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### Arborg's Riverdale Place Workshop celebrates 50 years of caring for adults with intellectual challenges

Arborg's Riverdale Place Workshop invited the community to help it celebrate 50 years of caring for and providing employment to local and area adults with intellectual challenges.

The workshop's celebration last Friday included speeches from dignitaries, recognition of the dedicated staff who provide care to participants and a tour of the workshop. There was also food, live music and opportunities to chat with participants. One of the participants, Marilyn, has been part of the workshop for 48 of its 50 years. Some participants took to the dance floor with staff for an upbeat rendition of the song Stand By Me.

Interlake-Gimli MLA Derek Johnson attended the celebration and presented workshop manager Alex Janower with a plaque, congratulating the not-for-profit organization for its support and employment of adults with intellectual challenges, as well as recognizing the workshop's role in environmental stewardship through its recycling operation.

Janower has been with the workshop for 38 years and refers to it as a second family for him.

Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman James Bezan also attended the event and presented Janower and the workshop with a plaque for its 50 years of outstanding community service.

The workshop, which opened in May 1975, provides social services and paid employment opportunities to adults with disabilities in Arborg, Bifrost-Riverton and surrounding communities such as Fisher Branch and Poplarfield. In addition to learn-

pality of Bifrost-Riverton and helps keep the local landfill free of recyclable waste. In 2023, the workshop diverted over 235,000 kilograms of recyclables from the landfill.

The workshop saw its participant numbers decline with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. Participant attendance is funded by the provincial government, which earlier this year intended to stop funding the workshop but reversed course after a groundswell of opposition.

Johnson said he had nearly 120,000 hits on his Facebook page after he and his office embarked on a letter-writing campaign to encourage the province to continue its funding support for adults with intellectual challenges.

The workshop is encouraging people with loved ones with intellectual



### Gimli council's 2025 budget expects increased revenue; spending almost \$13 million on projects

Property taxes increasing by 3.52 per cent on average for existing properties

Gimli council's 2025 budget is aiming to set the municipality on a course of growth and development while supporting community well-being over the long term.

Council expects to see almost double the amount of revenue it had brought in last year and will embark on ambitious capital spending to propel the municipality forward.

Council expects to bring in \$30,630,786 in revenue for this new fiscal year. In 2024, the RM's total revenue was \$17,345,732 and it spent a total of \$16,903,948.

Coun. Thora Palson, chair of finance and administration, presented the budget during a public hearing on May 13.

Palson said she's proud to see the RM take "bold steps" through a number of initiatives that will "mark the beginning of a new chapter of sustained growth and development for Gimli."

Those initiatives include the RM investing in local health services through the support of a new private medical centre, practising environmental stewardship through a wetland development project, improving connectivity in the RM through the enhancement of its outdoor trail system, and investing in digital infrastructure to improve communications, she said.

Mayor Kevin Chudd issued a state-

ment saying the budget "reflects our unwavering commitment to enhancing our community's infrastructure, public works, and recreational facilities. Our vision is to ensure Gimli remains a happy, comfortable, and safe place for everyone, while positioning ourselves as a premier destination in Manitoba."

The 2025 budget reflects council's priorities for programs and services in the new fiscal year and the overall strategic direction of the municipality. It also lays out projects it would like to get underway over the next five years. The budget, the financial plan presentation and the mayor's statement are available on the RM's website.

The financial plan presentation states council will continue to minimize taxation impacts and existing debt servicing so as not to place "undue financial burdens on its resi-

The RM's mill rate decreased from 14.788 to 12.527, a decrease of 2.261. However, 2025 provincial property assessments could result in some people paying more, fewer or about the same taxes.

The RM of Gimli's taxes will increase by 3.52 per cent on average for existing properties.

"Total municipal taxes are 4.53% higher than last year. Of this increase, 1.01% is generated from new assessments-such as new homes, businesses, and other developments coming on stream in 2025. This means the actual increase in taxes collected from existing properties (those that also paid taxes in 2024) is 3.52%," states the plan. "Reassessment may result in individual properties paying more, less, or about the same in taxes, depending on how their assessment

changed relative to the average. On average, municipal taxes are increasing by 3.52% for existing properties."

Rural property owners in the RM will pay about \$78 more in tax for a \$200,000 home.

"For a residential property assessed at \$200,000, the 2024 municipal taxes in the rural area were \$1,504. Considering an overall average of 21.5% increase in property assessment for 2025, the municipal taxes will be \$1,582. This represents an annual In-

crease of \$78.00 per \$200,000," states the plan. "The increase is due to the rise in the 2025 provincial property assessment."

Urban property owners in the RM will pay about \$80 more in tax for a \$200,000 home.

"For a residential property assessed at \$200,000, the 2024 municipal taxes in the urban area were \$1,551. With a 21.5% overall average increase in



### IWRC extends mobile counselling and support programs to Fisher Branch

The Interlake Women's Resource Centre (IWRC) has expanded its reach once again, adding Fisher Branch to the growing list of communities it serves. With this addition, the IWRC now supports individuals across 14 towns in southern Manitoba.

The decision to expand north was driven by demand, as clients from the Fisher Branch area were already travelling to access services elsewhere.

"We have had an overwhelming number of clients accessing the centre, and often for more than just family violence," said IWRC executive director LiAnne Snow. "We are continuously exploring ways to expand our programming to better meet the diverse needs of the communities we serve."

The IWRC was first established 41 years ago as a grassroots initiative in Gimli and Riverton, providing support to women experiencing domestic violence and abuse. In the early days, a small team of volunteers offered crisis support, transported clients to shelters, and educated individuals about the cycle of violence. The organization was renamed in 1991, evolving from the Interlake Spouse Abusal Committee to its current form, and hired a second outreach worker a few years later to meet rising demand.

Today, its services have grown far beyond crisis response. The IWRC now offers mobile counselling, with the help of rural partners that donate office space as needed, as well as regular programming like yoga, beading workshops and a widow's group. A community cupboard is also available, stocked with essential items for those in need.

"This new location allows us to expand our reach and provide more accessible support to individuals and families facing challenges related to family violence and mental health," said Snow.

The organization's mission has also broadened to support people of all gender identities. "Everyone deserves access to support, regardless of gender, background or circumstance, and I'm proud to contribute to a place

that truly embodies that belief," said Snow.

IWRC now operates full-time from a three-bedroom bungalow at 87 5th Ave. in Gimli — a space that was donated to the centre in 2006.

"Working at Interlake Women's Resource means so much more to me than just a job — it's a passion," Snow added. "Creating a safe, welcoming, and inclusive space where people feel seen, heard and valued is something I care deeply about."

## Manitoba Hydro repairing damage, restoring power in wildfire zone

Manitoba Hydro crews are working to restore power in areas of eastern Manitoba affected by wildfires, including parts of the Lee River area and Wendigo Road.

About 900 customers along the Lee River had power restored late Wednesday, but roughly 500 others remained without electricity Thursday morning as fires continued to impact infrastructure.

Crews are now gaining access to areas with significant damage, including burned and downed poles, power lines, transformers and other equipment. Construction teams staged in Lac du Bonnet overnight and began repairs Thursday morning where access became possible.

Due to the extent of the damage, Hydro says repairs may be complex and it is too early to estimate full restoration times.

Meanwhile, Manitoba Hydro evacuated its generating stations at Pointe du Bois and Slave Falls late Wednesday as wildfires threatened road access. The facilities were safely shut down, with generating units offline and water flowing through spillways. The loss of generation will not affect customers, the utility said.

Hydro continues to monitor the evolving wildfire situation, with aerial patrols underway to assess further damage.

# **Record-breaking weather**

On May 17 Gimli experienced notably cool and overcast conditions, -3.3 C. These temperatures were significantly below the seasonal average for mid-May in Gimli, when typical highs are around 18 C.

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# **Policy matters**

A former prime minister once quipped from the campaign trail that 'an election is no time to talk about serious issues." When it comes to providing opportunities for Canadians, however, policy matters far more than partisan politics. We have had a federal election, and a cabinet has been appointed. We now need the government to have a laser-like focus on the fundamentals of good policy.

I have heard farmers express the view that agriculture is an afterthought around the cabinet table. The sector makes up about seven per cent of the Canadian gross domestic product, or \$150 billion per year, and employs 2.3 million Canadians, representing one in nine jobs across the country. An acknowledgment by the whole cabinet of the critical contribution that agriculture makes to the Canadian economy would be a good way for the new federal government to offset farmers' frustration about the placement of agriculture in national policy priorities.

Trade must be the priority issue for the new minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food. In 2024, Canadian agriculture and food exports exceeded \$100 billion, yet the policies that will support and expand Canadian agriculture and food exports are not always considered when Canada's trade positions are set. A positive key first step signaling a shift in focus for agriculture policy would be the explicit inclusion of agriculture in the "Team Canada" missions that are part of our outreach with U.S. customers and policy makers.

While agriculture, like most Canadian industries, has rightfully focused on the threat of U.S. tariffs in the past

few months, protectionism is growing around the world. Canadian pork and seafood exports to China face a 25 per cent tariff. Canola products have been hit with a 100 per cent tariff by the Chinese government. Canadian agriculture and food exports have been sidelined by European non-tariff barriers, despite the Canada–European Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA). Growing protectionism is compounded by rising political uncertainty, with the war in Ukraine and instability in the Middle East just two examples. Canada needs a strategic plan to deal with these threats.

The new federal minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, Heath MacDonald, could hit the ground running if he were to set up, together with representatives from export agriculture, a task group with the mandate to develop a strategic plan for agriculture and agri-food trade. This joint government and industry task group should set out to answer three basic questions. First, in the short term, how does Canada mitigate the impact of tariffs and potential tariffs on agriculture and food exports? Second, what is the strategic plan to eliminate non-tariff and tariff trade barriers currently blocking Canadian agriculture and food exports? And third, what is the strategic plan to diversify markets for Canadian agriculture and food ex-

The overarching goal of the task group should be to set out a clear plan that will preserve the integrated North American market for agriculture and food products, and to eliminate tariff and non-tariff trade barriers around the world.

The effort to develop a strategic plan for agriculture and food trade cannot only be carried out by governments. There is also work to be done by farm groups and industry stakeholders. There are over 400 farm groups

across Canada. This means that governments do not always receive a coherent consensus position from the sector. It is incumbent upon farmers, those who represent farmers, along with food processors and manufacturers, to develop clear policy proposals aimed at the expansion of agriculture and food exports. If the minister receives 400 different opinions, they face a risky policy position where any action would be subject to opposition by somebody. Lack of consensus within agriculture opens the door for governments to do nothing.

Agriculture and food trade is not just a matter of economic policy, it is also a national security issue, given the increasingly less stable geopolitical environment. This is especially true for the three countries who are signatories to the Canada –U.S –Mexico Agreement (CUSMA). Canadian farmers can help deliver a reliable and safe food supply for consumers. This value from Canadian agriculture must be demonstrated in the strategic plan for agriculture and food trade and emphasized in upcoming trade discussions, including the impending review of CUSMA.


The recent election campaign saw the major parties promising a new approach to trade policy to respond to growing protectionism in both North America and around the world. The new federal government, including the new minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, has an opportunity to put these promises into action for farmers, processors and the millions of Canadians who work in the sector. Current disruptions to world trade can be turned into opportunities for Canadian agriculture but only if we see bold and decisive policy. The alternatives will be bad for farmers, bad for Canadian value-added processing and undermine the potential for growth in the Canadian economy.


Last year, Blue Bombers receiver Nic Demski attended every workshop a highlight for many of the participating students.

# Spring Home & Garden Guide



### 4 annuals that will add height to your flowerbeds

Annuals often feature abundant a type that doesn't grow taller than blooms that are positively eye-catching. While it's relatively easy to find low, medium-sized flowers, it can be difficult to get your hands on large, majestic ones. Here are four annuals that stand tall and proud.

1. Dahlia. Some varieties of this beautiful flower can grow up to two metres in height. However, it's best to stick to a single colour and find



one-and-a-half metres.

- 2. Cosmos. This thin and delicate flower is available in beautiful pastels like white and pink. It'll wow your neighbours and attract butterflies and birds to your yard.
- 3. Cleome. This beautiful ballshaped flower is often overlooked at greenhouses and nurseries because it rarely blooms at the start of spring. Give it a chance — you won't regret
- 4. Canna. This bulbous plant tends to bloom late in the season. Therefore, it's best to plant it indoors four to six weeks before the last frost. Better yet, you can buy dwarf varieties that fill out quickly.

Horticulturists and landscapers generally recommend limiting yourself to two or three colours and three or four species to maximize their visual impact.

### Tips for gardening in a shady yard

Even if your yard doesn't get much sunlight, it's still possible to grow a beautiful garden. The key is to select shade-tolerant species. Here are some suggestions.

#### **Perennials**

In addition to hostas, which thrive in shady conditions, many perennials don't require much sunlight. Consider planting:

- Leopard plants, whose yellow flowers are sure to brighten dim
- Coral bells, which are great for lining the edges of a flower bed
- Undergrowth ferns such as ostrich, lady and wood ferns
- Bugbane, which has spikes of wispy white flowers on tall stems
- Forget-me-nots, which have

beautiful blue springtime blooms

There are also a number of ground cover plants that are well-suited for shady conditions such as bugleweed, lily of the valley and creeping dogwood.

#### Shrubs

There are several types of ornamental shrubs that can add height and texture to a shady garden, including:

- Holly
- Dogwood
- Squirrel corn
- Rhododendrons
- Some hydrangeas


In addition to looking for shadetolerant species, be sure to consider the hardiness zone you live in when selecting plants for your garden.

# Five tips for taking care of rose bushes Make your yard a paradise for pollinators



Roses can easily become the star of your garden. While the climbing varieties are tricky to care for, rose bushes present less of a challenge. Here are some tips for taking care of them.

#### 1. Water them sufficiently

Roses need to be watered on a regular basis, especially in the spring. Do so early in the morning and apply mulch to help the soil retain moisture. Water the base of the plant to avoid getting the leaves wet.

#### 2. Fertilize them sparingly

Rose bushes don't need to be fertilized every year. However, if the soil is lacking in nutrients, you can apply a natural, nitrogen-rich fertilizer in the spring to stimulate new growth. In July, opt for a phosphorus mixture to promote flowering.

#### 3. Prune them annually

In spring, remove branches that are diseased, damaged or growing inward before the buds open. Keep healthy canes but cut them back by about a third of their length. Always prune just above a bud that's pointing outward from the plant.

#### 4. Rejuvenate them periodically

Rose bushes benefit from being severely pruned back every five years or so. This is an effective way to rejuvenate the plant and encourage new growth. Identify a few older canes and cut them just above ground level.

#### 5. Check them frequently

Rose bushes are susceptible to diseases such as powdery mildew, rust and black spot. They also attract a number of harmful insects including aphids, caterpillars and beetles. Inspect your plants regularly and treat them as needed.

Find everything you need to care for your rose bushes at your local nursery or garden centre.

you want to help protect these vital species, consider growing nectar plants in your yard. This will provide a food source for the insects and birds that pollinate your community's gardens, orchards and fields.

#### **Choosing plants**

There are many kinds of flowering species that can beautify your yard while also creating an inviting space for pollinators. Sunflowers, anemones, goldenrods, echinacea and hydrangeas are all great picks. Pollinators are attracted to a number of annuals as well, including borage, centaury and cosmos.

- Plant species with varied bloom times so you have flowers from spring to fall

property assessment for 2025, the municipal taxes will be \$1,631. This results in an annual average increase of \$80 per each \$200,000," states the plan. "The increase is due to the rise in 2025 the provincial property assessment."

The province replaced the education property tax credit with the homeowners' affordability tax credit, which offers "up to \$1,500 in school tax relief" for principal residences. Seasonal properties will no longer receive education tax rebates, returning to pre-2021 norms.

Property owners outside Winnipeg can access their 2025 assessment on the province's website by creating an account on the MyPropertyMB digital portal.

Council intends to spend almost \$13 million (\$12,812,620) on capital projects in 2025.

Of that \$12.8 million, \$582,500 will be borne by borrowing and \$12,230,120 will be borne by the general fund.

Capital projects include a needs assessment for the public works facility (\$50,000), a lighting retrofit at the Evergreen Library (\$13,000), pick up tracks [sic] (\$70,000), Grader MG33 (\$574,031.46), wheeled loader (\$310,000), lighting in the central business district and Second Avenue parking lot (\$300,000), Fifth Avenue sidewalk between Lady



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of the Lake and Centre (\$75,000), paved roads renewal (\$700,000), electrical lighting for Viking Park (\$40,000), road sweeper (\$200,000), dormotory [sic] commercial appraisal (\$15,000), banners and flags and other ceremonial items to develop cultural inclusion (\$10,000), wastewater treatment plan concrete restoration works (\$250,000), Fourth Avenue watermain (engineering) \$40,000 and renewal (\$2,330,000) that will be cost shared with Manitoba Water Services Board, fire department aerial platform truck (\$1,672,000), floor cleaner (\$15,000), trailer (\$20,000), hall water system (\$4,500), training ground improvements (\$20,000), wildland gear (\$10,000), airport resurfacing (\$50,000), Gimli recreation and leisure youth hub (\$250,000), Fitness centre designs (\$25,000) and goal [fitness centre] \$943,032.50, beach walkway and boardwalk lights (\$300,000) and promenades (\$148,992), site plan recreation plaza and strategic plan plaza goal (\$2,000,000), municipal building stairs (\$50,000), wetland site prep (\$50,000), wetland strategic plan conceptual drawings (\$45,000) and wetland strategic plan community visioning (45,000).

Over \$7.2 million (\$7,271,926) was transferred out of the RM's reserve funds.

The opening balance of the RM's general reserve fund had \$4,455,055 and \$3,688,538.73 was transferred out. The opening balance of the equipment reserve was \$1,994,382 and \$948,015.73 was transferred out. The opening balance of the amalgamated accumulated surplus reserve had zero. The road reserve fund's opening balance was \$2,798,441 and \$750,000 was transferred out. The federal gas tax reserve opening balance was \$1,830,524 and \$320,000 was transferred out. The building reserve opening balance was 1,947,651 and \$1,089,088 was transferred out. The fire reserve fund opening balance was \$950,796 and \$185,331 was transferred out. The Industrial Park Reserve opening balance shows 1,137,819 and no money was transferred out. The Multiplex/Recreation Reserve opening balance was \$290,953 and all of it was transferred out.

The Express reached out to Coun. Richard Petrowski for comment on the budget as he wasn't able to attend the public hearing.

"I would like to thank all the staff that stepped up during this challenging time to put the budget together by the deadline," said Petrowski, referring to the recent resignations of former CAO Trilbee Stirling-Kattler and a senior finance person, both of whom had been working on the 2025 budget.

Petrowski said he voted in favour of the budget — he voted by telephone — although he has some concerns with it.

"I did support the budget even though I do have concerns about certain aspects of it such as the amount coming out of reserve funds, the hiring of consultants and the high cost for legal services," said Petrowski. "But it's important that we as council members have to make concessions in order to come to a consensus so that we can move forward."

The budget meeting included a presentation and 2025 recreation budget from Brenna Philp, the RM's director of recreation and leisure, and a presentation from Ron Hahlweg, the RM's director of operations.

The Express reached out to the RM's interim CAO Ernie Epp, asking where the anticipated increase in total revenue for 2025 is coming from and whether the RM has a policy regarding re-

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### **Federal Liberal government to provide** income tax cut to help with cost of living

The federal Liberal government announced last week that it will bring in legislation to provide a tax cut for nearly 22 million Canadians.

Finance and national revenue minister Francois-Philippe Champagne announced the tax relief measure last Wednesday, saying Canadians expected to see a plan for change to address the high cost of living when they voted for a Liberal government, and that the government is now delivering that change.

The tax cut aims to provide relief to middle-class workers. Those with incomes in the two lowest tax brackets - those with taxable income under \$114,750 in 2025 and those with taxable income of \$57,375 and below in 2025 — will receive the bulk of the tax relief measure.

"With today's middle-class tax cut, we are setting the stage for economic growth by helping hard-working Canadians keep more of their paycheques to spend on the priorities that matter most to them. Every Canadian should be able to afford necessities, feel secure and get ahead financially — and this tax cut will help them do just that," said Champagne in a May 14 news release. "As Canadians continue to feel the impact of ongoing challenges including trade and tariff

uncertainties, they should be able to keep more of what they earn to help build a stronger future and a more resilient Canada."

Once legislated, the lowest marginal personal income tax rate will be reduced from 15 per cent to 14 per cent effective July 1, states the news

The tax cut is expected to deliver over \$27 billion in tax savings to Canadians over five years, starting in 2025-26. Two-income families are expected to save up to \$840 a year in

To reflect a one-percentage-point cut in the lowest tax rate coming into effect halfway through the year, the full-year tax rate for 2025 will be 14.5 per cent and the full-year rate for 2026 and future tax years will be 14 per cent, states the release.

The Canada Revenue Agency will update its source deduction tables for the July to December 2025 period so that pay administrators are able to reduce tax withholdings as of July 1. This means that, effective July 1, individuals with employment income and other income subject to source deductions could have tax withheld at 14 per cent. Otherwise, individuals will realize this tax relief when they file their 2025 tax returns in spring



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### Manitoba Coin Club shares rich currency history with rural Manitoba

Spring coin show set for May 31 in Morden with Royal Canadian Mint on site for coin exchange

The Manitoba Coin Club is heading back on the road with a renewed mission to promote numismatics in communities across rural Manitoba.

Numismatics — the study and collection of currency, including coins, tokens, paper money and medals — is one of the world's oldest hobbies. Since 1954, the Manitoba Coin Club has brought collectors together to share in that passion. Over its 70-year history, the club has hosted two national conventions and remains a hub for currency collectors across the province.

"We're always working to expand interest and awareness, especially outside Winnipeg," said Larry Dalman of the Manitoba Coin Club. "Bringing our spring coin shows to rural communities has really helped us connect with a wider audience."

That rural outreach began in 2023, when the club hosted its first-ever Spring Coin Show outside the city — at the Red Barn in the RM of Rockwood. With strong local promotion, including stories in the *Stonewall Teulon Tribune*, the event drew hundreds of visitors from the Interlake and southern Manitoba.

"People came who had never heard of the club but were already collectors in their own way," Dalman said. "They brought coins and bills to learn more about them, to get appraisals, and to buy pieces to build their collections."

Encouraged by the turnout, the club brought its 2024 Spring Show to Steinbach, again reaching new hobbyists through local media and community interest.

A popular highlight at each show is the Royal Canadian Mint's coin exchange booth, where attendees can trade cash for five newly minted commemorative coins at face value. Visitors also receive two free passes for a tour of the mint's Winnipeg facility.

"Having the mint attend our shows adds a huge draw," Dalman said. "People get a chance to collect brand new coins and see where they're made."

This year's spring coin show will take place in Morden on Saturday, May 31 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Morden Access Event Centre (111-D Gilmour St.). The Royal Canadian Mint will be on site for the full event, offering its coin exchange and sharing insight into Canada's coin-making process.

The outreach comes as the club prepares for a major milestone — hosting the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association's 2026 Convention and Numismatic Show from July 14 to 19 at the Fairmont Hotel in Winnipeg. That same year, the Winnipeg mint will celebrate its 50th anniversary.

"The mint is a global leader in coin production, making currency for around 80 countries, not just Canada," said Dalman. "It's fitting that Winnipeg will host the national show during such a major anniversary."

Dalman noted that numismatics is more than just collecting — it's a window into the past.

"Coins and currency tell stories," he said. "They've been used for trade, for propaganda, even as emergency money in wartime."

In 17th-century New France, for instance, a shortage of coins led officials to issue playing cards marked with monetary values as temporary promissory notes. During the Second World War, resistance forces in Norway smuggled currency plates out



of the country so allies could print banknotes to support underground movements. And during the fur trade era, beaver pelts were exchanged for goods, with token systems used by companies like the Hudson's Bay Company.

"People don't realize how much history is sitting in their pockets or tucked into a drawer at home," Dalman said. "Numismatics helps bring that history to life."

The Manitoba Coin Club continues to welcome new members of all ages. Monthly meetings, educational sessions and public shows offer opportunities to learn, trade and build collections

"We invite anyone with an interest in coins or currency to stop by the show in Morden," Dalman said. "It's a great way to get started or to connect with others who share the same passion."

# **Tigers defeat Chiefs for** franchise's sixth WHL title

An incredible playoff run has come to an end for the Spokane Chiefs and goaltender Dawson Cowan.

On Friday, the Chiefs played what would become the final game of their season, falling 4-2 to the Medicine Hat Tigers in Game 5 of the Western Hockey League Championship.

Cowan, of Warren, Man., got the start in Game 5 at the Spokane Veterans Memorial Arena with the Chiefs entering the best-of-seven series down three games to one.

Neither team found the net until Tigers defenceman Niilopekka Muhonen broke the game open in the second period with a wrister from the point that beat Cowan glove side for his first goal of the playoffs.

Seventeen-year-old Gavin McKenna added to the Tigers' lead early in the third with his ninth of the postseason, followed shortly after by Hunter St. Martin, who made it 3-0.

The Chiefs responded just under a

minute later on the power play, with Andrew Cristall scoring his leagueleading 21st goal of the playoffs.

Spokane pulled within one less than three minutes later when Assanali Sarkenov scored to make it 3-2 heading into the back half of the final

Scoring stalled until the final minutes, when Tigers defenceman Bryce Pickford sealed the win with an empty-net goal, as Medicine Hat celebrated the sixth Ed Chynoweth Cup in franchise history.

The Tigers now advance to the 2025 Memorial Cup, taking place May 22 to June 1 in Rimouski, Que.

As for the Chiefs, their remarkable season and playoff run has come to an end.

Cowan, 19, made 32 saves in Game 5, bringing his postseason total to 495 across 19 games. He finishes the playoffs second in goaltender wins after leading the WHL with 34 victories in the regular season.

# Gimli Airport playing role in emergency firefighting effort

The Gimli Airport is playing an important role in the provincial government's firefighting efforts of forest and grass fires in Manitoba.

The airport was running full tilt last week to keep a fleet of Babcock water bombers fuelled for the firefight in eastern Manitoba and other locations.

Gimli Coun. Andy Damm said the airport is always ready to step up to help the province in its firefighting efforts.

"CYGM [Gimli Airport] has been and hopefully will continue to be a base for the strategic deployment of provincial airborne firefighting assets," said Damm, a retired commercial airline pilot who has liaised with the provincial and federal governments on airport matters and was recently appointed to the municipality's newly formed Airport Working Group.

Manitoba's fire season got off to an early start this year with extensive swathes of dry territory left unquenched by snowmelt and too little precipitation, coupled with days of intensely hot temperatures and high winds that aided in the alarming spread of some fires.

A man and a woman died in the RM of Lac du Bonnet last week when they could not evacuate during a raging fire. The RCMP recovered their bodies on May 14.

"The RCMP was made aware on May 13th these individuals were trapped in the fire, however, due to extreme conditions, emergency personnel were not able to reach their location until the following day," said the RCMP in a May 14 news release.

Water bombers fighting the fires last week were temporarily interrupted when someone flew a drone near the fire zone, endangering firefighting crews. "RCMP would also like to remind people that the area around the fire zone is a restricted air space, and the use of drones is not permitted, as it significantly impedes the work of all air support fighting the fire," said the service.

The human-caused fire near Lac du Bonnet had grown to 4,008 hectares by last Friday (May 17) and was still burning out of control, according to the province's FireView Map. A massive naturally caused fire that's engulfed Nopiming Provincial Park and areas outside the park in eastern Manitoba was also still burning out of control as of last Friday. It had grown to 101,689 hectares. And a human-caused fire north of Selkirk had grown to 5,000 hectares but was "being held."

Manitoba Hydro crews were restoring power to areas affected by the wildfires in the eastern part of the province. The utility was able to "reenergize" about 900 customers along the Lee River on May 14. About 500 remained without power on May 15 in a number of other areas in the wildfire zone.

"Manitoba Hydro crews are now able to safely access some areas with significant fire damage, including burnt and fallen poles, power lines, transformers and other equipment," said Hydro in a May 15 news release. "Construction crews staged in Lac du Bonnet Wednesday night [May 14] and were able to begin work on Wendigo Road as soon as it became accessible today. The extent of damage is still being assessed and may require complex repairs, so it's too soon to provide estimated times of restoration."

The provincial government announced last month it's upgrading its firefighting fleet with an \$80-mil-

lion investment in three new water bombers, DH Canadair 515 Firefighter aircraft that will be made in Canada.

"Upgrading our fleet with these three new DHC-515 Firefighter waterbombers reflects our commitment to ensure that our frontline firefighters have the tools they need to protect Manitobans," said

Manitoba Premier Wab Kinew in an April 25 news release. "We're protecting the people of Manitoba along with their communities, property and valued forests from the increasing frequency and severity of wildfires in a manner that aligns with our Canadafirst approach by ensuring these aircrafts are made in Canada."

The Gimli Airport is home to four water bombers (CL-415 turbine aircraft), two bird dogs — aircraft that spot fires and help water bombers get into prime attack position — aircraft maintenance personnel and pilots. They play an important role protecting Manitobans, property and the environment.

The RM of Gimli's community engagement manager Christine Payne said the Gimli Airport will continue to provide emergency support services throughout the season.

"Gimli Airport is currently experiencing high operational demand as it supports provincial wildfire suppression efforts. With firefighting aircraft on high alert, fuel consumption has surged — prompting priority resupply efforts to maintain readiness," she said. "While typically not as active, the airport is committed to supporting emergency operations when called upon."

Gimli Airport's manager Brian Renaud ensures the airport "remains operational" through the supply of fuel needed for aircraft and having the communications in place to support the aircraft.

Council approved the creation of the Gimli Airport Working Group at its May 14 meeting. An earlier resolution at council's April 9 meeting had appointed Damm, Renaud and the RM's assistant CAO Kelly Cosgrove to sit on the working group.

They will, among a number of duties, work towards re-negotiating an operating agreement with the provincial government, which owns the airport.

"Once the document [operating agreement with the province] is finalized, the requirement for an AWG will continue although the composition and role may be subject to revision. All decision points during the negotiations and subsequent roles conducted by the RM of Gimli shall be brought to the RM Council prior to commitments being made," states the working group's terms of reference.

The group will also look at matters pertaining to capital investment in the asset, operational responsibilities and associated costs with a view to having a "break-even operating cost with the RM," future staffing levels via RM employees or contracted service providers and future equipment requirements to support and sustain the airport.

The Gimli Airport is considered a "strategic asset from the provincial perspective," according to background material supplied by Payne. And the regional economic spinoffs make it of "critical interest" to the municipality.





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

Rural Municipalities of Armstrong, Bifrost-Riverton, Fisher, and Gimli, the Town of Arborg, and the LUD of Fisher Branch

Notice is hereby given by the Interlake Weed Control Board that, under the terms of the Noxious Weeds Act for Manitoba, it is the responsibility of the property owner, agent, or occupant to destroy or control noxious weeds.

This is the *OFFICIAL NOTICE* for 2025, to destroy or control as specified within Section 3(1), all noxious weeds as often as necessary to prevent the growth, scattering, and ripening of weeds or weed seeds in the Rural Municipalities of Armstrong, Bifrost-Riverton, Fisher, and Gimli, the Town of Arborg, and the LUD of Fisher Branch.
