Union warns of threat to rural postal jobs

After a recent Industrial Inquiry Commission (IIC) report recommended lifting a 31-year moratorium on rural post office closures, a post office in the Interlake and its union want to raise awareness that changes to rural postal service could be on the horizon.

Oakview postmaster Beverly Brasted, and assistant Robert Brasted, whose post office lies 30 kilometres southwest of Ashern, are concerned future rural mail service could be negatively affected depending on whether Canada Post follows the IIC's recommendations.

"The report suggested that Canada Post could close their rural post offices, which there are quite a few of," said Robert, a Canada Post employee who runs the Oakview Post Office with his wife, Beverly, who's been postmaster for 56 years. "Canada Post hasn't said they will close rural post offices, but our union, the Canadian Postmasters and Assistants Association (CPAA) [Manitoba branch], is trying to make everyone aware of

what this report says and the possibility that a lot of people could be without delivery."


After the Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) staged a monthlong strike last November that disrupted national mail service and cost the economy about \$1 billion, Canada Post commissioned the IIC report.

The IIC was established in December 2024 by the federal labour minister to examine Canada Post's competitiveness, financial health and need to diversify or change delivery models. Commissioner William Kaplan released his report in mid-May.

Kaplan wrote that Canada Post is facing an "existential crisis" and is "effectively insolvent." His recommendations are intended to preserve Canada Post as a "vital national institution."

Among them, he said Canada Post could lift the moratorium on rural post office closures, in place since 1994, and allow the Crown corporation to potentially close or franchise

Museum denies pursuing Poplarfield church without support

The chair of the Arborg & District Multicultural Heritage Village says recent media coverage about the possible relocation of St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church from Poplarfield to the Arborg museum misrepresents the museum's role and has harmed its reputation.

In a written statement addressed to The Express Weekly News, board chair Pat Eyolfson said she was "deeply disappointed" that the museum was not contacted for comment prior to the June 19 article, which reported community concerns about efforts by members of the Ledohowski family to have three Poplarfield churches moved to the Arborg museum.

"The article implies that we are actively pursuing historic churches from Poplarfield against the community's wishes," wrote Eyolfson. "This is categorically false and misleading."

She said the museum never initiates transfers or pursues buildings but is sometimes approached by community members, descendants or organizations when a building is no longer sustainable in its current location.

"In the case of St. Nicholas Church, we were also approached — as were members of the Poplarfield community — and we made it clear from the

outset that we would not be involved unless the broader community supported it," Eyolfson said. "We are not, and never have been, in the business of 'taking' anything from anyone."


Evolfson also addressed references in the article to a previous attempt to move the Arnes Lutheran Church to the museum, saying the museum received a formal letter from the church's board of directors requesting the move. She said this context was omitted from the article and that the museum would never consider relocating a building without proper authorization and community consul-

"This situation has now grown well beyond reason," Eyolfson wrote. "No one can simply 'take' a church — especially one as historically significant as those in Poplarfield. Legal processes, property rights and board permissions are essential and non-negotiable."

The museum, which has operated for over 26 years, is a designated Manitoba Star Attraction and includes preserved pioneer buildings and artifacts from across the Interlake.

"The Arborg & District Multicultural Heritage Village exists solely to preserve the cultural heritage and stories of this region," Evolfson wrote.



Fisher council balances low taxes with rising costs

The Rural Municipality of Fisher has approved its 2025 financial plan with a municipal budget of just over \$3.2 million, prioritizing road reconstruction, equipment maintenance and long-term capital planning while keeping a balanced bottom line.

Council adopted the budget by resolution earlier this year, projecting total municipal expenditures of \$3,236,383, up from \$2.66 million in actual spending last year. The plan includes an allocation of \$314,882 to reserves, a notable increase from the \$222,261 set aside in 2024.

Reeve Shannon Pyziak said council worked to create a budget that includes reasonable increases for ratepayers while addressing the rising costs of municipal services.

"We are one of the lowest tax bases in the region. We would like to keep it that way, but we also want to support growth in our municipality — encouraging people to live here, work here and play here."

Transportation services remain the largest expense, with a total budget of \$1.37 million dedicated to roads, gravel, drainage, snow removal and hamlet infrastructure. Road construction and maintenance alone account for more than \$640,000.

Among the municipality's top priorities this year is the gravel program, with \$370,000 budgeted. Pyziak noted the RM is responsible for more than 800 miles of roads, many of which require regular repairs and maintenance to remain safe year-round.

"The continually rising costs of products, repairs, equipment and services — especially in the last five years — has been a challenge for the RM," she added, noting the municipality has managed the increased costs without incurring a deficit.

Capital spending this year totals \$277,200, covering infrastructure projects, computer upgrades and facility improvements. Highlights include \$141,000 for municipal infrastructure, \$60,000 for a new public works shop, and \$18,000 toward fire department breathing apparatus.

The RM will also draw \$175,000 from reserves to support the overall financial plan.

On the revenue side, the RM anticipates \$1.12 million in transfers and other income, including \$251,000 in basket funding and over \$180,000 in road and infrastructure grants. The tax levy will generate the remaining required municipal revenue, reduced general municipal mill rate, from 17.026 to 15.530, due to a provincial assessment increase.

The Local Urban District of Fisher Branch has adopted its own 2025 budget of \$162,300, with a projected tax levy of \$157,100. That figure is based on a taxable assessment of \$14.34 million and reflects a mill rate increase from 9.986 to 10.955.

Spending priorities include transportation services, recreational programming and beautification efforts. The LUD also plans to transfer \$5,000 to reserves and has budgeted \$2,500 for community grants and scholarships.

The Fisher Branch utility is forecasting revenues and expenditures of \$315,110, with a \$50,000 transfer to utility reserves. No new borrowing or debenture debt charges are budgeted in 2025 for either the general or utility funds.

The RM's five-year capital plan outlines nearly \$2 million in future infrastructure needs, including graders, water tankers and facility expansions. All projects are planned to be funded through reserves, grants or municipal

operating funds.

The municipality reported no deficit carryovers and continues to maintain a balanced budget approach in both its general and utility operations.

them.

"The moratoriums on rural post office closures and community mailbox conversions should be lifted. There is no persuasive case for a moratorium on closure of once-rural, now-urban post offices. Canada Post already has the Delivery Accommodation Program in place. ... It should be reviewed and, if need be, enhanced," Kaplan wrote.

Brasted said closing post offices like Oakview's would negatively affect residents and businesses. Not only would they lose local access to service, but rural communities would also lose stable jobs and local economic activity. Seniors and residents with physical challenges would be hit especially hard.

"My wife and I are the type of people who want to serve our area here. We have 54 old-fashioned boxes we sort the mail into boxes and hand it to residents. We know who everyone is," said Brasted. "People depend on us. The closest town is Ashern, 30 kilometres away. That's a long drive, especially for seniors and retirees. It would be tough."

Oakview handles a fair amount of parcel business and bill payments by mail, he added.

CPAA is Canada Post's secondlargest bargaining union, representing over 8,500 employees managing rural post offices. The union recently signed a new three-year collective agreement with Canada Post. It includes retroactive and future wage increases, a lump-sum payment, increases to allowances and the creation of a childcare fund, according to a June 19 notice on CPAA's website.

Janet Johnson, president of CPAA's Manitoba branch, said the union wants to ensure rural Canadians understand the vital role CPAA members play.

"We are the heart and soul of mail delivery in our rural communities," said Johnson. "We are the front line of Canada Post. We've been serving rural Canada since 1902 and will continue to stand strong."

Johnson said many small post offices are "struggling to survive" due to cuts to service hours and the fact that postmasters must provide a physical post office — often part of their own homes.

She's concerned rural post offices could be replaced with franchises or community mailboxes that don't meet the same service standards.

"Reducing service is essentially putting the final nail in the coffin for some communities," said Johnson. "Canada Post has said that a post office lobby box remains the cheapest and most effective delivery mode for

rural Canadians."

While there's been no word on possible changes in Manitoba, Johnson said the union has heard Canada Post may be eyeing Saturday closures and reduced hours elsewhere.

"CPAA and Canada Post have a good working relationship in Manitoba, and we strive to keep it that way," she said.

She encourages rural residents to reach out to municipal, provincial and federal representatives to voice concerns. Rural postal delivery includes more than letter mail — people rely on it for medication, machine parts, groceries and essentials.

"We understand changes are needed for Canada Post to continue serving all Canadians, and we will work with them," Johnson said. "But we will continue to be the heartbeat of rural Canada."

The Express asked Canada Post whether it plans to close rural post offices and what factors it would consider. Media relations spokesperson Lisa Liu said the corporation is still reviewing the IIC recommendations.

"The IIC report outlines the significant financial challenge we face and proposes recommendations to help secure the future of Canada Post," she said. "We continue to review the recommendations and have no further plans to share at this time."

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





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































LUNDAR GRADUATION 2025


He encouraged the grads to take a moment to notice all the people sitting before them, including family members, friends, peers and community members.

"In a way, the first 17 to 18 years of your life is a test ground for practising making decisions. Think about it — at some point, your parents finally let you decide what clothes you wear to an event. Later on, you choose if you want a summer job or just want to relax," he said.



'Our parents have been our rocks, our motivators





Evergreen School Division Supt. Scott Hill said their standing on the podium to earn their high school diploma is evidence of their learning and willingness to use the educational system to realize their potential.

"You've made it. Not just through exams and essays but through years of learning and adapting and growing. You've done that in a public school system that believes deeply in your potential ...," said Hill. "We said things like, 'Let's make sure every student gets high quality teaching every single day. Let's keep our classrooms calm, safe and focused so learning can actually happen. Let's make sure every student can read because literacy is not optional – it's foundational.' These things are not flashy. They're not complicated. But they work. Your success here today is proof of that."

Gilbart presented graduate Amaris Toews with the Governor General's medal for academic excellence. The medal recognizes a student for having achieved the highest academic average over the final two years of high school regardless of the number of courses taken. want to escape the local scene and see what the world has to of-



The grads don't need to have all the answers now, he said, but they'll need to continue to be grounded in the "amazing qualities" they already have including creativity, caring, desire to learn, consideration of other's viewpoints, advocating for others, level-headedness and willingness to "cross that bridge" towards a life they imagine for themselves.

Riverton Collegiate principal Erin Furgala thanked the Riverton community for its support in raising healthy, well-adjusted kids, and said she's so proud to see growth in each of her grads.

"Graduates, as you step into the next chapter of your story, I invite you to reflect on your purpose and your meaning. Your

Evergreen School Division Supt. Scott Hill told the grads that what they learned at Riverton Collegiate wasn't just for tests or diplomas, but preparation for life.


"Being able to read closely, think critically,

"These last four years you've spent with us have been a foundation to prepare you for what's next," she said. "Whatever that learning will be has now become fully yours to choose."


Before closing, she thanked the families, staff and supporters who helped guide the students to this milestone.

Special guest Jay Ruchotzke of Snoman Manitoba presented graduate Trinity Tindal with a \$1,000 scholarship on stage.


