbage in the ocean, Buckels said the algae and the "crap" just swirls around, disappearing for a while then coming back.

"When the wind is blowing hard, the nets will clear and we'll get a little bit of fish," he said. "Then they'll fill up with algae again and we won't get any fish"

Keeping his gloves and equipment clean is impossible and his sinuses have been affected by the potentially hazardous matter, he said. Besides ongoing damage to the environment, he's concerned about the impact on his finances.

"I dropped from 30 boxes of fish to two boxes as a result of being hit on that one day. Who's going to pay for my loss? That's a \$3,000 loss for one day. I still have [helpers'] wages to pay and everything else," said Buckels. "This is phenomenal. Somebody needs to pay for this."

He said he alerted a fisheries biologist at Sustainable Development

about the inundation but hasn't yet received a response from the department. Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium scientists have gone out on the Namao to take samples in the area. The *Express* contacted the LWRC but did not hear back by press time.

Buckels said he's considering filing a claim against the city, province and federal government for failing to adhere to water management standards.

The city has to stop turning a blind eye to what it's doing to the commercial fishing industry, thousands of seasonal residents (many of whom live in Winnipeg) and tourists who want to enjoy Lake Winnipeg, said Kristjanson.

"These people [the city] have to be accountable for what they're dumping in the sewer and the water," he said. "We're not dealing here, on Lake Winnipeg, with a Third World coun-

trv."

Winnipeg mayoral candidate Jenny Motkaluk said she has combined sewers on her radar and vows to reduce sewage dumps that result from power outages.

"I believe that we need to stop putting raw sewage in our rivers so we can stop polluting our great lakes," said Motkaluk last weekend. "That's why I committed to putting back-up generators at our sewage outlets to stop the ridiculous practice of letting raw sewage flow when we have power outages. Once elected I will consult with our senior partners to see how quickly we can get this vital project done."

Winnipeg Mayor Brian Bowman did not respond to the *Express'* request for comment on the issue.

Student's cancer recovery celebrated at Terry Fox event

This year's Terry Fox Run event had special meaning for the students at Gimli's George Johnson Middle School (GJMS).

The students gathered in the school gym Thursday morning to celebrate the recovery of one of their own who is cancer-free after a two-and-a-half year battle with a virulent form of the disease called Non Hodgkin's Lymphoma.

Grade 6 student Bryce Helstrom and his mother Heidi Helstrom were front and centre at a ceremony where Bryce was honoured for overcoming Non Hodgkin's Lymphoma, a cancer that starts in the blood cells, enters the lymph nodes and attacks the immune system. They brought the inspiring message that recovery from a dreaded disease is possible.

"The problem started in February 2016 when Bryce was nine and initially treated for a cold and fever at Gimli hospital," Heidi Helstrom said in an interview prior to the student assem-

"When that didn't clear up, he was taken to Winnipeg Children's Hospital and diagnosed with this aggressive form of lymphoma. The first nine months were the worst as Bryce had to cope with surgeries, chemotherapy and treatments for numerous infections."

Their son's illness took a toll on the Helstrom family which consists of mom Heidi, dad Garth and their other children Cade and Vilena. They live on a horse farm on PR 229 west of Win-

nipeg Beach while Garth travels every day to his job at Gimli's Diageo distillery.

"There was no reason why Bryce got this form cancer at such a young age — it was just bad luck," said Heidi Holstrom philosophically.

Mother and son showed a film about Terry Fox's struggles during his run at an assembly organized by physical education teacher Justin Charrier. Also taking part were Bryce's classroom teacher Pam Einarson and GJMS principal Jim Gibbs.

"My class felt proud and respect for Bryce today," said Einarson after the ceremony. "They learned that cancer can be beaten if you are strong and have a positive attitude when things are down. That needs to be your focus and it's our class motto this year."

Jim Gibbs echoed his teacher's sentiments. "Bryce is a living example of





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Stay alert: fire safety is in your hands

Makes 15 servings

- 1 fresh turkey, about 15 pounds, preferably free-range
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 quart apple cider
- 2 teaspoons dried poultry seasoning Coarse sea salt and freshly ground

black pepper

Remove the giblets from the turkey and discard (or save for another use). Rinse the turkey inside and out and pat dry with paper towels. Rub it all over with salt and pepper. Refrigerate, uncovered, for at least 12 hours and up to 24 hours. During that time, the surface of the turkey will become visibly dry and the skin will tighten; this encourages a nice crisp skin on the finished bird.

Remove the turkey from the refrigerator 1 hour before you plan to start roasting. Preheat the oven to 450 F.

Put the turkey on a rack set in a large, flameproof roasting pan. Drizzle the oil over the top.

Roast for 1 hour. Reduce the oven temperature to 175 F. Pour the cider into the roasting pan and sprinkle the poultry

seasoning in the liquid. Continue roasting until an instant-read thermometer inserted into the thickest part of a thigh (but not touching bone) registers to 170

Transfer the turkey to a carving board, tent loosely with aluminum foil, and let rest for about 15 minutes (see tip). Meanwhile, skim the fat from the surface of the liquid in the pan. Put the roasting pan over two burners and bring the pan drippings to a boil over high heat. Cook until the juices reduce and thicken slightly, enough to coat a spoon, about 10 minutes. Taste for seasoning. Carve the turkey and serve with cider pan juices.

Resting tip: Slow-roasted meats need far less resting time (pretty much none) than those that are traditionally roasted. The reason for resting meat that has been roasted at a high temperature is to allow juices that have collected in the cooler center time to migrate back into the dryer (hotter) exterior sections after it comes out of the oven. Because slow-roasted meats are cooked evenly and a temperature that keeps most of the juices in place, a resting period is largely unnecessary. A brief resting time does allow the meat to become a little firmer as it cools, making it easier to

Herb-Roasted Garnet Sweet Potatoes

- 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 teaspoon fresh thyme leaves, minced
- 1 teaspoon minced fresh sage
- 1 teaspoon minced fresh oregano
- 3 medium garnet sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into 1/4-inch dice

Kosher salt

1. Preheat the oven to 375 F. Spray a large roasting pan with nonstick cooking spray. In a large bowl, thoroughly

combine the olive oil and herbs. Add the sweet potato dice to the mixture, and use your fingers to coat them well. Season with salt to taste.

2. Transfer the mixture to the prepared roasting pan. Bake for 45 to 60 minutes, until your desired consistency is reached, whether you want them a bit firm or fork-tender.

Edible Tip: A good alternate variety to Garnets are Red Jewels, which are easy to come by at both farmers' markets and local grocers. Look for a deep, bright color, and be sure to cook them fairly quickly after purchase. Unlike potatoes, sweet potatoes do not store very well.

If nothing else, recent events should have us all doing serious soul-searching about the ways in which we allow, tolerate, condone or contribute to violence in our own lives.

Without a reverence for life, without an appreciation of transitory nature of life, without an understanding that no one can

"own" the Earth, without a recognition that greed and power are ultimately destructive to even the "winners", we are doomed to continue to play out again and again one version or another of "war" against our fellow humans. It is time for our species to grow up. Bullying is no more acceptable globally than it is on the playground. How different might it be if people all over the planet were televised begging their leaders to stop the violence, rather than dancing in delight at the carnage across the ocean or urging their leader to "nuke 'em all". We can no longer merely sit in front of our television sets shaking our heads, or quietly meditate for world peace. It is time to let the voice of peace be heard loudly and clearly.

Amidst the din of war talk and rising tension, we must create a ceaseless mantra urging leaders to take a stand on non-violent resolution. There are enough of us who carry wisdom and insight to impact global consciousness. Leaders are not only those who are elected to office. Step forward in your family, workplace, community, and speak your truth. Contact your elected officials and speak your truth. Talk to young people and teach your truth. We cannot be like the quiet ones on the playground who watch with horror as the bullies bludgeon one another, and then retreat to a safe place whispering to one another about how horrible it all is. The message of recent events is loud and clear. We got it. We have spoken out about harm to the ecosystem. We have spoken out about protection of endangered species. More than ever now, we are the endangered. And only we can save us.

Pumpkin Cheesecake with Gingersnap Crust

Serves 8 to 10

11/2 cups gingersnap cookie crumbs 1/2 cup finely chopped hazelnuts 6 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted

Filling

11/2 pounds cream cheese, at room temperature

1/2 cup packed light brown sugar 1/4 cup granulated sugar

2 large eggs

2 large egg yolks

11/2 tablespoons all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice

1 cup solid-pack pumpkin purée (not pumpkin pie mix)

1/2 cup créme fraîche, homemade (see below) or store-bought, or sour cream

2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract 1. Preheat the oven to 350 F. Lightly butter an 8- or 81/2-inch springform pan.

2. To make the crust: Stir together all of the ingredients in a medium bowl until the crumbs are moistened. Press the mixture over the bottom and up the sides of the pan. Bake the crust for 10 minutes. Let cool completely on a wire rack. Increase the oven temperature to 425 F.

3. To make the filling: With an electric mixer on medium speed, beat the cream cheese, brown sugar and granulated sugar in a large deep bowl until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs and then the egg yolks

one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add the flour and pumpkin pie spice and beat on low speed until just combined. Add the pumpkin purée, créme fraîche and vanilla, and beat until just combined. Pour the filling into the shell.

4. Place the cheesecake on a baking sheet and bake for 15 minutes. Reduce the oven temperature to 250 F and continue baking for 1 hour.

5. Turn the oven off and let the cheesecake cool in the oven for 21/2 hours. Then transfer to a wire rack and let cool to room temperature. Refrigerate, tightly covered, for at least 10 hours, until thoroughly chilled and set, or for up to 2 days.

6. To serve, run a knife around the side of the cheesecake and remove the side of the pan. Serve slightly chilled or at room temperature, cut into thin wedges with a sharp knife dipped into hot water and wiped dry after each cut.

Ćréme Fraîche

Makes about 1/2 cup

cup heavy whipping cream

cup créme fraîche or sour cream with live cultures

Pour the cream into a glass jar with a tight-fitting lid and spoon in the créme fraîche. Let sit on the counter, with the lid slightly ajar, until the mixture thickens, from 4 to 24 hours, depending on the weather. Refrigerate, tightly covered, until ready to use.

Independent advisor to review acquisition of flood-fighting equipment and security services

The Manitoba government has appointed Umendra Mital, M.A.Sc., P.Eng., as an independent advisor to review the acquisition of flood-fighting equipment and security services, Infrastructure Minister Ron Schuler announced today.

"As an independent advisor, Mr. Mital will help our government, and Manitobans, develop a good understanding of the issues and actions taken since 2008 by the Manitoba government to fight floods and how our government can learn from them," Schuler said. "The results of this review will help us determine what actions should be taken to better protect

Manitobans in the case of natural disasters."

The work of the independent advisor will include conducting an independent audit and review of government decisions and processes used for the acquisition and deployment of both flood-fighting infrastructure and equipment, as well as security services for events in fiscal years 2008-2009, 2010-2011, and 2014-2015. Based on these findings, Mital will advance recommendations for improving floodfighting equipment procurement and deployment, as well as applicable policies and procedures. These recommendations will be used by the government to develop best practices in these areas, the minister noted.

In providing advice to the minister and government, Mital will:

- ensure value for money for the expenditures incurred for flood-fighting equipment and security services,
- determine the effectiveness and fit of the equipment and services acquired to respond to flood events in the target years, and
- provide independent advice as to whether the findings warrant additional investigation by other authori-

Mital has an extensive history in the fields of government and engineering, and is a registered professional engineer with a masters of applied science

in mechanical engineering. Mital first served as director of engineering and construction, later appointed assistant deputy minister, and finally appointed as deputy minister in the former Department of Natural Resources for the government of Manitoba. Mital has also served as the city manager of the City of Surrey, B.C., and presently serves as executive vice-president and general manager of Ebco Industries and Advanced Cyclotron Systems Inc.

The work of the independent advisor will be supported by independent auditors and subject matter experts, both within and outside of Manitoba, the minister added.

Fisher Branch hosting new breakfast snack program for students

Fisher Branch Collegiate started their breakfast snack program this week at the school to ensure students won't be hungry in early morning classes and they can be alert, effective learners.

FBC principal Angela Magon explained that the program is funded through the Child Nutrition Council of Manitoba to the tune of \$3,700 for the year. The breakdown leaves about \$20 a day for students to have a light snack to begin the day of fruit, veggies or something like granola. It's not meant to be a full meal but more of a grab-and-go where students can have something in their stomachs when they begin classes.

The program will be offered five days a week and it will be available at no charge to students or parents. Magon said that students who are hungry are far less effective learners in the classroom and that the aim of the program is to eliminate morning hunger.

"Some of these kids are on the bus for an hour before they get to school," said Magon.

"So, they're having to get up really early and sometimes have to choose

between shower and food and sometimes the shower wins. And so they're arriving hungry. And for a wide variety of reasons, we have students arriving hungry."

How many students arrive hungry isn't quantifiable, but it is happening, Magon said. She explained that the student body is made up of a wide variety of different socio-economic backgrounds which can create a variety of different reasons why a student would arrive hungry. For adults, not eating breakfast is a choice and something we do of our own volition. But for young students or even ones in their late teens, the choice isn't always theirs.

The program began Oct. 1 and Magon said she will look to student feedback to see how and if the programs should change or evolve over the course of the school year. The program wouldn't exist without funding, and Magon isn't sure how funding will work next year and so she is already approaching parents and businesses around the community to make arrangements.

"I have put the notion out there that we would welcome donations in the

form of baking or food snacks because that will broaden what we can offer students. We have a new Home Ec teacher this year and I've put the bug in her ear that her classes could provide some baking to supplement

as well."

Magon said she believes this program will go a long way in helping students who arrive to school hungry.

The Interlake-Eastern Region Health Authority (IERHA) wants to transform health care across the region by providing better care at a sustainable cost.

Nearly 100 community and area members attended the IERHA's annual general meeting on Monday evening at the Selkirk Rec Complex. This year's annual report details the inefficiencies of the current system, and how health care is moving away from its focus on hospitals.

Ron Van Denakker, IERHA CEO, says health providers work very hard across the region, but the system is too inefficient.

"Every day, our teams of staff deliver excellent health services, despite working in a system that doesn't make it easy for us. Our key challenges are to address our aging demographic, and to provide more Indigenousbased care,"Van Denakker said. "Fifty per cent of hospital beds are filled with people waiting for personal care homes.

"That's why many of these changes are necessary."

Van Denakker said the region faces a number of other issues, including encouraging health care providers to practice in the region. The IERHA have worked to fund new personal care home beds, as well as establishing a medical student residency program, which will help encourage physicians to stay in the Interlake.

The IERHA has also aimed to balance its budget, bringing it in line with the province's efforts to curb ballooning health care budgets. But there might be some larger changes to health care in the region.

Dr. Brock Wright, CEO of Shared Health Services Manitoba, said future health care will focus less on hospitals and more on having easy access points to care.

"The world is changing. In the past, it was all about 'get to your nearest emergency department.' The issues now is more 'call 911, and get access to emergency medical services," Wright said. "Increasingly, the people who come get you are more highly trained than in the past. They can start treating you there, and they can treat you as you drive.

"In some cases, you might not need to go to your nearest hospital, they might drive you further to get you to a facility that has the right equipment for your problem."

Van Denakker said they will be accepting their first intake of new student doctors in July 2019. They're

also establishing "My Health Teams," where multiple professionals work together to look after one individual's healthcare needs. They will also be opening a Rapid Access Addiction Medical Clinic (RAAM) in Selkirk, which will assist people with substance abuse.

The province is also hiring 60 new paramedics, 26 of which are coming to the Interlake region.

Theatre Projects Manitoba launches four-week tour in the Interlake

A new tour through the Interlake from Theatre Projects Manitoba begins next week in Steep Rock before travelling through the region with stops in Eriksdale, Lundar, Arborg, Riverton, Teulon, Gunton, Stonewall and Winnipeg Beach.

The tour comprises a massive organizational effort and new focus for Theatre Projects Manitoba who have focused heavily on rural Manitoba this year.

Associate artistic director Andraea Sartison explained that the organization had a vision about getting out of the city limits and collaborating with artists who live rurally. That vision will take them through the Interlake this year with stops in over a dozen communities and schools along the

way. The tour will come to the Steep Rock area first from Oct. 9 to 14, Eriksdale from Oct. 16 to 21, then Arborg from Oct. 23 to 28 and finally Teulon from Oct. 30 to Nov. 4.

Sartison said that the push to engage in rural Manitoba is very exciting and that as they come into the final few weeks of preparation they're looking forward to making connections with Interlake artists.

"We chose the Interlake because there are so many connections and there is such an interesting history," said Sartison.

"We spent a lot of time in the Interlake since we started work on the project with many trips back and forth. What we've been asking each community is what is going on and what isn't going on. But most important, what do they want to see."

Theatre Projects Manitoba will also be spending time bringing programming, at no cost, to schools all over the Interlake. Sartison explained that every day they will be in a different school. The arts tour will take the form of many different activities including workshops that involve songwriting, story telling, craft shows and live theatre performances.


Artists who are spending a week in each community will also be living with host families in that community as well. This, Sartison said, will allow them to be more connected to the community they're in and thus create a stronger bond.

"We wanted to avoid what would often happen where you do the show and go to the bar for a few drinks and then back to the hotel room. By living in people's homes, it will be a great way to get to know people. Steep Rock, our first community, for instance, has some amazing people and they are a really strong community," said Sarti-

Every single event is open to the public and is entirely free to take part in. Sartison said she is looking forward to hearing feedback from the community and the artists and is hoping the Interlake shows up to take part in these exciting arts events.





Thunder tame Tigers

The Interlake Thunder keeps on making some serious noise in the Rural Manitoba Football League.

Interlake improved its record to 4-0 after a convincing 40-16 win over the Neepawa Tigers last Friday at Stonewall Collegiate.

"It was a good effort and we got out early," said Rams' head coach Mitch Obach. "It was 26-0 at halftime and then we kept going. It was a good game and it was a short week. It was only a five-day week."

That strong Thunder running game showed up again against Neepawa.

Colton Nedotiafko rushed 15 times for 172 yards and two majors while Graeme Perrie carried the ball 12 times for 121 yards and a major.

Interlake had a third running back, Tyson Wyryha, go over 100 yards as he finished with 109 yards on 11 runs.

Defensively, Colton Meisner led the Thunder with seven tackles, two quarterback sacks, and an interception.

Aiden McLean also had a sack while Tanner McCallen and Austin L'Heureux each had interceptions.


