Kris' Fish & Chips, a family diner in Gimli, will be temporarily closed due to a fire inside of the building. The owners, Jeff and Candy Badger, announced this on the restaurant's Facebook page on Sunday, May 8 at 5:56 a.m.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation, and the owners have not yet been allowed into the building, Jeff Badger said. He had received a picture of the scene and described extensive smoke damage on the inside of the building around the storage area. The roof in the damaged area has also collapsed.

Badger said there were already rumours surrounding the fire on social media, and that it did not begin in the kitchen. As of Monday, May 9, they weren't expecting to know the exact cause until later on in the week.

Badger said that he was sad about the damage and poor timing, but was thankful that there were no injuries. The fire had been active for approximately an hour and a half.

"I feel for our employees, 'cause it'll disrupt their employment," he said. "And I also feel sad for our clients

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Commercial fishers are highway heroes after assisting man in vehicle rollover

Two commercial fishers from Gimli are highway heroes after coming to the rescue of a man whose vehicle had plunged into a ditch on Highway 8 last Thursday and rolled on its roof in the water.

Michael Reimer and Kevin Palson were cutting wood that afternoon at Palson's home near the highway and the junction of Siglavik Road, a curving stretch of highway, when they heard a tire pop, screeching tires and a crash.

They jumped into a side-by-side to see what had happened, said Reimer last Saturday. When they reached the highway, they couldn't see an accident and the traffic was speeding by, so they started driving southwards along the verge. That's when they spotted a car upside down in a ditch filled with about a foot or more of water

"I saw the gentleman with his arm out the window, trying to get people's attention. I went into the ditch because his car was flooded and I told Kevin to call 911," said Reimer. "The water was up to my knees. I sat in the ditch holding this gentleman's hand. I tried to keep him calm and kept talking to him, I asked who he was and tried to make sure he didn't have a concussion or any serious cuts or injuries. I sat in the ditch beside him until the firefighters [from Gimli] showed up."

From prior first-aid training, Reimer said he knew they weren't supposed







to move someone trapped in a vehicle as that could potentially result in more serious injuries to the victim.

"We didn't want to try to get him out even though I have [first-aid] experience. You don't know if the person could be paralyzed and you can make it worse," said Reimer. "I asked him if he was OK and he said he was



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Walk to raise money and morale for Alzheimer's

The Alzheimer Society's annual walk is in Winnipeg May 28

Clad in blue shirts, walk, run and connect with community to support the Alzheimer Society's annual Walk for Alzheimer's fundraiser.

After two years of solely virtual IG Wealth Management Walk for Alzheimer's, the Manitoba charity is hosting an in-person walk in Winnipeg on May 28 at 10 a.m. In the Interlake, the Gordon Howard Centre in Selkirk is hosting its in-person walk on June 3 at 1 p.m.

"People have been doing step challenges, hosting a barbecue and collecting funds from their family and friends," said Samantha Holland, regional coordinator of the Interlake-Eastern region.

"Whatever you want to do to show your support and collect those pledges."

The Alzheimer Society collects 85 per cent of its revenue from donations and fundraisers, enabling them to offer programs that support people with Alzheimer's across Canada.

The annual walk is the Alzheimer Society's most profitable fundraiser.

Before the COVID-19 pandemic, the Manitoba organization would routinely raise over \$300,000 at

In 2020, the Alzheimer Society of Manitoba collected over \$230,000 at their virtual event.

'We've been blown away by the support that we've received in the last two years just being virtual, but we know that the energy of an in-person walk makes all the difference," she said.

"There's nothing quite like coming together and seeing that sea of blue."

Many of the walks hosted in the Interlake region

were organized by local personal care homes and schools.

Holland said she's heard few plans for in-person walks in the Interlake this year because personal care homes remain cautious as COVID-19 cases continue to creep across the province.

If supporters don't feel comfortable attending the in-person event, they can join the month-long Walk Your Way virtual program, which challenges participants to collect donations and learn more about Alzheimer's while getting their steps in.

Disaster financial assistance announced

The Manitoba government has launched an assistance program for individuals and municipalities impacted by this spring's flooding.

"As we continue to assess, we are anticipating that costs related to the spring flood may exceed more than \$10 million," Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Doyle Piwniuk said at a press conference Monday.

This includes damages to municipal infrastructure, private residences, farms, small businesses and provincial infrastructure, Piwniuk said, noting they will have to wait for the floodwaters to recede before final assessments can be made.

Whatever the final total ends up being, it's clear the road to repairing it all will be costly; the 2022 Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) is meant to help offset some of those costs.

"We recognize the tremendous efforts Manitobans and their communities have put into disaster response and recovery this spring," said Johanu Botha, head of Manitoba's Emergency Management Organization.

"The DFA program provides finan-

cial assistance for certain losses when a widespread natural disaster, like the one we are currently facing, strikes and creates an unreasonable financial burden. Spring flooding and rain in certain parts of the province this year certainly qualifies.

"This program will ensure that noninsurable losses ... basic damages to basic and essential property, response costs and infrastructure damage are covered to help alleviate the burden so many of our residents, municipalities, non-profits, small business and farmers have felt this spring."

Manitobans are encouraged to check with their insurance providers to review their policy coverage before applying for DFA. Insurable costs, such as sewer backup, are not covered by DFA. Some Manitobans may have also purchased overland flood insurance, which means those covered costs will also not be eligible for DFA funds.

Money for road repairs

Also on Monday, Premier Heather Stefanson announced \$15 million for a one-time grant program to provide municipalities with financial support for road reconstruction, rehabilitation and preservation projects.

"Manitoba municipalities are facing significant road infrastructure challenges as a result of this year's extraordinary weather conditions," Stefanson said in a statement. "Above-average precipitation and colder-than-average temperatures have caused a substantial increase in the number and severity of potholes on roads throughout the province, and inflation and supply chain issues have also added to this challenge."

As part of this grant program, the province will distribute \$15 million to Manitoba's 137 municipalities on a per-capita basis, with the City of Winnipeg to receive nearly \$9 million of the total.

"We are pleased to offer this extra support to reduce the financial burden on the City of Winnipeg and all municipalities during these unique times," Stefanson said.

Municipal election registration opens across Manitoba

Municipal politics is often overlooked as minor issues compared to provincial and federal governments, but municipal decisions impact residents daily.

Municipalities rely on dedicated leaders to help regulate how communities look, operate and interact with surrounding areas.

"Councillors and heads of councils, we're the boots on the ground in direct connection to the residents of our municipality and the province," said

Kam Blight, president of the Association of Manitoba Municipalities.

"We're responsible for providing many essential services that Manitobans depend on."

Registration to lead municipalities is opening across Manitoba.

The majority of Manitoba towns opened their registration for mayor and reeve positions on May 1, with a deadline of Sept. 20. Councillor candidate registration opens almost two months later on June 30 and closes on Sept. 20.

In Victoria Beach, Winnipeg Beach and Dunnottar, mayor and reeve candidates' registration opened on Feb. 1 and is open until June 16. Councillor candidates were able to register starting on March 31, but their deadline to register is June 16.

Ideal candidates have a variety of qualities and experiences, said Blight, but what matters most is their motivation to join council.

"It's individuals who want to do

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COVID outbreaks in PCHs; ER closures; April COVID data

Manitoba's health-care system continues to grapple with new COVID-19 infections each week, and long-term care homes and a critical shortage of nursing staff and physicians are compounding the stress on the system.

A number of COVID outbreaks were experienced in personal care homes in the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health

- A COVID outbreak was declared on May 2 at the Red River Place PCH in Selkirk. As of May 7, it was ongo-
- A COVID outbreak at the maple south unit of Tudor House was declared on April 27 and ended on May
- A COVID outbreak at the Arborg PCH was declared over on May 5, said a spokesperson for the IERHA.
- IERHA emergency room data for hospitals across the region show the continuation of temporary ER closures because of physician unavailability. Communities such as Arborg are down to two doctors — one runs his own clinic and another works at the hospital-based clinic — who take turns working at the ER.
- Although recent data on new CO-VID infections released by the provincial government — based on scaled-

back PCR testing that does not reflect the true extent of COVID infections show a decline, COVID patients continue to need hospital and ICU care and people die from the virus every week.

For the period April 24 to April 30, there were 1,042 new lab-confirmed COVID infections, according to the provincial government's weekly respiratory surveillance report on CO-VID. There were 185 new hospital admissions for people with COVID, of whom 12 were admitted to the ICU. Fourteen more Manitobans died of the virus that week.

For the period April 17 to 23, the government reported 1,436 new labconfirmed COVID cases, 200 new hospital admissions, of which 12 cases required admission to intensive care, and 13 more deaths.

For the period April 10 to 16, there were 1,190 lab-confirmed COVID infections, 206 new hospital admissions, of which 22 required intensive care, and 12 more deaths from the vi-

For the period April 3 to 9, there were 1,694 new lab-confirmed CO-VID cases, 177 new hospital admissions, of which 19 cases required care in the ICU, and five deaths.

New boat ramp at Gimli Harbour awaiting finishing touches

The federal government's newly constructed boat launch at Gimli Harbour is awaiting some final touches before it can open for the season.

Gimli Harbour Authority administrative assistant Lindsey Barabash said the concrete ramp, which can now accommodate two lanes of traffic, needs some backfill placed around

"There can't be a portion of the concrete lip sticking up," said Barabash last Friday. "Then we'll have to install a dock along the side of the ramp to lead to a gangway, as well as a bigger dock on the right-hand side for boats. Now the ramp is accessible to two lanes of traffic.'

Compared to the old ramp, the new one has been "beefed up" substantially and is 105 feet long, she said. That means it extends quite far out beneath the water, past the fuel dock.

Gimli Harbour serves commercial fishers and recreational boaters and is under the administration of the Small Craft Harbours branch of the federal department of Fisheries and Oceans. The launch ramp reconstruction took place over the winter. The work included the installation and removal of a temporary sheet pile cofferdam, demolition of the existing ramp pads and concrete slabs, and the construction of a new reinforced concrete launch ramp, according to the federal



The harbour is closed until the new ramp is fully completed.

government's website.

Harbour master Trevor Cowie said the ramp is an estimated 15 to 18 inches thick and needed lots of concrete to

"It took 100 metres of concrete; that's a lot of concrete — about 14 trucks," said Cowie.

Because it extends so far out into the harbour, low water years won't be a problem for boat launching, said Cowie, who is a CPA and oversees all the accounting functions of the harbour authority.

"The Coast Guard will be able to launch the Vakta [search and rescue

vessel] in any conditions, even

in low water years," said Cowie. "The ramp is far enough out that they can get water underneath them."

In addition to the new ramp, Small Craft Harbours will be upgrading its security system and installing additional cameras.

"We'll also probably be expanding our jet ski port offering," said Cowie.

"We brought in 16 new berths over the winter. We're doing well."

The harbour authority will be supplying life-jackets on loan, he said, for kids and adults who may not be aware of boating safety protocols and how dangerous Lake Winnipeg can

In the May 5 edition of The Express Weekly News, "West Interlake presents a \$730,000 surplus" states "the municipality ended the fiscal vear with a net operating surplus of \$737,002.40, which is six times more than the council expected."

RM of West Interlake Reeve Arnthor Jonasson noted on May 7 that the audited financial statements for 2021 have not been accepted by the RM of West Interlake council. He expects a slight surplus for 2021.

The article also states "This increase follows the 2020 fiscal year's surplus, which was budgeted to be \$21,983.76 and actually amounted to \$850,750.07."

Jonasson said the 2020 audited financial statements did not include an \$850,750.07 surplus. In 2020, the council ran a slight deficit, he added.

The Express Weekly News received a draft of the RM of West Interlake's 2022 financial plan, which did not include accurate projections.

fine. But sometimes people are in shock and say they're fine."

The Gimli Fire Department was first to arrive. Firefighters were going to use the jaws of life to try to extricate the man, said Reimer, but Palson said the vehicle's roof wasn't crushed and suggested that they might be able to get the man out through the door.

"I think what saved the gentleman from being crushed is the water in the ditch. When the car landed on the roof, it slid on the water and didn't get crushed," said Reimer. "Kevin suggested to the fire department that they first try to get the lock up and open the door. They did and we got him out. He was very lucky."

This is not the first time Reimer said he has come to someone's rescue. He has stopped at other traffic accidents on the highway, some far worse in which people had died.

"It's what we do. We help people," he said.

The man's family reached out to him to give him an update on his condition after the accident, said Reimer, and as far as he and Palson know, the man was taken first to Gimli hospital, about eight kilometres north, then to the Health Sciences Centre in Winnipeg.

"The granddaughter told me that her mom and dad want to meet me and say thank you."

The granddaughter also sent Reimer a message on Facebook with lots of heart emojis: "[Michael Reimer] that was my grandpa. Thank you so very much for saving his life. You saved us a huge heart break. Thank you sossooo much, seriously can't thank you enough."

Reimer said as far as he and Palson are aware, there was no other vehicle involved in the man's accident.

Palson said the curve on Highway 8 at Siglavik Road is a "crash-zone."

"I've been living here since 1985 and I don't know how many deaths there have been on this curve," said Palson last Saturday. "It's a terrible curve. People just crash there steady; I don't know why. It has been a crash-zone for years. This is the first one this year. But last summer, there were three pretty good wipeouts and one death."

He said it was fortunate the accident happened at the very moment he and Reimer decided to take a break and shut off their chainsaws otherwise they wouldn't have heard it.

"In another minute we would have fired up the chainsaw again and we wouldn't have heard it. We heard the squealing tires, a pop and boom, bang," said Palson. "Holy crow, and we gunsmoked the side-by-side up to the highway."

Because they couldn't see an accident and traffic was speeding by as though nothing had happened, Palson said he figured a tire must have blown on a semitrailer. But he then spotted the vehicle with its wheels up in the ditch farther down the way and they raced to the man's rescue.

After Palson spoke with 911, the man asked him to call his wife, who works in Gimli. Shortly after that, the ambulance arrived.

"The paramedics were there within 10 minutes. And the fire department was great; Ken Arnason, the deputy fire chief, he was

Johnny-on-the-spot," said Palson, who like Reimer, has taken first-aid training.

And like Reimer, this accident wasn't Palson's first. He saved a man who accidentally stepped through a hole on the ice on Lake Winnipeg and has rescued boaters.

"I've been pulling people out of the lake. I've lost track; at least six people I've saved from drowning. I'm just a lifesaver, I guess, because I'm always around at the right time," said Pal-

If he were to be involved in an accident, he said he hopes "someone does it for me."

Indigenous perspectives considered at inaugural U of M conference

The University of Manitoba is shining a light on the role Indigenous healing methods can have in school, medicine and daily life.

The Turtle Island Indigenous Science Conference will take place from June 14 to 16 at the University of Manitoba.

"We think it's important to widen appreciation for Indigenous perspectives," said Dr. Teresa de Kievet, associate dean of special initiatives and co-organizer of the conference.

"Indigenous people have really been at the forefront of scientific breakthroughs for centuries."

Over 20 speakers from across North America will discuss scientific knowledge embedded in Indigenous languages, traditional medicine and health, Indigenous scientific perspectives and Indigenous engagement with the land and environment.

One concept threaded through each presentation is two-eyed seeing.

Two-eyed seeing encourages academics to value all perspectives and consider things from both a traditional scientific analysis and the Indigenous Way of Knowing, which acknowledges that Indigenous people don't just learn from human interaction but also their deep respect for the land and environment.

Instead of focusing on solving one aspect of a problem, scientists approach issues by considering the bigger picture and how different components interact.

"Traditional Western science tends to focus on things in isolation, say a given cell or a virus or a piece of a protein and how it works; whereas, from an Indigenous perspective, it's all part of a whole," said de Kievet.

When researching a contaminated body of water, a scientist using Western techniques may test a water sample and try to find the pollutant. A scientist using Indigenous techniques may instead analyze the migration of fish and the health of vegetation in the area.

"There's a benefit to using both together."

Dr. Marcia Anderson, who has family from Peguis First Nation and Norway House Cree Nation, will cap off the first day of the conference by exploring her experience working with

knowledge keepers and traditional healers.

"I'll also focus on how both Indigenous and Western science around health and healing can be used together to support the health of Indigenous peoples," said Anderson.

An example of blending the two per-

An example of blending the two perspectives was holding a ceremony at a COVID-19 vaccine site.

"That really recognized the importance of traditional healers and knowledge keepers as health providers," said Anderson.

"As well as their knowledge and role modelling of using traditional medicines themselves and getting vaccinated."

When Anderson was completing her post-secondary education in the early 2000s in Manitoba, few programs discussed Indigenous perspectives of science.

Anderson had to pursue learning about traditional medicine through Indigenous doctors outside of the prairies.

"Teaching, and the emphasis on strong cultural identity as an important part of our health as providers as well as the health of our communities, was really reinforced," she said.

The University of Manitoba now offers a 70-hour Indigenous health course in the undergraduate medical

graduate program, which focuses on anti-racism and understanding colonial impacts.

Elders and knowledge keepers also teach at the university, and the Bannatyne campus grows medicines.

Indigenous science needs to be recognized as an independent subject, separate from what students may

> traditionally be taught in university, said Anderson.

> "We're taught to try to understand or validate other forms of knowledge based on what we learn in the university setting," said Anderson.

As the vice-dean of Ongomiizwin (Indigenous Institute of Health and Healing) at the Rady Faculty of Health Sciences, Anderson said she hopes more land-based courses will be integrated into

health programs to create healthier habits.

"Burnout amongst health-care providers and health professional learners — that is one area where I see that land-based education, Indigenous science and knowledge of health and healing could be beneficial for all of US."

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

While its sister city in Ukraine has three times the population, Komarno, Man., proved the community's strength outweighs its numbers.

The RM of Armstrong community raised over \$8,000 on May 1 to support Ukrainians impacted by Russia's invasion

"A few members from the community hall and volunteers in the area got the idea to start raising funds for Ukraine," said Mona Buchkowski, one of the event's organizers.

"Before we knew it, we had everything moving along."

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
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Arborg, Bifrost-Riverton flooding has community pulling together

Extensive overland flooding around Arborg that put the town's hospital and personal care home on evacuation alert last week saw the community come together to try to prevent damage to properties.

The Town of Arborg and the Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton declared a local state of emergency on Sunday, May 1 to deal with floodwater from the south that swamped the intersection of highways 7 and 68, surrounded the Friendly Flowers Garden Centre and flooded Riverdale Place Homes' group home, southwest of town on Highway 68. It also put thousands of acres of farmland under water.

"The water was really high in Arborg on May 1. It was an inch below the bridge [on PR 326] over the Icelandic River," said Doug Anderson, public information officer for the Northeast Interlake Emergency Measures Organization, last Wednesday. "It dropped a couple of inches on May 2 and dropped some more on May 3. Today [May 4] it's about a foot or so from the bottom of the bridge so that's good news."

Riverdale's group home had been diked by a tiger dam, but the water moved so fast and spilled over the top of the dam, he said. Apart from that dwelling, there were no flooded basements or homes lost to water and no evacuations were necessary.

About 20 homes were sandbagged and tiger dams were placed around the hospital and the personal care home as a precaution, said Anderson. Had the health facilities flooded, patients and residents would have most likely been moved to Winnipeg.

"This flood in Arborg rivals the 1974 flood," he said. "The same thing happened then: the water came from the south and backed up at Highway 68. The same house was flooded at that time."

The province decided to close the intersection of highways 7 and 68 because a culvert had washed out.

That's when it was decided that they needed to get the water moving towards the river.

"We had an emergency meeting and decided to pump water from the south side of 68 to the north side of the highway and into the Icelandic River because by that time the river was able to handle more water," said Anderson.

About 10 tractors and pumps were rounded up and set in place on Tuesday night, half a kilometre west of the intersection, he said. They were able to lower the water by a few inches.

Anderson said he asked the province how long it might take to repair the intersection of highways 7 and 68. The province wasn't sure, saying it could be "days or weeks."

The Icelandic River flows east to Riverton, and Anderson said it looks as though Riverton won't be affected by floodwater.

"This year Riverton doesn't seem to be an issue. But in previous years, with ice backing up the water at the bridge, it was a problem. We had a major emergency along the river in 2011," he said.

Although Arborg was spared the worst of the flooding, the surrounding Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton hasn't been so lucky.

"The municipality has been contending with a huge amount of overland flooding. As we speak, there are thousands of acres underwater that has yet to drain," said Anderson. "A lot of dirt and gravel roads have had water across them and they're too soft to drive on."

That's created an issue for livestock producers who rely on daily deliveries of feed for animals such as pigs and chickens, he said. And cattle producers are "in a fix" because they're short of feed. Cows are also calving and wet ground is not good for calves.

Arborg-Bifrost Fire Department chief Leroy Loewen said the community really came together to help with the flood mitigation efforts, includ-

ing supplying some of the pumps and tractors to move floodwater over Highway 68 into the river.

"Some of the pumps were supplied by the RM and some came from private contractors," said Loewen last Thursday. "Local community members supplied the tractors. It was a joint effort."

The fire department organized and helped get sandbags made for home-

owners and others who needed to protect their properties.

"We were filling the sandbags at the RM building. The fire department facilitated that and helped fill the bags, but we had tremendous community support with that," said Loewen. "We filled a total of 29,000 sandbags. It was a massive undertaking. We were making well over 1,000 bags an hour. I give full credit to the community."





Friends and family helped out quickly with sandbagging and saved Friendly Flowers Garden Centre from being flooded.

After knocking on doors throughout Inwood to gauge interest, the duo started a Facebook group in late April to attract women throughout the region to join their ATV trek.

"We had some really good conversations. People actually brightened up, and they were excited," said Vaughn.

Within two weeks, the group grew to over 90 members.

"We're both experienced riders and the thought of getting together with a group of women just felt right," said Campbell.

"It's a reason to get out and have fun on the trails."

The duo also wants to encourage women to try a new sport they may not have considered before.

"We interpret it as being a more male-dominated sport, and we know a lot of women who do have access to machines, but they're not confident to go out with their friends," said Camp-

"There are women who said their quads are gathering dust."

The group will explore trails that range in difficulty, obstacles and location to teach inexperienced riders how to approach challenges like getting stuck, safe driving and scouting.

"It's a judgment-free zone," said Campbell.

With input from the Facebook group, Campbell and Vaughn want to plan a variety of ATV outings for riders to bring their children, their parents or to have adult-only time.

"We want to try and invite as many women in as we can," said Campbell.

"It's an opportunity to just be women and do girl stuff."

At their first group meeting on May 4, Campbell and Vaughn tackled ATV safety, permits and trail etiquette.

"We've been heavily researching existing trails, respecting the land and also the landowner," said Campbell.

"We want to build positive relationship with our community," said Vaughn.

They also want to ensure every group ride is prepared for any situa-

At the May 4 meeting, Vaughn guided viewers in-person and online on supplies to include in an emergency

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Dr. George Johnson Middle School career day sets students' sights on the future

Students in grades 5 to 8 at Dr. George Johnson Middle School in Gimli said they really liked learning about different jobs during career day held at the school last Friday.

The event, which took place in the school's gym, featured 15 participants from Gimli and surrounding communities, as well as from Winnipeg. Gimli businesses such as Pharmasave and Lucky Stone Bookshop, and organizations such as the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority and the Winnipeg Police Services' cybercrime unit, took part in the day, telling students about their jobs and what training they'd need to have.

Grade 5 student Izaiah said career day was a good opportunity to learn about different jobs, and that he already knows what he wants to do when he graduates from high school.

"I think it's really cool to see different people and their careers so you can focus on what career you might want to pick," said Izaiah. "I really like the Winnipeg Police Services. Since I was little, I always wanted to be in the police. I would like to work in Gimli. I'd like to be in the canine RCMP unit."

Izaiah may be a shoo-in for the job as he has pets and knows how to handle dogs.

The career fair was organized by counsellor and resource teacher Kelly Croy. She invited people to spend a few hours at the school and answer questions about their jobs. Participants weren't required to deliver a presentation, only chat informally with students.

"I do career day every year, but CO-VID, of course, cancelled the last two years. We like to focus on careers and have real people come in so that the kids can ask them questions," said Croy. "When they're thinking about their future careers, this creates hope for them and something to look forward to. It also promotes what's happening in the community."



Cimli bookstore owner and semi-retired teacher Kristine Dubois said she has to find books as well as sell them. She has a list of requested titles, stocks her store with in-demand books and is always bringing in new titles.

Croy also invited students from Winnipeg Beach School to attend the event later that morning.

Grade 5 and 6 teacher Pam Einarson said the students were free to take notes on what each career entailed. They were given a list of questions they could ask the participants, in addition to coming up with their own questions.

"Kelly gave the students a question sheet that provided them with direction about what to ask. They asked questions such as what do you like about your job, what education do you need, what is a typical day like and what are the disadvantages of this job. The students go around to each table and ask questions," said Einarson.

Grade 6 students Henrik and James said career day helped them learn about what job options are available.

"I think it's really great to have all these people come here. We can learn about other people's careers, and what they do and what you have to earn [degrees or diplomas] to get into them," said Henrik.

Municipalities to receive \$15 million to support road repairs

To recognize the impact of recent severe weather on Manitoba's roads and highway infrastructure, the province is investing \$15 million in a onetime grant program that will provide municipalities with financial support for road reconstruction, rehabilitation and preservation projects, Premier Heather Stefanson announced Mon-

"Manitoba municipalities are facing significant road infrastructure challenges as a result of this year's extraordinary weather conditions," said Stefanson. "Above-average precipitation and colder-than-average temperatures have caused a substantial increase in the number and severity of potholes on roads throughout the province, and inflation and supply chain issues have also added to this challenge. In addition to our Budget 2022 investments in highways and municipalities, we are pleased to offer this extra support to reduce the financial burden on the City of Winnipeg and all municipalities during these unique times."

As part of this grant program, the province will distribute \$15 million to Manitoba's 137 municipalities on a per-capita basis, with the City of Winnipeg to receive nearly \$9 million of the total, the premier noted.

"After one of the snowiest winters on record and a freeze/thaw cycle that is finally letting up in May, Winnipeggers are now facing a pothole season like no other," said Mayor Brian Bowman, City of Winnipeg. "With a forecasted shortfall of over \$56 million in the City of Winnipeg budget as a result of pandemic impacts, this is a welcome funding announcement from the Province of Manitoba to help with the pothole issues being felt across the province. This funding would build on another historic road construction season in Winnipeg of \$164.7 million."

Municipalities will be granted the funding for costs related to road infrastructure improvements, including accessing repair materials and addressing workforce shortages, the premier added.

"The Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM) commends the Province of Manitoba for investing \$15 million to help support municipal infrastructure repairs," said Kam Blight, president, AMM. "As municipal roads connect local communities and support economic growth, these additional dollars help underscore the importance of long-term predictable funding to properly maintain and protect municipal infrastructure within our communities."

The funding is in addition to any disaster assistance municipalities could receive due to excessive flooding. Full details of this grant will be made available to municipalities in the coming weeks.

"The funds the Government of Manitoba is making available immediately are sorely needed by municipalities throughout Manitoba to address the extraordinary issues with roads and streets this spring," said Chris Lor-enc, president, Manitoba Heavy Construction Association. "The Manitoba

government's recognition of this as emergency assistance is a sign a bigger conversation regarding long-term solutions is needed to help municipalities regularly maintain infrastruc-

The grant is equivalent to a five per cent increase to the comprehensive operating and infrastructure funding support municipalities receive annually through Manitoba's basket funding model, the Strategic Municipal Investment Fund.

"Our government is committed to working collaboratively with municipalities to build and maintain safe and reliable streets, which contribute to healthy and vibrant communities," said Stefanson. "This basket funding model reduces red tape and allows municipalities the flexibility to set priorities based on their communi-

The premier noted Budget 2022 supports the government's three-year \$1.5-billion commitment to enhance the safety and connectivity of Manitoba's highway network with more than \$578 million allocated to highway projects this year alone. Additionally, Budget 2022 provides \$313 million in funding to municipalities to ensure they have the support they need to invest in what matters most to their communities, said Stefanson.

Einarson earns fourth GSOC women's title with Champions Cup win

From Grand Slam of Curling

Kerri Einarson capped off the Pinty's Grand Slam of Curling season by capturing her fourth career women's title in the series.

Einarson and her Gimli rink defeated Eun-Ji Gim's team from South Korea 10-6 during the KIOTI Tractor Champions Cup women's final Sunday at the Olds Sportsplex.

The team of Einarson, third Val Sweeting, second Shannon Birchard and lead Briane Meilleur earned \$25,000 from the \$210,000 combined prize purse.

While the end of the Olympic cycle has signaled a flurry of lineup changes, Team Einarson will remain intact for next season, and for good reasons as they also claimed two Princess Auto Players' Championship titles plus three consecutive Canadian women's championships during their four years together.

"It definitely wasn't easy starting off, that's for sure," Einarson said while reflecting on the quadrennial. "We've put in a lot of work on and off the ice. My teammates have done a lot. They've been through a lot of physical and been through a lot of mental work. We work hard at the game and we're always looking to get better and better."

Although Team Einarson posted a 3-2 record through pool play, a poor draw-to-the-button shootout score dropped them into a tiebreaker scenario against Team Eun-Jung Kim of South Korea. Einarson clipped Kim 7-4 to qualify for the playoffs then ousted Ottawa's Team Rachel Homan 5-3 in the quarter-finals and Sweden's Team Anna Hasselborg 6-4 in the semifinals during a marathon threedraw Saturday with elimination on

the line.

"It feels pretty amazing, especially to end the season on a win," Einarson said. "We played so well all week. We had a couple losses, back-to-back losses, but we never let that get us down. On Saturday, we really battled out there, played three games and I'm beat."

It might have been the closest draw-to-the-button shootout for the hammer to start a final as Team Gim landed just 0.7 cm away from the pinhole but Team Einarson edged them out finishing 0.1 cm from the dot. That proved to be crucial as Einarson drew for two in the opening end.

"Hammer is so important and that draw to the button is crucial," Einarson said. "You can tell by how it threw us in a tiebreaker. We just battled through it and it's tough to keep a lead, that's for sure. We've been there before."

Einarson drew to the button once more in the second and Gim followed the out-turn path; however, her shooter ran heavy to give up a steal and slip behind 3-0.

Gim, playing in her first GSOC final, was able to get back into it in the third end with a bump for two points to close the gap down to 3-2.

Einarson broke the game open in the fourth end. Gim crashed on her own guard and Einarson capitalized big time with a draw to score four to make it 7-2.

The game was far from over though. Gim pulled off the high-pressure inoff shot to the button to score her single point while facing six counters and the intrigue continued into the sixth end. Einarson let Team Gim off of the hook and was light on her last while facing three counters. Although

Birchard and Meilleur were on it from the start, they were unable to drag it far enough into the four-foot circle to give up a steal of two that cut the deficit in half 7-5.

Gim closed within one in the seventh as Einarson's slash double attempt to score two missed the back counter to concede another stolen point.

"Team Gim played really well," Einarson said. "They started off a little shaky at first but then in the last half of the game they put some pressure on us. Just came short on a draw but we just squeaked it out."

Einarson looked more like herself in the final frame making a routine double takeout on her first skip stone to sit two stones and lower some of the tension. Gim drew for shot rock into the four-foot circle mostly buried — keyword being mostly as Einarson was still able to punch it out and add three points for insurance.

"We're very gritty and resilient,"

Einarson said. "We just never give up. We just keep making shots and putting pressure on our opponents. I'm very proud of my teammates and they definitely make my job easy."

The team of Gim, third Min-Ji Kim, second Su-Jin Kim and lead Ye-Eun Seol picked up \$15,000 from the purse for finishing runners-up.

Earlier, Brad Gushue and his crew from St. John's, N.L., upended Kevin Koe's Calgary club 8-5 in the men's final. Gushue captured his 13th career GSOC men's championship and 12th with second Brett Gallant, who now departs the team to play with Brendan Bottcher.



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

John was born Jan Piechuta on the family farm near Sokolow, Poland in 1928. As a child, he attended school in the nearby town, while also contributing significantly to the farm's operation. All this forever changed with the outbreak of war in 1939, and deportation of his family to a labour camp in northern Russia in 1940, where he lost his father and brother to disease. This led John to leave

his studies at the make shift school and commence work with adults to help earn the credits necessary for the family to eat and survive. Although a challenging and tragic time in his life, John never lost his sense of hope or faith in humanity. Much later, he occasionally shared stories of adventure in the Russian wilderness.

When a brief amnesty was declared in late 1941, his family was allowed to migrate to Uzbekistan $\,$ in southern Russia. There, John enlisted in the Polish JSK cadet program, while his family continued their journey to refugee camps in East Africa. John remained in this cadet program at various locations in Israel, until the war ended in 1945, and then continued to the Polish Merchant Navy College in England, where he studied until 1947. Then, as a qualified seaman, he began a five year career on various ocean freighters that took him to all corners of the globe.

John reunited with family in Winnipeg in 1952 and began a 40 year career with Dominion Bridge Co. There, he managed construction teams that built innumerable structural steel bridges, buildings and towers to serve a diversity of infrastructure needs.

Canada provided John with an abundance of opportunities. Here, he met his loving wife Lucy, and together they raised their family in a manner that embraced the Canadian culture and experience, but also honoured their shared Polish heritage. John and Lucy enjoyed socializing with friends, ball room dancing, travel, sailing, canoeing, camping, fishing, reading, and daily walks. Later on, they developed a unique cottage at Steep Rock on the shores of Lake Manitoba, where they thoroughly enjoyed the serenity, simplicity, solitude and beauty.

John's spirituality and trust in God were ever present in his life, and provided him the courage and strength to endure the difficult times and appreciate the good. He exuded a confident, yet humble charisma, and his strength of character drew people toward him. John possessed a firm manner as a father, yet readily gave of his time and his wisdom. He shared generously with family, friends and charities, even if it required tempering his own personal aspirations.


