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Dreams Take Flight brings local teen to Disney World

Giving children with challenges an adventure to remember

Dreams Take Flight soared from Winnipeg to Orlando with 108 youth for a magical day at Disney World last month.

The Dreams Take Flight program, a non-profit organization, provides a trip-of-a-lifetime experience to disadvantaged children from a variety of backgrounds.

Thanks to the numerous Air Canada employee volunteers, support of the Air Canada Foundation and the work by the Dreams Take Flight organization, eight flights operate annually, providing over 1,000 children each year with an unforgettable day at a theme park in Florida or California.

"The Air Canada flight crew were so in-tune with ramping up the dynamic of this experience. They really reach high to find ways of making this more than just a plane ride to Disney World," said Brett Mitchell, official photographer for the day, and co-owner of Big and Colourful Printing and Publishing

The flight from Winnipeg left at 3 a.m. and transported the youth to Or-



lando, accompanied by a crew of current and retired Air Canada employee volunteers focused on creating the most magical experience possible.

"Even before we were on the plane, the pilots were letting the kids wear their captain hats, posing with them for pictures. There were big smiles everywhere. Children were invited into the cockpit to see all of the lights,

buttons, gauges, toggles — and when they questioned why there was no steering wheel, the captain showed them the \$50,000 joystick that steers the plane," said Mitchell.

Even when the plane was taxiing out to the runway, Captain Steve came on the PA system and told the children that they would need to help him get



the plane off the runway.

"When I give you the go ahead, I want you all to stamp your feet as hard as you can to help lift this big plane off the runway. Once we start to lift off, you know what Buzz Lightyear says?

When the nose of the plane left the ground, the captain shouted through the microphone "to infinity" and the entire plane shouted back enthusiastically "and beyond!"

The cabin flight crew were dressed in costumes while serving refreshments and singing songs. Once the plane was at cruising altitude, they started a pillow fight with all of the passengers said Mitchell.

By generously donating their time, pilots, flight attendants, maintenance engineers and numerous other employees on the ground and behind the scenes offer children facing mental, physical or social adversity the chance to take a break from their everyday to make memories and see new possibilities.

"Dreams Take Flight enables children to go for a one-day trip to a theme park in either Florida or Los Angeles, depending on where you are in the country. We've been around for 34 years now and we have chapters across Canada that take these trips," said Bev Watson, the president of the Winnipeg chapter and national president for Dreams Take Flight Canada. Watson has been part of Dreams Take Flight from the very beginning when Air Canada asked its employees if they wanted to be involved. She volunteered and has continued to take

'[The kids] went on rides. They ate. They had lots of fun. Just even walking around Star Wars in Hollywood studios or just walking through the Magic Kingdom, everybody goes crazy," said Watson.

The kids who take part have jampacked days starting with a 3 a.m. start at the airport. From there, they get to Orlando, Fla., at about 9:40 a.m. and travel to Disney World. They break into smaller groups and then are able to explore the park, eat and have fun before making their way back home at the end of the day.

Watson says that she continues to volunteer year after year because of the difference that it makes in the children.

'You have children that are very meek and mild in the beginning and sort of stay to themselves. And then, during the day, you see how they

blossom and their eyes brighten up and they're just so happy and excited. They build friendships during the day. Just to see the smiles on their faces when they see a ride for the first time and they come off and it's just amazing," she said.

It also allows these kids to be with other kids with similar conditions to their own, giving them time to connect with people their age that understand what it feels like to be a kid facing challenges.

Joe Thompson, who has three children — Alyna Huntinghawk, Kayla Huntinghawk, Alexis Daniels — from our area who took part in the program said the experience was wonderful.

"They were just blown away by everything. They would certainly do it again in a heartbeat. They had a wonderful time. It was the experience of a lifetime. I don't know if I'll ever get a chance to experience that again," he

Watson says the kids enjoy the rides every year but her favourite part is being able to be part of their happi-

"Just the smiles and just seeing how much they enjoy themselves, and have a good time and forget about their cares and their worries," she

Farmers Hall owners plan upscale steakhouse, events venue and farmers' market

Hall to become Norsemen Auction headquarters

The iconic Farmers Hall west of Gimli has exchanged hands and the new owners are planning to make the hall the headquarters for their booming business, Norsemen Auction, as well as renting it out for small events, holding farmers' markets and opening an upscale steakhouse.

Jordan Dankochik and Victoria Stiglmayr purchased the hall and acreage from Elaine and Darrell Klym last week and are planning to renovate part of it for Norsemen's offices, a cross-Canada auction house with representatives in the U.S. They already have social events lined up in June and they've just set a date for the opening of a new farmers' market, called Oma and Opa's Farmers' Market.

The couple have hit the ground running and are excited to have taken over the historic building, which was built in 1934.

They said they won't be renovating the central part of the hall in order to preserve its historic integrity.

"We're going to renovate some space on the west side of the building for offices for our auction company. We're growing quite substantially and we need space for our employees. Salespeople and others can gather in the hall and watch our auctions, which are online," said Stiglmayr. "We also want to continue to offer small functions and a farmers' market. We want to preserve all the nostalgic features of the building."

They plan to winterize the hall so that they can continue to operate their auction business year-round. And with heating they'll also be able to make the hall available for public functions and markets in the wintertime. Previously, the hall closed for the winter.

The couple also have plans to open an upscale steakhouse on the weekends, featuring homegrown fare from land and lake.

"We want to have a high end steakhouse offering the best beef and bison sourced from Interlake producers and pickerel from Lake Winnipeg," said Dankochik. "We're thinking of operating that on Friday, Saturday and Sunday afternoons either inside hall or on the patio or we could set up private tables in the yard and have the lounge open at the same time."

In addition to social events, Dankochik said they want to showcase local talent and have already been in touch with youth groups for performances.

Members of their family will be helping out with the operation of the hall, he said. His Oma (grandmother), Nellie Groot, for instance, will be overseeing the farmers' market.

Former hall owners and Darrell and Elaine Klym restored Farmers Hall to its former country charm and held their first event in 2014. After successfully weathering the economic downturn caused by CO-VID pandemic, they decided to retire.

"I am totally excited these kids have taken over the hall and that it has gone to a local family. They have a lot of support from their families and I'm very pleased about that," said Darrell, who met Elaine during a community dance at the hall. "We'll definitely be here to give them a little guidance if needed, even though they're quite capable and

have their own vision for the hall."

The hall became part of Darrell's family when his grandfather, Nick Klym, donated in 1941 the piece of land where it presently sits. It had been built on land across the highway where the Gimli Industrial Park is now located.

It was called the United Farmers Community Hall and was built by local residents to host fall suppers, dances, weddings and other social events. The hall's volunteer committee closed it in the 1990s after it grew too expensive to maintain it. Its facade consisted of weather-beaten grey boards by the time the Klyms bought it and began restoring it over a period of years.

"We approached the remaining members of the committee because the hall was in a state of disrepair and we bought it from them in 2007. We started renovating it in 2010. It was a huge job," said Elaine.

Some of the renovations included gutting the kitchen, which was in "terrible shape" and installing a commercial kitchen, she said. They kept the original maple dance floor, which is "one of the best dancefloors in the Interlake." For the decorative wainscoting, they asked area farmers if they could salvage pieces of wood from old sheds.

"My husband and I ran the hall as an entertainment and event centre and wedding venue. We added a bistro after COVID arrived and we hit a brick wall. We also started the farmers' market," she said.

The hall was also in demand for family reunions, anniversary parties, showers, celebrations of life and other special events, she said.

Despite their hectic schedule running their auction business and making plans to renovate the west side of the hall for offices, Dankochik and Stiglmayr said they'll be paying tribute to the Klyms for all the work they've done restoring the hall.

"We want to have a passing-on-the-torch and retirement party for Darrell and Elaine. They'll always be royalty here," said Dankochik.

Oma and Opa's Farmers' Market is scheduled for

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Taxpayers get soaked by Volkswagen giveaway

More than \$4 million per job. That's how much Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has committed taxpayers to spending in his sweetheart deal with a German auto giant.

In St. Thomas, Ont., flanked by Premier Doug Ford, Trudeau announced that taxpayers are set to give Volkswagen up to \$13 billion in exchange for a \$7-billion electric car battery plant.

The plant is costing taxpayers \$13 billion and is set to employ 3,000

Divide the total cost by the number of workers and you get \$4.3 million

Not to be left out, Ford also committed Ontario taxpayers to chipping in half-a-billion.

Step back for a moment and think about the larger implications of this agreement. What does it say about the competitiveness of the Canadian economy that the government felt it had to put this much money on the table just to attract a plant and 3,000 iobs?

Federal Industry Minister Francois-Philippe Champagne can talk about "seizing generational opportunities." But there's no downplaying the fact it took \$13 billion to get Volkswagen to come here.

And what happens if Toyota is looking to build a new plant and wants its own multi-billion-dollar handout? What about Honda? Ferrari?

It's quite possible that the government set a dangerous precedent that will result in every automaker demanding billions of dollars from taxpayers before agreeing to come to Canada.

Think of what else could have been done with \$13 billion.

Canada could have built more than a dozen new hospitals or hired 16,000 new nurses for a decade or paid off the entire debt of Prince Edward Island five times over.

Keep in mind that Volkswagen's profits were over \$33 billion last year. That's a huge amount of money. Volkswagen's profits are bigger than the individual provincial budgets of Saskatchewan, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island or Newfoundland and Labrador.

Corporate welfare has real consequences. For every dollar politicians hand over to wealthy corporations, that's one dollar less that can fund programs, lower tax bills or reduce government debt.

A key consequence of corporate welfare is that it's addictive. Remember good old Bombardier? A one-time corporate giveaway has turned into decades of government handouts. Corporate welfare is easy to start, but the dependency is difficult to end.

Even worse, the money the feds are handing over to Volkswagen is borrowed.

The Trudeau government is running a \$40-billion deficit with no plan to ever balance the budget. It's already spending nearly \$44 billion on debt interest charges this year alone.

Then there's the whole idea of trying to outbid the Americans. The feds are telling taxpayers that the government had to make the deal because the Biden administration's subsidies effectively put a similar American offer on the table.

But the U.S. economy is 10 times the size of Canada's, and the Americans have much more money to work with. Surely outbidding our neighbours to the south isn't a sensible long-term

Instead of raising carbon taxes, payroll taxes and alcohol taxes then giving a bag of cash to a hand-picked business, Trudeau should cut taxes across the board and cut out corpo-

Finally, where is the political opposition? New Democratic Leader Jagmeet Singh loves to bash grocery store CEOs, so why hasn't he grabbed the pitchfork after Volkswagen raided the public purse? If the Conservatives want to be the party of fiscal responsibility, then why aren't they up in arms over this corporate welfare?

Volkswagen's sweetheart deal is bad news for taxpayers. Trudeau is taking money out of the pockets of struggling taxpayers and stashing it into the bank account of a profitable multinational corporation. Politicians of all stripes should oppose this kind of corporate giveaway.

May is the operative word because less nitrogen favours only those particular blue-green algae that can fix nitrogen from the air, and this ability is enhanced when oxygen is low.

However, many other blue-green algae do not have this ability, nor do all of the other eucaryote (non-bluegreen) algae. (There are blooms that survive taking nitrates from the air, and there are blooms in water that need soluble nitrates to survive.)

Studies have determined discharge

of nitrogen into bodies of water has been linked to eutrophication. Treatment plants that only reduce phosphorus from sewage will give an advantage to all the algae that need nitrogen as well as phosphorus, and there will still be blooms.

Therefore, it is imperative that both phosphorus and nitrogen be addressed and removed if Lake Winnipeg is to have any expectation of being saved.

Yes, the financial stakes are high, but how much is the value of those irreplaceable waters?

If nitrogen is irrelevant, as some have claimed it to be, then why is nitrogen added to fertilizers if it does not stimulate plant growth? Algae are plants too.

Politics aside, we cannot afford to wait another generation, or more, to see if a "phosphorus first" approach

Government drops mask requirement in most health-care facilities

COVID infections and hospitalizations decreased during the last week of April, according to the provincial government's respiratory surveillance report for the period April 23 -29 (reporting Week 17).

There were 96 new cases detected by PCR testing in Week 17. There were 123 new cases reported the previous week. Provincial COVID case data are underestimates of the true number of infections as the government restricts access to PCR testing. Rapid antigen tests aren't tracked.

Thirty-nine people were hospitalized in Week 17 with two people requiring intervention in the intensive care unit. There were 57 new hospitalizations the previous week with six ICU admissions.

The province reported six deaths from COVID in Week 17. There were 10 COVID deaths the previous week and 13 deaths the week before that.

Numbers are calculated using comparisons of total outcome data between the current and the previous week's report.

Manitoba's COVID death toll now stands at 2,493 according to the federal government's COVID webpage as of April 22. Canada's death toll has reached 52,037.

Wastewater surveillance data for Winnipeg and Brandon up to April 25 show sustained COVID activity.

The provincial government no longer lists in its surveillance reports the names of hospitals and personal care homes with COVID outbreaks.

There were two new cases of influenza A and five new cases of influenza B reported in Week 17 and no hospitalizations and deaths. There were six and three new cases, respectively, reported the previous week, along with six new hospitalizations and zero deaths.


There were 15 new cases of respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) in Week 17. There were 10 new cases reported the week before.

Other health news:

- The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority reported COVID outbreaks at two personal care homes and a hospital in Selkirk after weeks of no reported outbreaks (according to its outbreak webpage).

The outbreak at Selkirk's Tudor House Personal Care Home was declared on April 28 and the outbreak at Selkirk's Red River Place Personal Care Home was declared on May 1.

A COVID outbreak has also occurred at the Selkirk Mental Health Centre's Tyndall Building where patients from Red River Place PCH are currently re-

siding after experiencing flooding.

"Red River Place Personal Care Home residents who are currently residing in the Tyndall Building at Selkirk Mental Health Centre are also experiencing a COVID-19 outbreak. These residents are temporarily relocated as a result of flood damage repair currently underway at Red River Place," said an IERHA spokesperson. "The staff at Red River Place have communicated the outbreak to residents' friends and family and outbreak protocols are in place at both facilities. All residents continue to be monitored for symptoms."

- Manitoba's Shared Health organization announced last week that it's dropping the requirement for wearing masks in most health-care settings, including long-term care facilities.

Patients and visitors will no longer have to wear masks starting May 10.

"The changes in masking requirements are based on advice given by infection prevention and control experts and reflect the changes we've seen with virus transmission in our province over the past year," said Monika Warren, Shared Health's chief operating officer of provincially co-ordinated health services and chief nursing officer, in a May 3 news release. "Care settings across the province will continue to be mask-friendly. Masks will be available to those who wish to wear them."

Warren added that masks are an "effective way of limiting virus transmission."

Masks will still be required in settings with cancer patients or transplant recipients as they are "particularly vulnerable populations."

- In response to the province's announcement on dropping the requirement to wear masks in health-care settings, Doctors Manitoba said in a May 4 news release that mask policies will vary among health clinics and advises people to check with a clinic and follow its recommendations on masking.

"Patients may ask their physician or other staff in the clinic to wear a mask," states the organization.

- Globally, there have been almost 2.8 million new COVID cases and over 17,000 new deaths from the virus reported over the period April 3-30, 2023, according to the World Health Organization's epidemiological update published May 4.

"Reported COVID-19 cases are underestimates as shown by prevalence surveys," states the WHO. "This is partly due to the reductions in testing and delays in reporting in many countries."

Over 8,100 people died from COVID in the Americas region alone (North, Central and South America) over that 28-day period.

The United States continues to lead the world's countries with the highest numbers of new COVID infections and new deaths from the virus. From April 3 to 30, the U.S. reported 392,480 new cases or 118.6 new cases per 100,000 and 5,263 new COVID deaths or 1.6 new deaths per 100,000.

Canada reported 562 new deaths or 1.5 deaths per 100,000 over that same period. That puts Canada in

third place among countries in the Americas (U.S. and Brazil ranked first and second place, respectively) with the highest number of new COVID deaths.

As of May 3, there were 6.9 million COVID deaths reported globally.

The WHO downgraded COVID's international alert status last week, saying the virus is no longer a global public health "emergency" (the highest level of alarm). The WHO declared COVID an emergency on Jan. 30, 2020.

The WHO's declared end of the emergency phase of COVID was, however, tempered by warnings of COVID's continuing ability to kill and cause long-term disabilities. COVID is still a "global health threat" and the organization is uncertain as to the virus's future evolution.

"Last week, COVID-19 claimed a life every three minutes — and that's just the deaths we know about. As we speak, thousands of people around the world are fighting for their lives in intensive care units. And millions more continue to live with the debilitating effects of post-COVID-19 condition," said WHO director general Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus in a May 5 statement. "This virus is here to stay. It is still killing, and it's still changing. The risk remains of new variants emerging that cause new surges in cases and deaths."

The worst thing countries can now do, he added, is to use this declaration to let down their guard or say that COVID is nothing to worry about.

"Almost 7 million deaths have been reported to WHO, but we know the toll is several times higher — at least 20 million," said Ghebreyesus. "Health systems have been severely disrupted, with millions of people missing out on essential health services, including lifesaving vaccinations for children. But COVID-19 has been so much more than a health crisis. It has caused severe economic upheaval, erasing trillions from GDP, disrupting travel and trade, shuttering businesses, and plunging millions into poverty."

- The NDP released figures highlighting funding cuts to rural healthcare by the Manitoba Conservatives over seven years. Sigfusson Northern partnership gives students first-hand experience with heavy equipment simulators

For the past few months, students at Lundar School have had the opportunity to try something new in their skills period program.

At the end of January, early February 2023, Lundar School entered into an exciting new partnership with Sigfusson Northern, a general contracting and heavy civil construction company employing many in the community, the Interlake and the province.

This new partnership gives students at the school access to two heavy equipment simulators, an excavator and a bulldozer, generously provided by the construction giant. Sigfusson Northern had simulators that were not being used and lent the school the equipment for a limited time.

"It allows kids to do something in our skills period that they are potentially really interested in. A lot of times, teenagers are looking to be a part of the workforce, but they are seeing the money side of things, doing something that isn't in a classroom, learning. This gives them a dabble into the life of an operator," said Lawrence Grzenda, principal of Lundar School.

In December, conversations started percolating between Tyler Medeiros, one of the school's student teachers, and Grant Sigfusson for the opportunity to bring the extra simulators to the school.

With the equipment, students can use the simulators to gain experience and understanding of what it would be like to operate the equipment.

The simulators track the students' actions while using the machine to give them a performance score at the end. Out of this tracking, students can learn if they made money, cost the company money, banged something or made a safety violation.


"They get to connect that it's not just operating a machine. There are skills that come with it. ... It's something you don't get when you are just discussing. It's not something schools can easily afford or adapt to," said Grzenda.

With their 30-minute daily skills period slot, students can choose to experiment with the simulators. Students rate their options for skill ses-

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Rally O trials hosted by Crazy Jumpers has tails wagging in Arborg

Crazy Jumpers Dog School & Boarding hosted rally obedience trials in Arborg late last month that had a lot of dogs from across the province showcasing good behaviour and other obedience skills.

Obedience trials (competitions) offer a challenging course where dogs are required to respond to their owners' commands and demonstrate obedience skills.

The three-day trial was held at the Arborg Hall from April 28 to 30. The trials are offered by the Canadian Association of Rally Obedience (CARO), which holds trials showcasing varying levels of skills. Judges who live in different parts of Canada host the trials for the organization.

There are only two Rally Obedience (also referred to as Rally O) judges in Manitoba and they're both from the Interlake. Patricia Tschanen owns Crazy Jumpers Dog School & Boarding in Fraserwood, and Kim Masiak teaches at the school.

"We had 135 runs to judge for CARO in Arborg. That is a lot but in a fantastic way," said Tschanen, who has been teaching rally obedience since about 2011. "It blew our minds how many people in Manitoba are now interested in this sport. It's so nice to see the sport growing. Rally O is for people wanting some fun and games with their dogs."

Rally Obedience is a dog obedience sport open to all dogs including purebreds, mixed breeds, pets and dogs with physical challenges. The sport has over 40 obedience movements such as sits, turns and paces, according to CARO's website. It challenges handlers and dogs to improve heeling and teamwork, hold the dog's attention and maintain a positive attitude. Rally O is offered by CARO as well as by other organizations such as the

Canadian Kennel Club, the American Kennel Club and dog associations in other countries.

Both Tschanen and Masiak are professional dog trainers. Classes at Crazy Jumpers are offered year-round at Crazy Jumpers either indoors or outdoors and include manners, obedience, life skills, rally obedience and training for therapy dogs.

To become a Rally O judge, Tschanen said there is a course of study, shadow judging with a certified judge and testing.

"You need to have so many years of being a trainer or competitor and have a certain level reached with your dog so you know what you're talking about," she said. "Kim and I started with Rally Obedience together. And then she wanted to become a judge and she talked me into it."

Masiak and her dog already have the bronze, silver and gold championship in CARO and they're working towards the Supreme Master Championship title, she said. Tschanen and her dog have moved up to the highest level in Rally O, the versatility excellence level.

"I had tears rolling down my face after Kim did her run because she worked so amazingly good with her dog," said Tschanen. "We've worked together since her dog was eight

weeks old."

For Rally O competitions, skill levels start at novice in which dogs perform while on a leash, then move to the advanced, excellent, versatility and versatility excellence levels, all of which are off leash. Each level has more difficult exercises.

"You start with 200 points when you go into the ring. There is a course set up with about 16-20 stations. You get deductions off the points if your dog makes a mistake or turns the wrong way or misses a sign [a command from the owner]," said Tschanen. "You qualify for the next level if you have 170 or more points."

In the novice trial, for instance, if a dog walks tightly on the leash points will be deducted.

When the COVID pandemic hit, CARO started offering virtual trials where people could film their dog performing to earn points. And with only so many judges in Canada, virtual trials enable people living in remote areas to take part in competitions.

Tschanen said she'll have about 150 virtual runs to judge in a few weeks that will keep her busy.

Crazy Jumpers Dog School will be holding another Canadian Association of Rally Obedience trial on June 10 and 11 at Crazy Jumpers, which is located on PR 231 in Fraserwood.

"The June trial is outdoors and will be way more difficult because there are more distractions outside," she

An indoor trial is also booked for Oct. 27-29 at the Arborg Hall.

Riverton getting set to get its gloves on for community clean-up

The community-wide clean-up is scheduled a few days after that, on Friday afternoon.

The municipality's office clerk Lindsay D'Hont said clean-ups are an annual event but the municipality wants to broaden participation this year.

"Community beautification is always a priority of the municipality, and we're excited to be able to resume community events and gatherings with confidence," said D'Hont.
"There's an annual clean-up day partnership between the municipality and Riverton schools. This year

we are just expanding the scope to encompass more of the community."

Not only is litter unsightly, but it is dangerous to wildlife and aquatic life. Over the course of the pandemic, awareness rose about how facemask strings — if not cut before disposed of can endanger wildlife.

Ethans will be giving students a 40-minute presentation on litter habits, how people can make a difference and community pride, said Love.

Take Pride Winnipeg was founded in 1991. It's a registered charity that seeks to inspire community pride, raise public awareness and promote citizen responsibility in making Winnipeg clean and beautiful. nities and the underspending of \$160 million (for capital projects) in 2021.

In the IERHA, the NDP says the Conservative government cut 19 positions in 2017-2018. And before the pandemic, the government cut \$1.2 million for staff-to-patient ratios. In 2021-2022, the government cut from the IERHA budget (for hospitals) \$516,000 for "streamlining and efficiencies."

The government also closed 23 rural EMS stations across Manitoba that included the Riverton EMS station. The government cut 75 nursing seats at Red River College then spent \$7 million on agency nurses for the IERHA in 2021-2022. The nurse (LPN) vacancy rate in the IERHA in August 2022 was 23 per cent.

In response to the government saying last week that it had recruited 900 health-care workers over the past six months, the NDP issued a statement calling that announcement a distraction.

"You can't believe the PCs when it comes to health care. They've proven time and again they will say anything to distract from years of Brian Pallister and Heather Stefanson's health-care cuts," said an NDP caucus spokesper-

The government's recruitment announcement was also criticized by the Manitoba Association of Health Care Professionals, which represents rural paramedics and other healthcare workers, for a lack of detail as to where the recruited allied health professionals are working and what kind of positions (i.e., casual, part time, etc.) they hold.

Gimli Children's Centre knocking down walls and rolling out the carpet

After receiving a grant through a federal-provincial program to enhance child care facilities, the Gimli Children's Centre (day care) is in the process of knocking down walls and rolling out some new carpet.

Executive director Heather Reichert said the centre applied for a Quality Enhancement grant under the Early Learning and Child Care Building Fund to enhance its building on Third Avenue.

"We're working on knocking out a wall to connect a couple of playrooms so we can pass between the two rooms and have better access to the bathrooms. This will enhance the program for the kids," said Reichert.

The carpeting in the infants' room will be also replaced to make it more practical, she said.

Quality Enhancement grants are one-time grants available through a federal-provincial partnership to support capital projects for child care and early learning facilities. The *Express* reached out to the province for information about how much it contributed to the grant but did not get an answer

Reichert said the centre also received

Gimli Children's is in the process of undergoing renovations.

grants last year from the Westshore Community Foundation, Access Credit Union, the RM of Gimli, the Telus Foundation, the Gimli Kiwanis Club and the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority.

"The Telus Foundation awarded the centre \$5,000 for our morning snack program," said Reichert. "This enabled us to help us provide a wider

variety of snack items throughout 2022. We provide a balance of dairy, grains and fruits daily."

To help with the cost of food, the centre organizes a food drive once or twice a year. It undertook a pizza fundraiser with a local company and is planning to do a T-shirt/hoodie fundraiser.

Local businesses such as Lakeview Dental, Gimli Veterinary Services, H.P. Tergesen & Sons general store and Reichert's Auto also made donations to the centre in 2022.

The RM of Gimli awarded the centre a grant of \$1,000 in 2022, said CAO Kelly Cosgrove. The amount of the 2023 grant to the centre is not yet available as it's part of the RM's upcoming financial plan, which is scheduled to be presented this week.

In addition to the indoor enhance-

ments the centre is undertaking with federal and provincial government funding, it plans to buy new outdoor play equipment.

"We're looking at adding some new play equipment and enhancing our outdoor play area," said Reichert. "We want to get some new tricycles because the ones we have are breaking down. We've ordered new tricycles, the two-seater taxi tricycles the kids love. We're also looking at getting some other outdoor play equipment."

The centre welcomes donations of toys, crafts, cash and food.


been there ever since. In August 2022, she became the interim clinical team manager.

sions that month, between eight and 11 possibilities offered that run for two weeks at a time.

The skills period is about creating time during the school day to meet a wide range of student needs and interests to make time for students to work on core skills, such as numeracy and literacy, that they need to improve. It also gives students a chance to try activities that don't necessarily fit into a course at the high school level, which is where an activity like

this one fits in.

Grzenda said there are several highlevel goals the school hopes to achieve with their students while they have access to the simulators.

They want students to feel like the school is providing them with opportunities and purpose, finding enjoyment in school, and forming a connection with the company.

"It is great to see local partnerships develop with schools. We know that there are many pathways to success, and many of our students are interested in trades. Having Sigfusson Northern loan the school heavy equipment simulators allows students to experience a potential career path in a low-risk and supportive environment. We also know that if students see relevance to their educational experience, they are more likely to be engaged in school. We appreciate the steps that Sigfusson Northern has taken towards helping create this opportunity," said Donald Nikkel, superintendent of HR and policy at the Lakeshore School Division.

Although the stimulators are based

out of Lundar School, they have invited other schools in the division to come down so that as many students in the division s possible can experience this opportunity too.

Lundar School is currently in the process of planning a day with Sigfusson Northern when students can go on-site. This way, students who have taken this opportunity in their skills period sessions can have the chance to experience the machines in action, making things practical for students that want to pursue a career in the field.





Gimli's Active Trails Advisory Committee hosts nature walk, prize draws

The Gimli Active Trails Advisory Committee (ATAC) had dozens of people come out last Saturday morning to join them on a delightful hourlong nature walk north of town.

Fifty-two people, including 18 children, and nine dogs set off from the trail head near the Diageo distillery and proceeded north along the Gimli Rail Trail (former railway line) through the forest towards Camp Morton.

The trail runs parallel to PR 222 and is one of the Rural Municipality of Gimli's 17 trails its advisory committee has been tasked with enhancing and promoting.

ATAC chair Cheryl Bailey gave a brief speech before participants set off, acknowledging they were on traditional Indigenous land and noting Red Dress Day on May 5, which raises awareness of missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls. She said the committee's walks attract at minimum 30 people and are held in different locations in the municipality.

"We hold these walks to show people the wonderful trails we have throughout our area," said Bailey. "Because of the weather and some wet condition, this is our fourth walk on this particular trail, but we will be looking at holding walks on other trails in the RM that we want to make sure people know about."

In addition to hosting a walk down forested paths alive with the sounds of birds, crickets and other creatures, committee members held three draws for prizes that were sponsored by the Diageo distillery.

The Active Trails Advisory Committee, which was formerly called the

Transportation Trails Advisory Committee, was formed in 2019 by municipal bylaw and is an advisory body to council. It is made up of community volunteers and a member of council (currently Coun. Kurt Reichert).

The plan sets out specific goals, along with accompanying actions and a timeline, which include identifying trail connections and areas for development, providing signage and amenities such as

Selkirk RCMP attend collision, leading to fleeing suspects and weapons seized

On May 2 at approximately 12:35 p.m., Selkirk RCMP received a report of a single-vehicle collision at Gimli Road and Henry Avenue in the RM of St. Andrews.

A silver pickup truck full of garage-type items had rolled into the ditch. Two people were observed running toward Netley Marsh. Police attended and determined the pickup truck was stolen.

Investigation led officers to determine that a black pickup truck came to the area, at which time the two people who had fled returned to the collision scene, took items from the first pickup truck and got into the second pickup truck, which then left through a bush trail through the marsh. Police checks on the second pickup truck determined it, too, was stolen.

Multiple police vehicles from several detachment areas attended the area to look for the pickup truck and the four individuals believed to be inside. At one point, the vehicle was spotted near Edith Avenue in Petersfield. When the suspect vehicle became aware of the police presence, it fled down Highway 9 at a rate of speed topping 175 kilometres per hour, becoming a severe public safety threat.

The vehicle was again spotted on Highway 8, passing other vehicles on the shoulder. RCMP set up containment in the area. The vehicle was located abandoned in a field on Rushman Road.

RCMP police service dog Mocha attended the scene to assist in tracking the individuals from the vehicle. As police were searching, the suspects stood up from behind a large pit and began to flee, quickly running out of steam. They were apprehended by 1:35 p.m.

All four suspects had numerous outstanding warrants and were breaching court-imposed conditions. A search of the black pickup truck resulted in the seizure of a rifle, a pellet handgun, numerous rounds of a variety of ammunition, a bunch of keys and illegal cigarettes. A search of the silver pickup truck resulted in the seizure of bear spray, a hatchet and a baton. A firearm was also recovered near where the vehicle was in the ditch.

It was determined that the silver pickup truck had been involved in an incident of stolen fuel in the RM of Rosser earlier in the day. It was also determined that the stolen silver pickup had been taken from a residence on Hall Road East, which had been broken into and firearms, along with numerous other items, were taken. Police have since recovered a handgun and another rifle that was taken.

David Adam Morrissette, 25, of Winnipeg; Liam Freeman, 22, of the RM of MacDonald; Angie Marie Daniels, 22, of Winnipeg; and Brittny Anderson, 27, of the RM of Gimli all face numerous charges, in-

Roundabout coming to busy intersection

Construction work is expected to drive forward this season to install a roundabout at the intersection of highways 6 and 236.

Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Doyle Piwniuk said roundabouts help to keep traffic flowing safely.

"Roundabouts are not new to Manitoba," he said. "I think a lot of people have now used roundabouts."

He points to roundabouts in Portage la Prairie, Brandon and near Oak

Bluff that are helping with the flow of traffic.

"Right now, we're seeing the explosion of Stonewall growing. A lot of people coming from Stonewall take Highway 6 for the commute," he said.

"We've seen some accidents there, so a roundabout would be a great solution to direct traffic between the two highways."

For those who aren't sure how to navigate a roundabout, Piwniuk offers an explanation.

"You come up to the roundabout and then you yield to make sure no one is coming. If a vehicle is coming, then you have to yield for that vehicle," he said.

"When it's safe to do so, you proceed in the roundabout until you get to your destination. Once you're in the roundabout, you've got the right of way."

The Highway 6 and 236 intersection will be a two-lane roundabout, accommodating agricultural equipment and long combination vehicles more efficiently and safely.

According to Transportation and Infrastructure, roundabouts have been shown to reduce fatal collisions as

much as 89 per cent and injuries as much as 76 per cent due to the slower speeds and reduced number of conflict points.

When a vehicle only has to yield at the entry instead of stopping and waiting for a green light, delays are reduced. Reducing traffic delays means vehicles will idle less, consume less fuel and emit fewer pollutants into the air.

In addition, traffic signals are expensive to maintain and replace. Costs to maintain signals for an intersection for one year amount to approximately \$3,500. Electricity costs are reduced with a savings of approximately \$600 per year per intersection.

"We want to continue to rebuild our highways. As Winnipeg grows to one-million population, we want to make sure that we tie into all the traffic that goes onto our Perimeter Highway. Eventually we want to rebuild it as a freeway. Right now we're doing a North Perimeter design, and we already did the South Perimeter design," he said.

"In the future, down the road, there will be interchanges on Highway 6 and the Perimeter Highway, and for any lights on the Perimeter Highway, we want to change them into interchanges."

She is an athletic goaltender who continues to show steady improvements in her game. She posted an impressive .921 save percentage with the U18 AAA Interlake Lightning this past season. Halldorson will return to the Interlake Lightning next season and is expected to play a key role for Team Manitoba at the 2023 National Women's U18 Championship this November.

Ella Stewner (Defence, East St. Paul, Manitoba) – Stewner is an excellent puck moving defender with a high hockey IQ. She has also won various academic awards as a student at Balmoral Hall. She is coming off a solid 2023 Canada Winter Games, where

she posted a goal and two assists in six games. Stewner, who has committed to the University of Alberta next season, had a great year with the Balmoral Hall Blazers in the Junior Women's Hockey League and is expected to anchor Team Manitoba's back end at the 2023 NAHC.

Anya Misner (Forward, Cooks Creek, Manitoba) – Misner is a skilled forward who plays both centre and wing. Like Stewner, she was part of Team Manitoba's gold medal winning team at the 2022 NAHC and she is looking to repeat in her home province. She had a strong 2022-23 season with the Balmoral Hall Blazers and then recorded three assists in six games for Team Manitoba at the 2023 Canada Winter Games. In addition to being a gifted hockey player, Misner is an excellent student and has committed to play for Carleton University next season.

Ayden Collins (Defenceman, Winnipeg, Manitoba) – Collins played this past season for the RINK Hockey Academy U16 team in the Canadian Sport School Hockey League (CSSHL), posting one goal and 11 assists in 24 games. He also played

three games for the RINK Hockey Academy's U18 team. He's a smart, two-way defenceman who plays a solid all-around game and played well for U16 Team Manitoba at the 2023 Canada Winter Games. Collins was selected by the Winnipeg ICE in the eighth round of the 2022 Western Hockey League Draft.

Hayden Paupanekis (Forward, Winnipeg, Manitoba) - Paupanekis is a right winger who played this past season for the RINK Hockey Academy U18 team in the CSSHL, posting 23 goals and 16 assists in 29 games.
