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### Arborg's Riverdale Place Workshop pays tribute to long-time manager Alex Janower

Members of the Arborg and Bifrost-Riverton community held a celebratory retirement party last for Riverdale week Place Workshop's manager, long-time Alex Janower, whose dedicated service and advocacy parworkshop ticipants spanned 38 years.

About 75 people attended the celebration at the workshop, located just west of Arborg. The event included speeches, gift presentations, musical entertainment and cake and refreshments.

The board of Riverdale **Place** Workshop presented Janower with a commemorative plaque thanking him for service to the workshop and communities of Arborg and Bifrost-Riverton.

Riverdale Place Workshop is a not-for-profit organization that cares for and provides social and employment opportunities to adults with intellectual challenges through a day program, and also serves the communities of Arborg and Bifrost-Riverton through its curbside recycling program, which keeps thousands of kilograms of recyclable materials out of the local landfill and employs a number of workshop participants.

In addition to caring for Arborg and area's most vulnerable citizens, Janower guided the workshop through some tough times over the course of his career, enhanced workshop participants' experience through the provision of a new vehicle to take them on social outings, and fought for the continuation of government funding in order to ensure participants' inclusion in the community.

Janower said he was hoping to retire "quietly" but the workshop board insisted on giving him a party.

"It was a very touching event and I felt honoured. I really appreciated it," said Janower a day after the June 19 celebration. "I'm sad to go. I didn't realize that retirement would be so difficult. It was a tough decision to make, but there comes a time for everybody."

Pastor Dani Caldeira from the ConneXion Church,

who attends the workshop once a month to provide music lessons to participants, "secretly" had participants learn Janower's favourite song, Stand By Me, and they performed it for him during the party, he said.

Workshop board member Val Klym helped organize the party with board chair Norma Smolinski and other board members, and also acted as MC for the event.

"Alex has done an awesome job at the workshop and through some difficult times such as COVID and the funding difficulties of the recent past," said Klym a day after the party. "He's





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### State of emergency lifted as wildfire threat eases

The Manitoba government has officially lifted the provincewide state of emergency declared under the Emergency Measures Act, Premier Wab Kinew and Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Lisa Naylor announced Monday.

The decision comes as conditions improve and many evacuees begin returning home.

"The decision to lift the state of emergency reflects the progress made on the ground and the dedication of the firefighting teams," said Kinew.

"As a government, we acted when we needed to and now we're stepping back at the right time. This is still a serious situation, so we will remain vigilant and prepare for any changes, but this marks a positive step for Manitoba."

Initially declared May 28 under sections 10(1) and 10(2) of the Emergency Measures Act, the state of emergency expired at noon on June 23.

Evacuation orders issued by local authorities remain in effect where required and will only be lifted once it is safe to do so.

"I want to extend my deepest gratitude to the front-line responders, the Emergency Management Organization and government departments for their continued efforts during this wildfire crisis," said Naylor. "Their co-ordination, dedication and tireless work has been instrumental in protecting lives, property and communities across Manitoba."

# Province invests in crane training

Tower crane facility expected to open this fall with government support

government is Manitoba investing \$215,000 to support the development of a new tower crane training facility aimed at preparing more Manitobans for skilled trades

Jamie Moses, minister of Business, Mining, Trade and Job Creation, announced the funding Tuesday, calling it a step toward addressing labour shortages while helping workers improve their qualifications.

"We are putting Manitobans to

work building One Manitoba with good-paying jobs in the skilled trades," Moses said. "This investment will create more opportunities for workers to level up their skills and for businesses to find the highly skilled workers they need to grow."

The funds will help build a foundation base and erect a tower crane at the new training site led by the Operating Engineers Training Institute of Manitoba Inc. (OETIM), which could be operational as early as this fall.

Moses said tower and mobile crane operators play a key role in Manitoba's construction and manufacturing sectors, and the province forecasts 46 openings in the field over the next five

Jordan James, executive director of OETIM, said the investment ensures

Manitobans have access to highquality, locally delivered training for in-demand positions.

"As a not-for-profit organization, OETIM relies on partnerships and support from governments and industry alike to enable us to deliver this type of training," James said. "This addition to our training capabilities allows us to safely train Manitobans, in Manitoba, to the highest standards."

Marc Lafond, business manager for Operating Engineers of Manitoba Local 987, also welcomed the province's commitment.

"A thriving economy always is synonymous to having cranes on the horizon and having safe and qualified people at their controls is paramount," Lafond said.

Calling all artists — Art Hive, a free community art program, is back for the summer with more opportunities to get creative.

First launched in 2021 by Age Friendly Dunnottar and the Ponemah Beach Central (PBC) Art Centre, Art Hive offers a weekly space for participants to explore their creativity.

"It is a space for people to bring their creative ideas to life," said Althea Howard of Age Friendly Dunnottar.

The drop-in program runs every Thursday in July and August at the PBC Art Centre, 27 Central Ave. in Dunnottar. All are welcome from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., and an adults-only session follows from 1 to 4 p.m. Participants can attend one session or all nine, and are free to come and go during each session.

'We want everyone to know that this is an open and non-judgmental space for you to play around with, and we supply everything you need





for free," Howard said.

Funded by the Village of Dunnottar and community donations, the program offers a wide variety of supplies including fabric, driftwood, paint, polymer clay and rocks. Participants are also welcome to bring their own materials. Those wishing to donate supplies can contact Age Friendly Dunnottar through its Facebook page.

Howard said she continues to be amazed by the creativity shown each

"Alex spent 38 years serving the clients, managing staff and creating a caring community that celebrates value and ability over limitations," said Dueck. "It seems to me that one thing all community builders have in common is the endless focus on serving others, and Alex lived and modelled this well."

On behalf of Interlake-Gimli MLA Derek Johnson, Tammy Axelsson presented Janower with an honorary

plaque that thanks Janower for his 'tireless dedication" to the workshop and "steadfast advocacy" for adults with intellectual disabilities. Janower's efforts have "enriched countless lives and left a lasting legacy of compassion, dignity and inclusion in our community.'

Bifrost-Riverton Reeve Brian Johnson also paid tribute to Janower and presented him with a retirement gift on behalf of the municipality.

And on behalf of Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP James Bezan, Klym presented Janower with a certificate commending him for his 38 years of service.

Janower officially steps down at the end of June, and workshop staff member Susie Johnson will be taking over as manager.

Janower said he'll be available as a volunteer to help the workshop transition or to provide advice if needed.

### A-Spire Players back on the boards with performances, programs

Gimli's A-Spire Players Theatre is back on the boards this season with a brand new executive, website, summer performances from travelling theatre groups and a theatre program starting this fall that includes acting classes.

The amateur performing troupe, which was founded in 1992 and treads the boards at the Gimli Unitarian Church on Second Avenue, is also throwing open its arms to anyone who wants to learn the tricks of the acting trade or take on a backstage role in lighting, costuming, sound and so forth to support performances.

Scott Cameron, who previously sat on the A-Spire board until 2017, is back as board chair after a new executive of seven members was formed in March. Some former A-Spire members, such as Kim Malchuk, have also returned.

Cameron said the Manitoba amateur dramatics scene is seeing a resurgence after a slump caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and public health restrictions that kept people housebound and later cautious about venturing out. But with that all behind us, people are starting to join community groups and volunteering for various things.

"It's going strong. It's on the rise again post-COVID. We had lots of [theatrical] groups fail because of COVID," said Cameron, who in addition to being A-Spire chair serves as treasurer for the Association of Community Theatres of Manitoba. "People were staying home. Getting them back in to volunteering was difficult. But it's on the rise."

While the previous A-Spire board focused primarily on theatrical performances, the new board will be broadening its scope. It already has musical performances in the works and is currently looking at offering other types of performing arts, which can include disciplines such as dance, opera, stand-up comedy, improv, magic and spoken word.

"Our constitution identifies that A-Spire is not just theatre: we're

performing arts. We used to have musical performances, theatre groups, comedy groups and so forth. Over the past 20 years we had a pile of different things on offer, including theatre classes for youth," said Cameron. "Because we are only one of three community theatre groups in Manitoba that have our own facility, we can open it up for a wider range of performing arts — and we want to expand."

And, of course, an increase in programming would require backstage support. Volunteering to learn production skills at A-Spire could help land people a job with a production company filming in the city or elsewhere or theatrical gigs.

A-Spire's 2025 summer theatre program will be a bit smaller than previous years as the new executive only came aboard in March. But Cameron said he's working on getting things going again and wants locals to get involved. To get people to join you, you have to have "something going on."

While A-Spire Players won't be scheduling its own performance this summer, it has partnered with the Winnipeg-based Dramatic Theatre troupe to stage three performances of *Anne of Green Gables* from July 4 to 6 at the Unitarian Church. That will be followed by the Actor's Studio Adult Conservatory's performance of *Almost, Maine* on July 11-13.

A-Spire's program of local theatre activities is set to start in August and September. In August the troupe is thinking of hosting Thursday night open-house musical performances, inviting anyone who wants to play or sing to get up on stage and give it a go. And in September A-Spire will offer acting workshops and prepare for a possible performance around Christmas or in the new year.

"For our local theatre activities, we're going to focus on starting this fall. We're always open to people joining us as actors or as stage hands to learn how to operate the set behind-the-scenes. We'd like to hear from them now for our fall programing,"

### National school board congress pivots online to free hotel space for evacuees

Event to be held virtually July 3-4, featuring Suzuki, Fontaine, Hughes, Penner

The Canadian School Boards Association (CSBA) Congress and National Trustee Gathering on Indigenous Education will take place virtually this year, freeing up nearly 350 hotel rooms in Winnipeg for wildfire evac-

Originally scheduled to be held in person July 2 to 5, the conference will now take place online July 3 and 4. The decision was made in response to ongoing wildfire evacuations, with the Manitoba School Boards Association (MSBA) requesting that rooms at the Delta Hotel and Hampton Inn by Hilton be released for those displaced by fires in northern Manitoba.

"This is a really important event for us, but we are able to pivot and offer some really important learning on our public education system and Indigenous education virtually," said Alan Campbell, CSBA and MSBA president, in a June 11 radio interview with CBC's Marcy Markusa.

Campbell, a Stonewall resident, noted the conference has been four years in the making and was meant to highlight the province's Indigenous and Franco-Manitoban cultures. Venues across Winnipeg had been lined up to showcase Manitoba's strengths to visiting trustees and educators.

Despite the shift to a virtual format, Campbell said the event remains packed with value. Registration fees have been cut in half, and the online format eliminates travel and accommodation expenses. In turn, registration has increased, and for the first time, the general public is also invited to participate.

"We will offer the same professional development opportunities keynote speakers without having to incur the costs of hotels and the full congress rate," Campbell told the Express Weekly News. "The quality and breadth of the program is second to none."

year include Speakers this environmentalist Dr. David Suzuki,

Indigenous leader Phil Fontaine, Olympian Clara Hughes children's entertainer Fred Penner. All sessions are aligned with CSBA's priorities: strategic advocacy, Indigenous education, comprehensive school health, and equity, diversity and inclusion.

"We recognize the impact of school boards leading the charge for the Calls to Action," Campbell said. "We work to aggressively strengthen the autonomy of our school boards and we do this with the professional development opportunities provide — virtual included."

While the shift online means fewer tourism dollars for Manitoba in the short term, Campbell said financial losses for CSBA have been minimal. The association has worked with hotel partners to reschedule future in-person events once conditions im-

Meanwhile, school divisions across the province have been supporting evacuees in various ways. In the north, school bus drivers have been helping with transportation, while in the south, Winnipeg and Brandon divisions have provided learning mate-

# Festival marks 150 years of Icelandic settlement in Canada

The Icelandic Festival of Manitoba has named Gunnvor Danielsdóttir-Asmundsson as its 2025 Fjallkona — or Maid of the Mountain — a symbolic role that honours women who have worked to preserve and promote Icelandic culture in Manitoba.

The announcement was made at a brunch held May 31 at the Waterfront Centre in Gimli, where festival organizers gathered to celebrate the long-standing tradition and introduce this year's honouree.

Danielsdóttir-Asmundsson, who moved to Canada with her husband and daughter 55 years ago, has been a dedicated member of the Icelandic-Canadian community ever since. She and her family settled in Gimli in 1981 and opened a clothing store, Siggy's. In the final 15 years of her working life, she was employed by the Icelandic Consulate in Winnipeg.

"I have come to realize that Canada is the future of my family," she said during the brunch. "Two of my three children were born here and my grandchildren. I am fortunate to have two

citizenships. We all have strong ties to Iceland and visit often, but this is home."

Danielsdóttir-Asmundsson and her family have never missed Islendingadagurinn, whether living in Winnipeg or in Gimli.

"It is a time to meet friends and develop new friendships," she said. "It is always so exciting when groups from Iceland come to Gimli. You start talking and for sure you are either a distant cousin or you know someone they know."

Each year, the Fjallkona is selected by a committee of the Icelandic Festival, with input from community members and organizations. The honour recognizes a woman who has demonstrated a long-standing commitment to Icelandic heritage and community involvement.

Danielsdóttir-Asmundsson has been nominated several times in the past and was selected on three occasions but respectfully declined until this year.

Her contributions to the Icelandic community in Manitoba are extensive. She has served as secretary and treasurer of the Icelandic Canadian Frón, helped organize the Icelandic Language and Cultural Camp for decades and taught Icelandic language classes throughout the province. She is also a contributor to and former board member of Lögberg-Heimskringla and previously served as assistant to three consul generals of Iceland in Canada. She currently teaches Icelandic through the New Iceland Heritage Museum and serves

# Gimli urges caution after illegal burn piles found

The RM of Gimli is reminding residents that a full burn ban remains in effect, restricting all types of fires.

The reminder comes after an *Express Weekly News* reader contacted the paper this week about a fire that was started along Road 16N, just outside Gimli. According to the report, two separate burn piles — one to the north and one to the south — were discovered over the weekend. One of the piles included garbage such as cupboards, wood and paper, and was left smouldering near brush. The RM of Gimli was notified.

"All fires — including those in approved firepits and containers, coal- or wood-burning barbecues, fireworks and candle-lit lanterns — are prohibited," said Christine Payne, the RM's manager of community engagement. "All fire permits are suspended, and any existing permits are void."

Off-road motorized travel is also currently prohibited. This includes ATVs, side-by-sides, dirt bikes, gas-powered golf carts (both on- and

off-road use) and any motorized vehicles operating off established roads or trails. Gravel road travel is also restricted, and residents are encouraged to contact the RM with any questions about what is permitted.

"The fire restrictions will be either


eased or removed once conditions — Mother Nature — allow," Payne said.

Only propane and electric barbecues and smokers, as well as propane tabletop fireplaces, may be used during the burn ban.

According to the Province of

This year, to mark the 150th anniversary of Icelandic settlement in Canada, the Fjallkona will receive a new dress and headdress donated by Annríki, an Icelandic company specializing in traditional national costumes. The new outfit will be unveiled during the Icelandic fashion show on the Saturday of the festival, which will also be attended by the president of Iceland, Halla

Tómasdóttir.

Danielsdóttir-Asmundsson will be accompanied by her grandchildren, Sonja and Kristofer, as her attendants. A luncheon, the Fjallkona Mott, will be held prior to the festival to welcome her into the group of past Fjallkonur.

Festival president Sigurn Asmundsson, currently in Iceland to accept the gift of the new costume, praised the ongoing importance of the tradition.

"I am honoured to support the

festival in continuing to celebrate our Icelandic culture as well as welcoming families from all cultures to Gimli to celebrate with us," she said.

This year's Icelandic Festival of Manitoba will take place Aug. 1 to 4 in Gimli and will feature Viking battles, live music, volleyball tournaments, sandcastle contests, art shows, traditional food and the annual parade.

Manitoba, the fire danger level remains extremely high, and the risk of wildfires whether human-caused or natural — continues. Gimli Fire Chief Mike Chudd is monitoring daily conditions and will lift the restrictions once conditions significantly improve.

Updates to the RM's burn ban will be shared via the RM website at www. gimli.ca, the RM's digital newsletter, Facebook and Instagram pages, the Gimli Fire and Rescue Facebook page, and through Connect Gimli — a platform that delivers email or text alerts for municipal news, weather and emergencies. Payne encouraged all residents to register for Connect Gimli via the RM's website.

At this time, limb and branch disposal at the Arnes Landfill is also suspended, as the site has reached capacity and cannot safely burn accumulated materials. Burning garbage remains prohibited at all times under RM bylaws.

"The destruction we've already seen — and the risk of more to come — makes it critical that we all do our part," reads the RM's May 30 fire ban notice. "Every time someone ignores these rules, it puts lives, property and our fire crews at risk. It also diverts valuable resources that could be needed elsewhere. We will get through this — but only if we stay vigilant, be fire smart and follow all current restrictions. It's for the safety of everyone."



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### Riverton Co-op marks 100 years as community cornerstone

What began as a modest creamery is now a bustling store at the heart of Riverton life

One hundred years after opening its doors, the Riverton Co-op continues to serve as a hub for the community that built it.

Founded in 1925 as the Riverton Co-operative Creamery Association, the organization has evolved from a small dairy operation into a full-service store offering groceries, hardware and more. Today, it operates as the Riverton Co-operative Association, with over 2,400 members — more than half of whom are active.

"This Co-op was founded 100 years ago to better the community and support its members, and we are still here for these reasons," said Liz Bjornson, president of the Riverton Co-op board. "We are determined to change, evolve and grow Riverton Co-op to sustain service to our members and continue what our founders started a century ago."

The original founders — local farmers and residents — came together with a vision for a community-owned creamery. Despite financial hurdles and logistical setbacks, their determination led to the official registration of the co-operative on July 15, 1925.

of the co-operative on July 15, 1925. The Riverton Co-op expanded steadily over the decades: a general store was added in 1936, followed by a meat department in 1964 and a lumber yard in subsequent years.



Rich Einarson retired for the first time in 2008 after working as general manager for many years, then went back again as a part-time worker in 2009. He will be retiring again at the end of the month but going back to work casually.

Although the creamery eventually closed, the Co-op has remained a pillar of the community.

"We are known to be the hub of the community and a gathering place to chit-chat," said Darelene Yaremus, retail manager. "We are proud to support several community organizations through donations, discounts and volunteering."

The biggest event in Riverton Coop's history was when the store burned down in 1987, shared Rich Einarson, who has been working at the store since 1971.

"The board of directors at the time made the correct decision to rebuild the store in a new location uptown," Einarson said. "The new store was

much larger and modernized, and is the store that serves Riverton to this day. We are a one-stop store that serves the community and surrounding area. While the new store was under construction, the Co-op set up temporarily at the Riverton Curling Club as it was off season for curling. We were able to provide fresh meat, produce and a reduced grocery section."

While the store has always been a place for people to come home to, for Einarson, in many ways, it really has been home. His Opa worked as manager, and both his father and daughter have worked there for many years as well. While his father, Bud Einarson worked as a butter maker, Riverton Co-op Creamery received five annual awards for the best butter produced in Manitoba. He and his family have seen the Co-op grow from a success-

ful local creamery to a place that provides countless services for its community.

"I still work part-time at the store and it gives me the opportunity to work with a great staff, as well as meet and interact with old and new customers. We share lots of good stories," said Einarson. "I've met people in the store that I haven't seen for 40 years. After a nice chat, they may leave with some Winnipeg Old Country bologna or a rulla pylsa and Arborg Icelandic Brown Bread — or sometimes both. I hope the next 100 years will be as good as the first 100 for the Riverton Co-op."

To celebrate its centennial, the Coop is planning a special barbecue on July 15 — the official anniversary of its founding. Other events include

### Capt. Bob Pearson to accompany Gimli Glider airliner's cockpit to Gimli

Gimli Glider Exhibit purchases cockpit, which may appear in Canada Day parade

The cockpit of the Gimli Glider will be coming home near the end of June, along with the plane's pilot who glided the powerless Air Canada jet onto a decommissioned runway at Gimli Airport and saved all 69 people on board.

Capt. Robert Pearson used his gliding pilot skills to land the commercial jet on July 23, 1983, along with the help of first officer Maurice Quintal. The Boeing 767 had run out of fuel en route from Montreal to Edmonton at 41,000 feet over Red Lake, Ont., owing to a fuelling miscalculation.

Barb Gluck, president of the Gimli Glider Exhibit, a museum she and other volunteers established to honour Pearson and Quintal's skilful and miraculous emergency landing, said she's excited to have acquired the flight deck, which is such a significant piece of the plane.

The exhibit plans to have the cockpit and Capt. Pearson take part in town's Canada Day parade.

"The cockpit will be returning to Canada at some time near the end of the month and Capt. Pearson will be here to greet it as it crosses the border," said Gluck. "He will remain in Gimli for the July 1 Canada Day parade. The plan is to have the cockpit in the parade but it will be tarped because it needs restoration."

The cockpit is being transported by road from California. Weather conditions between California and Canada could possibly delay its arrival in Gimli, said Gluck, and there's no guarantee it will ride in the parade.

The airliner flew again after the miraculous Gimli landing and was retired in 2008. It has sat in a storage facility in the Mojave Desert in California. Parts of the plane have been sold off over the years. The Gimli Glider Exhibit has managed to purchase the tail, a window panel and other artifacts from

"People ask why not the whole plane but it wasn't realistic [price-wise] for us to get the plane back. And it's in pieces. People have been selling it off for souvenirs. And there's no hanger here big enough for it. It made sense to go after the cockpit where the handling of the plane took place with the pilots," said Gluck. "We have the top of the tail with the 604 on it. We now have the front of the plane."

After the parade, the cockpit will be whisked away for restoration then installed at a commemorative park recently established close to the runway where it landed almost 42 years ago. The decommissioned runway is used for motorsports events.

Gluck said the cockpit's size — about 10 feet tall and "higher than the roof of the Gimli Glider Exhibit" and about 14 feet long — wouldn't allow them to get it through the museum's doors. And people want to see the runway where Pearson and Quintal landed the jet.

"We're installing it at the commemorative park because visitors we've had from around the world ask us, 'Can we go stand where it landed?'" said Gluck. "They want that experience, knowing the plane's history and where it landed on the racetrack."

If it's feasible, the plan is to elevate the cockpit on a pedestal.

'We have to get engineers to figure out the safest - and the best — way to elevate the cockpit in the sky. There's a whole process that needs to begin once we get it back here," said Gluck, who along with exhibit vice-president Peter Holfeuer of the Gimli Ice Festival and Capt. Pearson, earned a King Charles III Coronation Medal earlier this year. "We'll be mounting it about 20 feet in the air at the park. And we're going to try to position it on the angle it came in on, but the engineers will determine if we can put it on that angle."

"In my eyes, we are celebrating Riverton Co-op's 100 years because of the 100 years of customer support. We would not be here today to continue to provide this service if the customers never shopped locally and believed in the Riverton Coop," shared Yaremus. "We are here because of dedicated staff and board members that ensured the best interest of the Riverton Coop shoppers."

Through the continued support

of the community, even after a century, the Co-op has plans to update their location, though they're keeping the specifics a surprise until things are more set in stone.

The Riverton Co-op will also hold its annual general meeting on Sept. 17 at the Riverton Curling Club, with prizes and refreshments for those in attendance. Throughout June, July and August, shoppers can take part in weekly surprise draws for Co-op gift cards, with a total of \$1,200 to be given away.

As the Co-op reflects on a century of service, its focus remains the same — building community, supporting local initiatives and adapting to meet the needs of the people of Riverton.

### Stonewall resident set to paddle Nahanni River in support of military mental health

A Stonewall-based military police officer is preparing for the adventure of a lifetime — one that's as much about personal healing as it is about paddling through one of Canada's most remote wilderness areas.

Warrant Officer Katherine Vick, who serves as the police operations warrant officer with 17 Military Police Flight at 17 Wing Winnipeg, has been selected to take part in the 2025 True Patriot Love Women's Expedition to the Nahanni River. The two-week journey from Aug. 25 to Sept. 7 will see an all-female team paddle 240 kilometres through the rugged terrain of the Northwest Territories — part of a national campaign to raise \$1 million for programs that support Canadian Armed Forces members, veterans and their families.

"This expedition is more than just an adventure," Vick said. "It's part of my own journey of healing and reconnection — not only with nature and others, but with myself."

The journey comes after a challenging chapter in Vick's 17-year military career. In late 2023, shortly before a family posting to Winnipeg, a fellow member under her command died by suicide — a loss that deeply affected her.

"I was advised to begin trauma therapy immediately," she said. "I was devastated to leave Ontario just as I was about to start. It took months to get into care in Winnipeg, and with two young kids at home, I felt like we were starting over — without our support system."

The move to Stonewall, however, proved to be a turning point. Despite the stress of relocation and limited time to house-hunt, the family quickly embraced the warmth of small-town life.

"Stonewall has been a blessing," Vick said. "Our daughter joined the U9 Stonewall Blues, and the hockey community became a lifeline. People like Brett and Kellie Maxwell, Kim and Lance Marohn — they may not even realize how much their kindness helped me feel less alone."

Vick credits her close friend and fellow MP member Nicole Laidlaw, who participated in a previous expedition, for encouraging her to apply.

"She described it as 'life-changing,' and she was right," Vick said. "This trip is helping me reconnect with the person I used to be — before everything fell apart two years ago. It's become an outlet for healing, strength and rediscovery."

For Vick, mental wellness has become a deeply personal mission. She speaks openly about the toll of service

and the ripple effects on her family.

"I started reacting with anger to things that didn't deserve it. I was exhausted, irritable and sad — and my kids were starting to notice," she said. "That's when I knew I had to get help. They deserve a happy, present mom — and I deserve that too."

Her upcoming adventure isn't her first experience with healing on the water. In 2022, she completed a smaller canoe trip through Warrior Adventures Canada.

"It reminded me how strong I am — mentally and physically. Somewhere along the way, I lost that part of myself," she said. "This expedition has reignited that spark. I finally feel like I have a purpose again."

Vick and her teammates — a mix of military members, veterans, civilians and guides — recently gathered for a five-day training camp in Ontario. The experience underscored the common ground among women, military or not.

"We were all juggling work, motherhood and life. It made me feel less alone," she said. "In my detachment, there are only two women — including me. This trip will be a chance to connect with others and learn from them."

She admits paddling in a straight line might be the biggest physical challenge, but emotionally she's prepared.

"I'm ready. I need this," she said.
"My hope is that we build strong bonds as a group and support each other through the tough moments."

Vick also hopes the trip will be a springboard to greater awareness around mental health in the Canadian Armed Forces.

"We need to drop the stigma," she said. "Reaching out isn't weakness — it's strength. I want others to



know that it's OK to ask for help, that they're not alone and that healing is possible."

She also sees the expedition as a chance to highlight the unique challenges faced by women in uniform—and to represent those whose stories often go untold.

"I've had a pretty rough career. I took on a lot of stuff I probably shouldn't have, and I didn't always speak up — mostly out of fear that I wouldn't be seen as part of the team," she said. "It's not easy being a woman in the CAF. You're constantly trying to prove yourself, keep up with your male counterparts and still juggle everything at home — being a full-time mom, wife, all of it. It's a lot. And I think it's important we start talking about that more."

As part of her commitment to give back, Vick is fundraising for True Patriot Love, which is covering all expedition costs for participants.

"I've already surpassed my initial goal of \$1,000 in just two weeks," she said. "The support is incredible, and I want to do more. I haven't even start-

ed asking around locally yet — I'm hopeful this article helps spread the word."

Vick says her husband — though skeptical about calling a 240-kilometre paddle "fun" — has been fully supportive. Her daughters, too, are proud of her. She's even considering sharing her story with local schools or veteran groups after the expedition.

"I want to be a voice for those suffering in silence," she said. "And I want to build bridges between military and civilian women. That's how we start making change."

For now, Vick is focused on her training and making space for her own recovery.

"Sometimes I feel like a loaf of bread, with everyone taking the best pieces and only the heel left for me," she said with a laugh. "I need to start putting myself first."

### Johnson to bring physicality to newly rebranded Monarchs

With the U18 AAA Interlake Lightning season now in the rear-view mirror, graduating players are beginning to weigh their next steps in hockey.

Last week, one of the Lightning's top defencemen announced where he's headed next, officially signing a letter of intent with the Winnipeg Monarchs of the Manitoba Junior Hockey League.

That player is six-foot, 201-pound Riverton product Tytan Johnson.

"They're getting a tough, physical player," said Johnson on Friday morning. "Add a little bit of offence here and there and, yeah, just a grinder — someone who's going to work hard every shift. I'm just going to work on a little bit of everything to bring out the best in me and hope it

all goes well."

The 18-year-old blueliner recorded seven goals and 12 assists, along with 79 penalty minutes, in 45 regular-season games with the Interlake Lightning in 2024–25.

Originally drafted in the seventh round of the 2023 MJHL Draft by the Waywayseecappo Wolverines, Johnson went on to play 96 regular and postseason games during his U18 AAA career.

Now, he'll look to help the Monarchs usher in a new era under a fresh identity.

Formerly known as the Winnipeg Freeze, the team rebranded to the Monarchs this offseason and revamped its coaching staff, including the addition of new head coach Zach Franko.

Under the Freeze banner, the club never made the playoffs and consistently finished near the bottom of the standings. But with a new look and additions like Johnson, the organization is hoping for a turnaround.

"There's not too many guys coming back from last year, I believe," said Johnson. "I know a couple of them, though. I talked to the coach a bit and he said he's coming back to win games — he doesn't really care what happened in the past. He wants to win, and he's going to bring out the best in players to do just that."

The Monarchs open the 2025–26 MJHL regular season on Sept. 19 against the Selkirk Steelers at 7:30 p.m. at the Selkirk Recreation Complex.

### Gimli Children's Centre asks council for speed reduction, other measures on Goldfield

### Drivers "blowing the stop sign" at Goldfield and Third

The Gimli Children's Centre is advocating for a reduced a speed limit of 30 kilometres on Goldfield Drive to ensure the safety of daycare kids and children at the nearby middle school.

The daycare's executive director Heather Reichert wrote to RM of Gimli council after witnessing vehicles booting it past the daycare — which operates year-round — and at times blowing the stop sign at the corner of Third Avenue.

"We have observed on many occasions cars not stopping at the [four]-way stop on the corner of Third and Goldfield travelling east toward the lake. Cars will come very fast down Goldfield, often off First Avenue, and are at high speeds before the stop sign at [Third] and Goldfield," wrote Reichert in her letter to council. "This makes pick-up and dropoff very dangerous for the children/families. Children have run into the road at times, and we want to make sure that vehicles are slowing down to give time to stop for an emergency."

The licensed daycare was established in 1974 to offers care for infants, pre-school, nursery and school-aged children. It has received complaints from parents about the danger they and their kids can experience during pick-up and drop-off times, and that they've witnessed cars speeding by even though kids run out on to the road.

The daycare is proposing that the maximum 30-kilometre speed on Goldfield be in effect from Monday to Friday, year-round, between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m.

Speaking with the *Express* after her letter was considered at council's June 11 meeting, Reichert said in addition to the daycare/parents' request to have a maximum speed reduction, she had also suggested installing an electric crosswalk as an additional

layer of safety for parents walking their kids to schools and for the George Johnson Middle School kids close by.

"I suggested that council add a crosswalk for the school, too. But we're waiting to see what [council] comes back with on reducing the speed limit," she said. "It's been like this forever. I've been here for 15 years and I see people blow that stop sign all the time. We want this for added safety for the kids here and for the safety of the kids at the middle school."

Reichert also suggested that council consider putting up signage to alert drivers to the presence of children on Goldfield Drive and encourage them to slow down, and consider adding stop signs down Goldfield to calm traffic.

As the town's main west-east thoroughfare, Centre Street, now has four-way stop signs at every intersection between the highway and the lake, drivers may be heading over to Goldfield for a mostly unimpeded and quicker west-east commute. Goldfield has only one four-way stop at the intersection of Third where the daycare building is located.

Reichert said the RM sent her recommendations to its operations/public works department.

"It will go to public works or [operations] so that they can come up with a plan," she said. "There's no timeline yet."

The *Express* reached out to the RM, mayor and councillors for comment. There was no response.

On a recent trip with Canadian family to Wales, Belfast and Dublin, I expected to struggle with dodgy, painful legs thanks to ME/CFS. So, I took precautions—using a mobility scooter or having Don push me in a wheelchair whenever it made sense. I took my own advice and paced myself. (Pat on the back.)

Even still, I developed unexplained pain in my foot during the last week. Then, at the Titanic Museum in Belfast, I missed two steps and landed hard on the floor—on the dodgy foot. A sore ankle joined the party.

What should I have done? Rested, elevated, iced.

What did I do? None of that.

On the last day before heading home, I had Dublin to myself while the family did some aggressive touring. I found myself on a street lined with clothing shops, coffee shops and buskers. Can we say heaven?

But I was hurting bad.

My job was to take it easy, then cab it to the restaurant where we'd all meet for dinner. I did get into a cab, but the driver said that to cross the river he'd have to take a really long route—and that "it isn't that far to walk." So I got out and limped my way to the bridge.

Moving so slowly I was practically going backwards, I pushed on. Almost in tears, I finally made it to the restaurant, barely able to move my legs, foot, ankle—or hip. I was a

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
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
