# Gimli bans dogs on the beach, boardwalk and grass

The air was a little tense during the Gimli council meeting last week as council approved a bylaw that bans dogs from Gimli Beach.

It was a packed house with standing room only in the council chambers to hear Sandy Hook cottager and Winnipeg comedian Jason Beck make a delegation during the meeting. However, this topic was no joke.

Beck spoke in opposition to the RM's decision to ban dogs from Gimli Beach, which includes the sand, the boardwalk and the grassed area behind the boardwalk. Beck says he's been walking a dog on the Gimli boardwalk for 44 years, and he doesn't want to lose that right.

"This is not representative of the wishes of the community. It's going to significantly hurt the business community and discrimi-

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# Arborg and Riverton students showcase their art

If you took a walk through the Bridge Youth Drop-In Centre in Arborg last Friday, you probably would have thought you were looking at artwork with years and years of experience behind it.

But those in attendance were pleasantly surprised to find out that it was from some very talented art students from Arborg Collegiate Institute (ACI) and Riverton Collegiate Institute (RCI) who have been working on their masterpieces since February.

Last Friday, the art students from both schools showcased their work to the public during an art show at the Youth Drop-In Centre. Much like other optional courses such as band, choral, woodwork and metals, art classes are offered to students from both Riverton and Arborg together under the instruction of ACI teacher Rachel Orbanski.

The students presented over 100 pieces of art in several different mediums and themes at the art show.

"I definitely allow students a lot of creative freedom when it comes to their art work," said Orbanski. "We do workshops where I guide them with specific tasks and techniques on how to use certain mediums. So I'll teach them to use a medium, but they can do whatever they like on it within guidelines of school appropriateness."

Some students blended colours with ink and watercolour painting or combined the two while others did intricate drawings with pencil.

"Every two weeks we switch mediums. We cover acrylic paint for a couple weeks and we also cover charcoal

and we teach charcoal-reduction style where they erase some of the picture," explained Orbanski.

"I always allow them to do a free project. Their final project is a medium of their choice. No restrictions."

One student even made a human sculpture out of packing-tape.

"You wrap your body part by part in the packing tape," explained Orbanski. "Sticky side up first and then sticky

side down and you cut it off as you go and then you reassemble it after it's off and you put body parts together after"

Orbanski says that she couldn't have been more impressed with the calibre of art work her students produced this year.


"Every year it's getting better and better and better."

# Moosehorn principal puckers up to kiss a cow

Making good on a bargain for a good cause, the principal of Alf Cuthbert School in Moosehorn puckered up and planted one on a cow named Star.

Principal Alann Fraser had to kiss a cow on the lips after her students read for more than 45,000 minutes during the month of February.

Fraser bet her students that if they together read more than 30,000 total minutes during "I Love to Read Month" in February that she would pucker up and kiss a cow. Her students took that high mark and smashed it, reading 45,348 total minutes.

"I figured they would reach it," said Fraser, who is proud of her students for achieving such a high number of minutes during the shortest month of

"Last year they threw a pie in my face for reaching their goal, so I knew that the opportunity to do something even more embarrassing would be enough to spur them into action."

And it was, with the approximate 90 students at Alf Cuthbert reading nearly 756 total hours in one month.

There were three milestones for the students. After 25,000 minutes

of reading, they were awarded a free period of phys-ed; after 30,000 minutes, Fraser would kiss a cow; and after 50,000 minutes, the entire student body would enjoy a movie viewing and popcorn.

Fraser mentions there's only two things she won't allow the students to do and that is cut her hair or make her wear a dress to school. But nearly anything else, within reason, she would agree to.

"I usually give the Grade 7 and 8 students the ability to make a list of things they'd want to see me do. I don't make the decision. And, really, the small amount of embarrassment is worth seeing the numbers of minutes read climb so high. It's all about literacy," said Fraser.

Students are able to read at home. The minutes read have to be logged by a parent, and the material they read can be anything they choose. Newspaper, magazines or even comic books are all eligible. As Fraser said, it's all about literacy, so if students are reading, that's good enough.

The cow kissing took place on Wednesday, June 10, and Helen and Jen Jermy of Spruce Ridge Stock Farm

provided the cow, which was a retired show cow. Samantha Kopp, a Grade 4 student, applied the lipstick for the big moment.

# Gimli council has approved a controversial bylaw that will ban dogs from Gimli Beach and boardwalk

nates against both local and visiting dog owners," said Beck to the packed council chambers on June 10.

Beck said when dogs were banned from the beach a couple years ago, he thought it was a fair compromise. But when he recently found out that it included the boardwalk and the grassed area behind the boardwalk, he thought the RM had crossed the line.

"What bothers me is if that had been made public two years ago, people

such as myself could have challenged it. It could have been an election issue even," said Beck, who also created the Facebook page "I Support Dogs on the Gimli Boardwalk," which has received over 1,200 likes.

Beck presented council with a petition of over 730 sig-

natures from locals and tourists who wish to keep walking their canine companions on the Gimli boardwalk. Beck also attended the council meeting with Stefan Tergesen, the owner of the popular H.P. Tergesen & Sons store, who had another petition with 90 signatures from business owners in the community who wish to keep dogs on the Gimli boardwalk.

Beck also worries that dogs will be the ones to suffer if dog owners leave their pets in the car while they are at the beach.

"I've noticed dogs in cars just in the last few weeks since the ban started,"

he said

A bylaw banning dogs from the Gimli boardwalk is not going to stop bad dog owners, Beck pointed out.

"They sneak on the beach. They let their dog do their business on the beach. They let their dog run around loose and bite people," said Beck. "I think the issue is enforcement and making sure that those bad dog owners are caught and that they don't cross onto the beach."

Beck requested three things of council: that the dog ban be revoked im-

mediately; that in the bylaw they physically define what the beach is; and that they start a volunteer committee with dog owners and members of council to enforce the rules and keep the irresponsible dog owners off the beach.

Coun. Danny Luprypa questioned Beck on how he feels about dogs intimidating children and adults.

"I've also had a lot of calls supporting the ban," said Luprypa.

"Sure there are. There's always going to be one in 10. That is the parent's responsibility," Beck replied. "They have 80 per cent of the beach area (sand) to get away from them."

Mayor Randy Woroniuk mentioned a case where a woman was bit in the thigh by a leashed dog last summer.

"I had a woman come to me from walking along the boardwalk last year and a leashed dog by an irresponsible dog owner bit her in the thigh," said Woroniuk. "I've had mothers come to me and complain that they're washing dog feces off their children's feet

— again, irresponsible dog owners. There are people for whatever reason, cultural, psychological, who are uncomfortable with dogs."

Woroniuk also said he disagrees that it's the responsibility of the parent to keep the child away from the dog.

"I take severe exception to that comment that it's the parent's and the child's fault," said Woroniuk.

"Children don't know (what the dog is like). How do you respond to those people whose enjoyment of the boardwalk and the green area is diminished because of these things?"

Luprypa also mentioned dangerous parasites that humans can contract from dog feces.

"I personally will never place the importance of dogs beyond human beings," said Luprypa.

Coun. Richard Petrowski received a round of applause from the audience

after stating that he agreed with everything Beck said in his presentation.

Council passed a motion to define the Gimli Beach as the area from the main docks to Barney Thomas Drive, from Lake Winnipeg to the east boundary of the parking lot, which would include the sand, the boardwalk and the grassed area. The motion passed with a 3-2 vote, banning dogs from the entire area.

Mayor Woroniuk and councillors Peiluck and Luprypa voted in favour of the motion, while councillors Petrowski and Palson voted in opposition.

The meeting ended with an upset crowd leaving and yelling comments at council, including "We want a new council" and "What is democracy?" One woman said, "If anyone sees a dog locked in the car, phone the RCMP."

# ESD reverses decision to allow Bible distribution in schools

# School board votes to allow Bibles in Evergreen School Division

The Evergreen School Division Board of Trustees has reversed their decision to allow Gideon Bible distribution in schools in Arborg, Gimli, Riverton and Winnipeg Beach.

During the May 6 meeting, the school board defeated a motion to distribute Bibles to Grade 5 students on a voluntary basis in a 4-3 vote. However, trustees Diana Auer and Sandra Davey were absent from that meeting,

so at the following meeting, the motion was resent.

"In the meantime, the board had received of couple letters of correspondence of concern regarding their decision," said Paul Cuthbert, superintendent of the Evergreen School Division.

The Interlake Gideon Chapter requested an appeal on the board's decision and made a presentation to the school board during their June 3

meeting. The chapter presented a rationale on why parents and children should have the option to receive Bibles in school.

Following the presentation, the issue was tabled and the board passed a motion to allow the distribution of Bibles in school in a 7-1 vote.

"I am speculating here, but in terms of some of the trustees who changed their position on this, maybe they had a more clear understanding of the process by which the Bibles are being distributed," explained Cuthbert.

Students must have parental permission to receive the Bibles, and

the Bibles must be distributed after school hours or during noon hour.

"So it would be on a voluntary basis (and) the school would have to receive parental permission forms in order for the distribution to occur," noted Cuthbert.

"So I think that in the end, they respected the fact that parents have the right to make a decision on what they feel is in the best interest of their child. I think that's primarily the reason the decision was changed."

Cuthbert says he hasn't received any feedback from parents after the school board reversed their decision.

# Workshop helping youth shine up job resume

The start of summer means the start of a variety of programs for children and youth and the beginning of the hunt for a summer job.

The Interlake Municipal Recreation Association, in partnership with Children and Youth Opportunities, is once again offering a fun and interactive two-day workshop that can help get youth to shine up their resumes and get ready for summer employment.

"We want to help prepare our students for their summer jobs as well as teacher jobs," said Hailey Graboweski, the summer program consultant for Children and Youth Opportunities in the Interlake region.

On June 30, the first day of the twoday workshop, participants can either sign up for Red Cross Emergency First Aid/CPR/AED training or "High Five: Principles of Healthy Child Development." The High Five program focuses on developing an expertise knowledge of child development for recreation and camp employees and volunteers. The course focuses on the five principles of healthy child development, including a caring adult, friends, participation, play and mas-

"Those are full-day courses and they look really good a resume for certification," noted Graboweski.

The second day of the workshop, on July 2, consists of several different breakout sessions, including Fit Kid Healthy Kids, a program in partnership with Doctors Manitoba and Coaching Manitoba; Instant Art, presented by Winnipeg's community art centre Art City; a student leadership and bullying session, presented by Safe Schools Manitoba; music and storytelling, presented by local musician Kate Ferris; and Lacrosse FITS, presented by the Canadian Lacrosse Association.

"Summer leader training gives them an opportunity to gain confidence and acquire critical skills that are valuable for employment," said Graboweski. "These are skills that they will continue to use throughout their life. We want to help inspire and bring new ideas to our students making our summer more fun as well as to the kids."

Graboweski also noted that these programs stand out on resumes.

"Lots of employers look for different certifications like First Aid, and when they see a person is certified,

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# Highway construction can be dangerous work

High temperatures, physically demanding work, heavy machinery and cars speeding past at deadly speeds all combined make the job of highway construction a dangerous profession.

"This job can be very dangerous, no doubt about it," explains Dan Prystupa, one of hundreds of men and women who are working on one of two

massive highway resurfacing and widening projects along Highway 6 this summer.

"We have lots to worry about on the job already, so we don't want to be concerned with people speeding through these zones. We've been lucky here that most people are obeying those limits and driving carefully."

Prystupa said that it's a minority of people who aren't being as cautious as they should be, and

that's a good thing, but in a perfect world, that number would be zero. Prystupa is working on a 40-kilometre stretch of highway that starts about 10 kilometres south of Woodlands and ends about 15 kilometres north of the

Further up the highway, between

Eriksdale and Ashern, it's a different

"Lots of cars speed through here and try to pass when they can't," said one worker who didn't want his name

"I want to be able to make it home to my family at the end of the day. Is the time you're going to save speeding here really worth my life?" he asks.

> It's roughly a 20-kilometre stretch of highway north of Eriksdale, where the speed limit drops from 100km/hr to 60km/hr. To drive that, 20 kilometres would take you 12 minutes at regular highway speed. To do it at the reduced limit takes 20 minutes. You're driving 66 per cent faster and only saving eight minutes.

"You're not saving much time by speeding through these areas.

You're just putting your life and others at risk," explains Prystupa.

There is an increased RCMP presence at these areas to catch people speeding. Speed fines are doubled in these areas and can be extremely costly. Media relations officer Bert Paquet mentions one of their officers stopped

a driver doing in excess of 120km/hr It would defeat the purpose if we in construction zones. That's double the speed limit.

The Highway 6 project is about making the highways safer to drive. were putting the lives of the people in charge of that project at risk. Leave earlier, drive slowly and keep an eye out for workers.

# PST rebate a priority for AMM in next provincial election

Elected officials and their CAOs from municipalities across the Interlake gathered at the Warren Hall on June 10 for the Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM) Interlake district meeting. The annual meeting gives members an opportunity to speak with the executive about issues affecting their communities and to learn what key objectives the AMM has for the year.

At the meeting, president Doug Dobrowolski spoke on major issues that the AMM will be lobbying the provincial government for in 2015 and 2016. The main issue identified is a need for a provincial sales tax (PST) rebate program for municipalities.

"During the lead up to and following the upcoming provincial election, the AMM will be relaying its appeal for the province to exempt municipalities from paying PST. The AMM strongly believes that one government should not tax another government as it is counter-intuitive and restricts the ability for the municipality to provide services and programs," said Dobrowolski.

"The federal government provides a 100-per-cent rebate on GST for municipalities, and the province should follow suit with the PST."

Drew Caldwell, minister of municipal government for the province, was in attendance and addressed Dobrowolski's comments regarding the PST in his own speech to the membership.

"The current project of the widening of Highway 6 is part of a road bed renewal program, which was part of the reason why we raised the sales tax by a penny a couple of years back. It has provided significant revenues for not only provincial infrastructure but municipal infrastructure and, broadly speaking, community infrastructure across the province," said Caldwell.

"We are paying very close attention to how we can enhance and maximize to the greatest possible extent our investment in municipalities and our partnerships with you in terms of the real nuts and bolts of funding and getting the dollars out there to you."

Following speeches and reports, nominations for new Interlake district directors took place. Both current directors, RM of Woodlands Reeve Trevor King and Town of Arborg Mayor Randy Sigurdson, were

acclaimed for another two-year term.

After lunch, a discussion and vote took place regarding resolutions that were brought forward and sponsored by Interlake municipalities. The resolutions were on specific issues that the member municipalities wish the AMM to lobby the provincial government for. Once the resolutions pass at the district meeting level, they will be carried forward to the fall annual convention where the entire membership of AMM will vote on the resolutions. If the resolution passes at the fall meeting, then that issues will be lobbied by the AMM at the provincial level.

This year, there were six resolutions that passed at the district level:

- The Town of Winnipeg Beach brought forward the Canada-Manitoba Job Fund Agreement resolution which would see the AMM lobby the province to revise the agreement to include municipalities as eligible recipients under the Canada-Manitoba Job Fund Agreement.

- The Town of Stonewall sponsored a resolution for

the province to consider all types of composting, including direct composting, to be eligible to receive Manitoba Composts Support Payments.

- The RM of Fisher sponsored a resolution that would see the AMM lobby Manitoba Conservation to clearly define what areas they deem night lighting to be a safe hunting practice.

- Fisher also brought forward a resolution to lobby the province to support recreation centres and municipalities with rising insurance costs.

-The RM of Bifrost-Riverton wants the province to reinstate matching core funding of 75 per cent for local Conservation District programming.

- The RM of Woodlands sponsored a resolution that would see the AMM lobby the province of Manitoba to amend The Emergency Medical Response and Stretcher Transportation Act to allow the licensing of trained volunteer EMR personnel with limited outages. Currently trained EMR personnel in the RM of Woodland who can't guarantee to be available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year are not being licensed by the province.

# 'Things are going to heat up over the summer'

It was a six-day diplomatic trip across Europe that included dinners with presidents and a meet-and-greet with the Pope, and Selkirk-Interlake MP James Bezan says his cross-Europe tour with Prime Minister Stephen Harper has once again highlighted the dire need for support in Ukraine.

The local MP and parliamentary secretary to the minister of national defence joined Harper for discussions with world leaders on economic trade and security June 6-11, and the current state of Ukraine was a key part of the trip.

Bezan and Harper, along with other delegates, sat down with Ukrainian President Petro Poroshenko and Prime Minister Ar-

seniy Yatsenyuk.

Bezan said a peace agreement with Russia made last fall isn't being honoured, and Russian troops continue attempts to disrupt the sovereignty of Ukraine.

"Things continue to escalate from a violence perspective," said Bezan during a telephone interview from Ottawa on Monday.

Bezan said while he was in Kiev, the capital of Ukraine, Russian troops continued to disrupt the country's border.

He said officials expect the conflict to continue in the coming months.

"Things are going to heat up over the summer."


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# Festival offers cultural experience on the beach

# REMS students participate in Cube Challenge

As a kid, did you ever sit for hours trying to figure out a Rubik's Cube?

If you were one of the millions and couldn't figure it out, maybe you should be taking lessons from the students at Riverton Early Middle School (REMS), who have got their Rubik's Cube game locked down.

Forty years after its birth, the Rubik's Cube continues to beguile, frustrate and challenge adults and children alike who puzzle over its brightly coloured

The traditional Rubik's Cube has six faces each with three squares by three. Every face is a different colour — white, red, blue, orange, green and yellow — that is, until the cube has been thoroughly scrambled. The challenge then is to return it to its original state with each side a single colour.

Last week the Grade 3 to 7 students at REMS participated in the Cube Challenge, where students were timed on how quickly they could solve a Rubik's Cube.

And some of them could solve it faster than most people could dial a phone number.

"We did preliminary yesterday and one student did six seconds on a two-by-two," said Isaya Woytowich, the teacher at REMS that was organizing the challenge. "His average out of three was 14 seconds, and then the three-by-three, the fastest was 35 sec-

Woytowich hosted a Cube Challenge at a previous school he worked at.

"I've always wanted to do it. The students spend most of their evenings on gaming systems and stuff, so their fingers are super quick anyways, so as soon as they can learn this, they're really good at it and they can get really quick," said Woytowich.

"It's taken off really fast. The kids love it. The whole school is kind of on fire solving these things.

Woytowich formed a Cube Club, which met every Tuesday at noon since January. The students got solving guides and watched videos on how to solve the cube and how to get faster.

The contest, which was divided into a Grade 3 & 4

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

# Shell found four kilometres north of Gimli Harbour

Craig Bailey has walked along the Gimli shoreline many, many times.

But last week, while visiting his parents in Gimli, he found something washed up on the beach that he wouldn't normally see during his shoreline walks.

"I just spotted an unusual shell and it turned out it was a zebra mussel (shell)," said Bailey, who grew up in Gimli and now lives in Winnipeg. "So that was crazy.

"I've walked up and down that beach many times and this is the only time I've ever seen one."

Bailey found the shell washed up on the beach approximately four kilometres north of the Gimli harbour, past Pelican Beach and Lake Forest Estates.

Although it wasn't a living zebra mussel, Bailey reported it to Manitoba Conservation, who said this is the first reported sighting of a zebra mussel outside of the Gimli harbour.

Zebra mussels were found in Lake Winnipeg on October 2013. In spring 2014, the Gimli harbour was closed down due to zebra mussels. The harbour was reopened again after treatment with liquid potash, a project that cost more than \$500,000.

Whether this was a leftover shell

from the potash treatment last year or the zebra mussels are continuing to spread, no one can be 100 per cent sure.

"It was a long way from the harbour," said Bailey.

A spokesperson from Manitoba Conservation & Water Stewardship says that although the mussel could have potentially came from the Gimli harbour, it's nearly impossible to determine exactly where the mussel came from.

The province wants to remind boaters to take precautionary measures and "don't move a mussel" by cleaning and removing any visible aquatic plants, aquatic invasive species

or mud from the watercraft, trailer and all water-related gear. Boaters should also drain all water from compartments and dry all equipment and any hard-to-drain compartments that have contacted the water with a dry towel or sponge before it is used in any other body of water.

"Fighting the expansion of this highly invasive species takes a concerted

effort by everyone who enjoys our lakes and rivers," Tom Nevakshonoff, minister of conservation and water stewardship, stated in a news release. "We took an aggressive approach to

control zebra mussels last year in four harbours, but mussels survived outside the harbours, so now more than ever, we need everyone's support and vigilance."

Zebra mussels were recently found on a private dock in the Red River near Selkirk Park. The mussels were found on a float underneath the dock and appeared to be dead; however, one was still firmly at-

tached to the dock, reports say. Manitoba Conservation says this was the first evidence of zebra mussels in the Manitoba portion of the Red River.

The provincial government's aquatic invasive species (AIS) program has once again launched its annual water-craft inspection program, which aims to prevent new invasive species from entering Manitoba while working to

# Super sandbags continue to be part of lake landscape

Flood protection measures in the RM of Coldwell will continue for a while longer to maintain the safety of the residents and municipal property.

In a recent statement, the council of Lundar informed the public that flood protection measures would continue until they receive authority from the government and the lake levels drop.

"We've been trying to get answers about the lake level," said Coun. Amanda Stevenson.

"Right now, we just don't have the information needed to dismantle the sandbags and dikes. With the lake level up where it is now, we're one rain event from being flooded out. It's just much safer to leave them up right now until we know for sure."

The old adage is "better safe than

sorry," and that applies here. The council has been working diligently with multiple levels of government, speaking with Minister of Infrastructure and Transportation Steve Ashton as well as the provincial government to get a timeline on the lake level dropping.

That timeline doesn't exist, unfortunately, and with how expensive it is to put all this flood protection in place, council doesn't want to tear it all down if they might need it.

"As much as we would all love to see it gone, it's there to keep the municipality and its residents safe," said Stevenson.

She also explained that while the dikes and sandbags might be intrusive, they don't ruin the beach-going experience and that visitors are able to walk around them and use the beaches whenever they want.

# Flyboarding: Gimli's newest water sport

It seems like something Marty McFly might have used in Back to the Future, but you won't need a DeLorean time machine to try out this hoverboarding-style sport.

This summer, you could find your-self hovering over the water at Gimli Beach with a water jet-fuelled board strapped to your feet, as Canadian Jet-pack Adventures is setting up shop in Gimli for the summer in front of the Lakeview Resort in Gimli. The company will be offering flyboarding and hopes to offer water jetpack by the end of the summer.

For flyboarding, the rider stands on a board that is propelled out of the water by water jets underneath the board. The board is connected to a watercraft by a long hose, which forces water under the rider. Water jetpack is basically the same thing; however, the jets are attached to a person's back instead of their feet.

After a demonstration at Gimli Beach last week with Brody Wells of Alberta Flyboard, people in the Interlake are pretty excited about it.

"We're going to offer it as a rental business so that people can come and try it out and be with a certified instructor on the jet ski to make sure it's safe and regulated," said Riley Patterson, who will be instructing flyboarding in Gimli this summer.

Patterson, who hails from Stonewall,

is teaming up with Wells to rebrand Alberta Flyboard into Canadian Jetpack Adventures. Wells will operate the business out of Alberta and Patterson will operate the Manitoba side.

"Everyone is interested in it. It gets a lot of attention," added Patterson.

Patterson is a big water sports and kiteboarding enthusiast, so trying out flyboarding was no question for him.

"I've seen videos on YouTube in the last couple of years and I did a bit of homework and realized that no one is operating flyboarding here in Manitoba, so I contacted Brody Wells and went from there," said Patterson, who got his flyboard instructor certification from Wells.

"Brody pretty much brought the sport into Canada. The sport itself is pretty much only two years old," noted Patterson. "He kind of started right from the ground level, and since he is what you would call a master flyboarder, he put on a certification course and taught us the business and how to be safe doing it."

However, you don't have to be a water sports junkie or an athlete to try out flyboarding.

"It's for anyone. Most people within the first five to 10 minutes will be up and flying around. So as long as you have a little bit of balance, you can do the sport," said Patterson, who added that rentals are available to ages 12 and up. Youth between ages 12 and 17

will need a parental consent form.

Starting next weekend, Canadian Jetpack Adventures will be set up in front of the Lakeview Resort every weekend offering rentals and instruction. Patterson says he will also do mobile bookings.

"If there was a bachelorette party or a stag or birthday party at West Hawk and they wanted us to come out there, I can do mobile bookings as well," said Patterson.

"Everyone should come out and try. It's super fun and safe and really not that hard to do."

# French Immersion advocate begins a new chapter

After a lengthy career of teaching, Mona Buors will be hanging up her No. 2 pencil for good at the end of the school year.

Buors never had any aspirations of teaching when she was growing up and never though she would become one. But after taking a suggestion from her father to get into the educational system, Buors has had a career that she says is as good as anyone could've asked for.

"I guess he saw something in me that I didn't realize," said Buors, thinking of how that moment defined the rest of her life.

"It's the best thing he could have ever done. I enjoy it so much. I love it and I love the kids."

Buors is a passionate educator and has dedicated her entire working career to the craft. Not only has she taught two generations of students but she was also instrumental in setting up the French Immersion program in 1989 for the Interlake School Division.

At first, Buors was a bit reluctant to take on that project, knowing it would be a daunting amount of work. But she also knew that she wanted her son enrolled in a French Immersion class and figured that the work would be worth it and set to creating the program from scratch.

"That summer was devoted entirely to creating that class. I had to order the books, get the curriculum set up and all the materials. And I even had to order all the furniture for the classroom. It was a huge amount of work but well worth it because we needed the program."

That class was a Kindergarten and Grade 1 class and served students from Teulon, Balmoral, Stony Mountain, Grosse Isle and Stonewall. Buors mentioned that teaching those younger students actually made the course more enjoyable. It being easier for younger students to absorb the

information and to start seeing progress. Buors said that the curriculum had a lot of music-based learning to it and that it was a very effective way of teaching the material.

Buors would leave the area and move to Kelowna with her husband and teach there for a few years before returning to Manitoba in 1992 to teach for Whitehorse Plains School Division (now Prairie Rose).

"It's funny because the principal here (Ecole communautaire Aurele-Lemione in St. Laurent) was my student teacher at that time. I actually have a few teachers I work with now who were student teachers with me years ago, and I now teach their kids. It comes full circle quite nicely."

The decision to leave after 35 years doesn't come lightly, and although Buors explains that she'll miss the kids, she does have her own grand-children who will keep her busy.

Buors will remain a part of the community and serves as a board mem-

# Local seamstress sends her products all around the world

She sounds like a Victorian needlewoman when she tells you about the incredibly long hours she spends in a cellar filled with bolts of fabric and the unremitting whirr of sewing ma-

It was common for women in that era to faint during the 18-hour workday. Besides labour legislation, they

lacked the one machine present-day seamstress Jackie Horvat said she depends on.

"I have an espresso ma chine," said Horvat, wh operates Princess Peacl Designs from her hom in Arborg. "My husband got it for me for Mother' Day."

Horvat makes blanket and other textiles that can

be personalized with names, dates of birth, quotes and appliqués. She said baby blankets are her most popular item at present. And the babies' parents want more than those.

"If baby's getting one, I want one too," Horvat said, referring to orders she has filled for adult blankets.

She manages every aspect of her year-old business, from purchasing fabrics and sewing to shipping and bookkeeping.

Some of her designs sound yummy enough to eat: "Lilac dimple and baby pink swirl" reads one Facebook post accompanied by a photo of a blanket. In addition to the social networking

site — which Horvat uses to market her products and interact with customers — she built a website.

She makes a range of personalized products, including taggie blankets (a blanket with tags sewn along the edges), bibs, diaper bags, pillows and baby car-seat covers. She also buys stuffed animals and embroiders names onto them.

> And speaking of animals, she has made personalized blankets for dogs — her mom's, for instance. "My mom said, 'You have to make one for Daisy," " said Horvat, whose family are local entrepreneurs.

Her mother owns Arborg Nic Nac's & Flowers; her brother,

Interlake Glass. Horvat says both have mentored her through various stages of business development.

"They're my go-to people," said Hor-

Although she had little experience with design, fabrics and sewing, she learned as she went. "The minky is fluffy and stretchy, and it took me some time to learn.'

It all started while she was on maternity leave. She and her mother were making headbands and tutus for her daughter, who is now one. "I wanted her to have things her mom made," said Horvat, who also has a sevenyear-old son.

Then a friend suggested she add people's names. "It went kaboom from there," she said.

With savings set aside from her job as human resources manager at Co-op (from which she said she reluctantly resigned), she launched her business. An investment in two industrial-strength sewing machines was a must.

"It's faster and has more power," said Horvat, who has to juggle fulltime childcare with running her business. Her daughter spends one day a week at daycare and the rest of the time at home. Between feedings and playtime, Horvat cuts fabric, sews and takes customers' orders.

Horvat has an extra room in her basement packed with 20- to 25-metre bolts."I have 70 different kinds of fabrics," she said. "It drives my husband crazy."

But he supports her work and is "beyond proud" of what she has accomplished in just a year, she said. "He asked this past Christmas what I wanted as a gift. My reply was more fabric."

With colours such as jade, teal, watermelon and vanilla, and materials such as the super-soft minky, the sky's the limit for Horvat's customers. And they keep her busy. She works seven days a week, sewing about five to seven items a day, which she ships off to people across Canada, the United States, Australia, Spain and Norway.

"When my kids are in bed, I sew till 2 a.m.," said Horvat. "I find it hard to take time off."


Despite the long hours, she said she suffers from no aches and pains."The only physical toll it takes on me is the lack of sleep."


But she said she catches up in the afternoon, taking advantage of her daughter's nap time to get a bit of shut-eye.

When she walks through the doors of the local Canada Post with her "big bag," staff probably marvels at her efficiency. "They know me," said Horvat. "I do the labels at home on my computer, and I pack it all up so it's ready for them to ship."

She said she doesn't rule out the possibility of hiring sewers if demand continues to escalate. But for now, she's a one-woman textile factory.

Goaltender Adam Swan of Ashern was picked by the Winnipeg Blues, who had the ninth selection in the fourth round.


Seven picks later (fifth round, 49th overall), Gimli forward Jack Einarson was picked by the Virden Oil Capitals.

# British soccer camp coming to Arborg, Gimli this summer

European soccer is coming to the Interlake.

Elite soccer athletes from England will be coming to North America to host summer soccer camps, and a few of them will be stopping in Arborg and Gimli.

The Challenger Sports program hosts the camps, which is for youth ages 5-14.

"They've been training these coaches in England and then they've been sending them to work in North America and putting on these camps all throughout Canada and the United States," said Tom Chwaliboga, the recreation director for the Arborg Bifrost Parks and Recreation Commission. Chwaliboga says this is the seventh year the program has come to Arborg.

Coaches are usually between 19 and 22 years old.

"They go and get trained at the headquarters in England on how to coach, and then they come over here and spend a summer over here bouncing across Manitoba and parts of Canada and the States," said Chwaliboga, who added that in they past they have had coaches from both England and Ireland.

"I know last year we had one guy that was in Winnipeg one week and then he was in Arborg and then he was up in Thompson one week and then the following week he was off to Kansas."

While staying in the community, the coaches are encouraged to stay with a host family in order to experience the community and the culture. Host families only have to supply them with some food and a place to sleep. Host families also get a discount if they wish to enter their children in the program, Chwaliboga said.

The program, depending on the age of the child, can range between \$60 and \$125.

"When you register you get a t-shirt and a soccer ball and if you register before the deadline you get a jersey too," added Chwaliboga.

Chwaliboga says this is an excellent opportunity for any child that loves the sport.

"It's not every day that you're going to get coaching that's this good. These kids have played high-level soccer in England. Basically the heartbeat of soccer is in England. These coaches live and breath soccer," said Chwaliboga.

"They know what they're talking about, they understand the game of soccer better than most people. At the end of the day, when you live and breath the sport like they do, it makes a big difference. The drills and coaching that you're going to get for your kid is going to be second to none."



# **Cranberry Maple Lemon Rice Pudding**



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Ingredients

1/2 cup (125 mL) Arborio (short-grain Italian) rice

3 cups (750 mL) 1% milk (approx.) 2 1/2 tbsp (33 mL) pure maple syrup

1/4 cup (50 mL) dried cranberries, cherries or blueberries, (or a mixture, chopped if large)

Grated zest of 1 lemon or small orange Ground cinnamon

Directions

In a heavy saucepan, bring rice, milk and syrup to a simmer over medium heat, stirring often.

Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, for 20 minutes. Stir in cranberries and half of the zest; cover and simmer for 5 to 10 minutes longer or until rice is very soft and pudding is slightly thickened (it will thicken considerably upon cooling). Serve hot, warm or cold, stirring in more milk as necessary to thin. Sprinkle each serving with cinnamon and remaining zest.

T-Bone Steaks with Dad's Steak Rub

Ingredients

4T-Bone Steaks

2 tablespoons cooking oil

Dad's Steak Rub (see recipe below)

Preparation

Thaw steaks overnight in refrigerator or quick thaw by placing sealed steaks in sink with water for 30 minutes to 1 hour.

Prepare rub recipe.

Heat grill on medium. Blot dry steaks with clean paper towel, then brush each side with cooking oil.

Generously season both sides of steaks with rub.

Grill steaks to desired doneness. For medium rare steak, grill for about 8 minutes on first side and 6–7 minutes on second side.

# **Dad's Steak Rub**

- 4 tablespoons coarse sea salt or kosher salt
- 1 tablespoon coarse ground black pepper
- 1 tablespoon coarse dehydrated onion flakes
- 1/2 tablespoon coarse dehydrated garlic 1/2 tablespoon crushed red pepper
- 1 teaspoon whole dill seed
- 1 teaspoon dried whole thyme
- 1 teaspoon whole cumin (toasted and crushed coarse)
- 1 teaspoon whole coriander (toasted and crushed coarse)

Preparation

Combine all and mix well. Store in air tight container or zip lock bag for up to 6 months.

Note:

To prepare cumin and coriander, toast by placing in dry pan over medium heat, shaking pan about 2–3 minutes until seasonings start to brown. Crush using bottom of pan on cutting board or with mortar and pestle.

Yield: 1/2 cup
