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## The Interlake Outdoors Show inaugural event to take place in September

A weekend of fun activities and outdoor education is taking place in Arborg this September after the Arborg Bifrost Parks and Recreation Commission planned a community event they hope to hold annually.

"Over the past 18 months we've been trying to find new ways to bring programming in a safe way to our community and provide different types of programming that families can take part in outside and try to provide them with different ways to interact," said Bailey Sigvaldason, vice chair of the Arborg Bifrost Parks and Recreation Commission.

The event will take place on Sept. 18 and 19 and is \$7 for adults and free admission for anyone under 18 years old. It will be held at the Arborg Bifrost Parks and Rec Centre 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday, and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday.

"As a commission we're brainstorming a bunch of ideas how we can get our community back together, get them excited, get them, learning about new skills and new activities that they can do," said Sigvaldason,"We reflected about what our own families have been doing and we're doing more things outside in the outdoors."

The Interlake Outdoors Show will include activities such as moose and

goose calling competitions, intro classes to stand-up paddle boarding, firearm safety, inflatable bouncy houses, and presentations on raptors and reptiles, as well as how to cook pickerel three ways. The full list of activities can be found at interlakeoutdoorsshow.ca.

"We wanted to showcase to the community what is here, and also bring people from across Manitoba into our community to show them that you don't have to go too far to find their next adventure," she said.

Food trucks and vendors will also be at the weekend long festival, as well as activities designated for kids.

"We are going to have a dedicated kid's zone. So, there will be bouncers, face painting, as well as some activities geared towards learning about the outdoors," said Sigvaldason.

She said the committee hopes that people will come out to the event and enjoy the outdoors while also learning useful skills in time for hunting and fishing season.

"We thought it was a good time to really get people interested, get them out, and then they can take the skills that they learned at the show, and apply them right away," said Sigvaldason.

The event will follow the provincial guidelines said Sigvaldason, even if

# **Campfires permitted in all provincial parks**

Recent rains have allowed the Manitoba Wildfire Service to remove the last of the fire and travel restrictions that had been in place in Area 4. This is the large area north of the Wanipigow River, east of Lake Winnipeg to the Ontario border, including Atikaki Provincial Park, and north to Poplar River. Manitobans are reminded there are still some areas where the risk of wildfire may still exist even after the rain, therefore caution is required. These restrictions will be lifted at 8 a.m. tomorrow, Wednesday, Aug. 25.

#### **Outdoor Burning**

Provincial burning permits will once again be available through the local or regional Manitoba Conservation and Climate offices. The issue of any burning permit remains at the discretion of the issuing officer and may require a site examination, further conditions or both, prior to issue. A reminder that campfires are permitted only in approved pits.

#### **Restrictions in Provincial Parks**

All provincial park trails are open and campfires permitted in approved pits only. Restriction information for provincial parks is available at www.manitobaparks.com.

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A Provincial Fireworks Authorization is required to use any fireworks or sky lanterns within Fire and Travel Restriction Areas.

The Province's Fire and Travel Restrictions map will be updated to reflect these updated restrictions. Confirm area restrictions before heading outdoors at www.gov.mb.ca/sd/fire/ Restrictions/index.html.

Many municipalities have implemented burning restrictions. Check with local municipal offices for more information or view the interactive Current Municipal Burning Restrictions at www.manitoba.ca/wildfire/



burn\_conditions.html. The province will not issue burning permits within or areas bordering any municipality where municipal burning restrictions are already in place.

Fisher River Cree Nation Chief has been re-elected for his 10th-straight term, hoping to lead the community into another two years of economic development and growth.

David Crate was re-elected for his 13th term as Chief of Fisher River with 555 votes on August 23. Competing with Crate was Marlowe Cochrane, who secured 287 votes, and Kevin Settee who withdrew from the race.

"It's always good when you get support from the membership," said Crate. "We've got a strong mandate for the next couple of years, so I'm looking forward to working for the community."

For his upcoming term, he'll continue focusing on the needs of the community and keeping a pulse on what needs to improve, said Crate.

"There's a lot of work that's gone on here in the community," said Crate. "Everything from infrastructure developments, green energy projects, our governance structure for the community. A lot of planning has been done."

Crate has watched the community

develop over the past decade including the development of a water and sewage treatment plant, road repair, the construction of facilities and more. Developing more housing for the community has been a major project he's focused on recently and fostering relationships with all levels of govern"I think building relationships is a key to having success for our community," said Crate. "This could be provincial, federal but also municipal governments."

Fisher River is working with Arborg on a potential road project which will benefit the region, said Crate.

Other developments on the horizon

are an expanded grocery store, a retail outlet and an updated health care centre.

"We're sort of different than most First Nations that we really focused on building our program and service delivery through health."

The Fisher River pharmacy recently finished construction as a new addition to the business centre.

Darrell Thaddeus joins Crate for Thaddeus' seventh-straight term as a councillor. Carl Cochrane has been re-elected for his eighth-straight term and 10th term total as a councillor.

"When the community decides to make a change for the leadership, it's still always good to have experienced leaders as part of the council," said Crate.

Fisher River elected two new councillors to join the veteran team.

Coun. Hillary Murdock and Cory Murdock were elected to the Fisher River council, earning 267 and 282 votes respectively.

Over 850 voters contributed to the election from both on and off-reserve.

The community hopes to celebrate the elected council in mid-September.

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## **Province expands vaccination card eligibility**

People living in Manitoba who do not have a provincial health card are now finally able to get an immunization card if they are fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

Dr. Joss Reimer, medical lead of the province's vaccine implementation task force, made the announcement Monday in a virtual press conference.

"We've been working on this process for quite some time," she said, noting the past few months have been challenging for people like international students or armed forces members to prove their vaccination status without an immunization card.

Cards can be requested as long as you've received two doses of Pfizer, Moderna, or AstraZeneca or a single dose of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, with the final dose more than 14 days ago. If any of those shots were given outside of Manitoba, proof must be submitted to public health and the data must be recorded in the system. Individuals can call 1-844-MAN-VACC (1-844-626-8222) to speak with

Dr. Reimer was uncertain how many people this move will affect, but one for sure is Altona's Callum Morrison, an international student at the University of Manitoba.

The Scottish transplant has been asking the government to make this change ever since the vaccination cards first started being issued in June.

"I am grateful that the Manitoba government has made the necessary changes, however the vaccination card should have been offered to all Manitobans from the launch of the vaccine card system nearly three months ago," he said on Monday."It has often been difficult for many who did not qualify for the card to prove their status without access to this well recognized and official proof of vaccination."

#### 213 new cases over weekend

Also on Monday, public health of-ficials announced 213 new cases of COVID-19 in Manitoba since the previous Thursday.

The daily case totals ranged from a low of 31 on the Friday to a high of 102 Saturday.

The five-day COVID-19 test positivity rate was at three per cent provincially and 1.6 per cent in Winnipeg.

Manitoba's active case count was at 503, with 65 people hospitalized due to COVID-19, including 18 in intensive care.

The province has seen 56,989 recoveries and 1,189 deaths from the virus.

In the our health region, Southern Health-Santé Sud, there were nine new cases on Monday, eight in people not fully vaccinated.

The Interlake Eastern's cases continue to go down with one active case being recorded this past Monday. A number of districts still have active cases including five in Beausejour, four in Eriksdale/Ashern, 58 Fisher/ Peguis, six Northern Remote, five Pinawa/LacduBonnet, 38 Powerview/ Pine Falls, one Springfield, two St. Clements, three Stonewall/Teulon, four Unknown and one each in Whiteshell and Winnipeg Beach/St. Andrews.

Provincially, 82 per cent of Manitobans have received at least one dose of vaccine and nearly 77 per cent are fully vaccinated with two doses.

## Health Canada approves Moderna's COVID vaccine for adolescents

Health Canada announced last week it approved Moderna's COVID-19 vaccine for use in youth aged 12 to 17.

"Until now, this vaccine was only authorized for use in people 18 years of age or older," states a notice posted Aug. 27 on the Twitter account of Health Canada and PHAC (Public Health Agency of Canada). "After a thorough and independent scientific

review of the evidence, Health Canada has determined that the vaccine is safe and effective at preventing [CO-VID] in youth aged 12 to 17."

Moderna's mRNA vaccine works similarly to Pfizer-BioNTech's mRNA vaccine but both vaccines have different non-medical ingredients. In scientific studies, both vaccines have been found to be highly effective at inducing strong antibody responses

and preventing people from falling seriously ill.

Health Canada approved Pfizer-BioNTech's vaccine for youth in this age group earlier this year.

The health agency will continue to closely monitor the safety of Moderna's vaccine and "take action if any safety concerns are identified," states the notice.

## A moment of peace and reflection at Fisher River healing centre

The First Nation Healing Centre is reopening its doors for intake for its restorative program for women.

FNHC is a community resource in Fisher River Cree Nation for women and children who have experienced abuse or violence. Women from across Canada and the world have travelled to stay at the healing centre, said Pauline Stevenson, a program coordinator with FNHC.

"We've had women of all ethnic groups," said Stevenson. Women from as far as Brazil, the U.S. and Nunavut have participated.

"It's like a little hidden gem," said Katina Cochrane, executive director for FNHC.

The four-week Rekindling My Spirit Journey is accepting applications for the Sept. 6 to Oct. 1 workshop. The healing center offers Rekindling Journey seven times a year.

For over a year, the centre has only

been able to accept emergency referrals to stay at the short-term crisis centre because of COVID-19 restrictions. While women were residents, they were also able to join the Rekindling program.

"Now we're open. We accept referrals from anywhere," said Cochrane. "If a woman needs help and she wants that time to kind of, reflect on her life and take that time and space away... That's what this program's about; it allows women to think about who they are, what they've been through."

They explore family origins, intergenerational trauma, communication strategies, empowerment and more through exercises, discussion and self-reflection. The groups also delve into learning Cree, beadwork, cooking, dancing and several forms of self-expression at the centre, said Cochrane.

The Healing Centre offers childcare for mothers who are staying at the centre or need support while attending the program.

Over the 19 years that Stevenson has been involved with the program, she has seen it develop to address what visitors need most.

"Along the years, I noticed that some of the things were not so helpful," said Stevenson. "In some way, it felt like it wasn't reaching some of the women that were here."

Through life experiences, seminars and training programs, Stevenson has learned more about how to help women in need and continues to update the Rekindling Journey.

Condensing it to four weeks instead of seven, incorporating different media to express experiences and inviting several guest speakers are a few recent changes.

"It's a journey. When they're here, they're taking a step off their own path and they're coming to visit us for four weeks," said Stevenson. "They're Pallister steps down Wednesday staff

Brian Pallister announced over the weekend that he would be stepping down as Manitoba's premier effective this Wednesday.

"The greatest honour of my life has been serving as Manitoba's 22nd premier," Pallister said, noting he's proud of the direction his government took Manitoba in since coming into power in 2016.

"We introduced the first balanced budget in 11 years, while creating the largest ongoing per person investment in health care, education and family services of any province," he said. "We did this while lowering the tax burden on every working person and family, more than any other province, to keep making life affordable for Manitobans."

Pallister noted he feels the province is poised to recover well from the pandemic in the months ahead.

"I am incredibly optimistic about our future as a province and that is why I say to you: the only thing better than today in Manitoba, is tomorrow in Manitoba."

## Province tightens restrictions on unvaccinated ahead of expected fourth wave

Masks became mandatory in public spaces across the province again this past weekend as part of measures that also included COVID-19 immunization requirements for people to attend a wide range of business, facilities, and events.

Provincial officials announcing the changes last Friday defended the measures as being necessary now with the threat of a fourth wave of the virus and particularly the dangers posed by the virus variants.

"The emergence of the delta variant has changed things significantly. Now public health officials tell us the pandemic is one of the unimmunized," said Manitoba Health and Seniors Care Minister Audrey Gordon. "We are introducing these measures to help protect people across the province and to ensure the health care system is not overwhelmed by a fourth wave of COVID-19.

"Currently there are more than 406,000 Manitobans who are not yet vaccinated. Of these, nearly 230,000 are children under the age of 12, and they are not eligible to be immunized. We need to do everything we can to protect them from COVID-19 especially as they return to school," said Gordon.

The measures came as Manitoba released new COVID-19 case numbers that showed unvaccinated individuals are accounting for a significant proportion of all new cases.

Of the 31 new cases identified Friday, 26 were in individuals who were unvaccinated. In the Southern Health-Santé Sud health region, 13 of the 14 cases identified were in individuals who were unvaccinated.

"These orders are here to try to reduce the transmission of the virus as well as reduce the future need for further lockdowns," said Dr. Brent Roussin, chief provincial public health officer."We want to do whatever we can to avoid further lockdowns and ensuring that only fully vaccinated people

take part in some of these higher risk activities is one such method of doing that

"We can see that the great majority of our new cases are unvaccinated. These numbers are even higher if we look at ICU admissions. We see very few people who are immunized requiring ICU admission," he continued

"We have to protect others in the community and the health care system from delta. We can see in the jurisdictions around us the rapid climb in cases which is equating into increase in demands on the health care system."

The new public health order requiring mask use in all indoor public spaces across the province came into effect last Saturday, and the province also developed new requirements for people to be fully immunized to participate in certain events and activities.

Included on the list as of Sept. 3 are indoor and outdoor ticketed sporting

events and concerts, indoor theatre, dance, symphony events, restaurants (both indoors and patio dining), nightclubs and other licensed premises, casinos, bingo halls and VLT lounges, movie theatres, fitness centres, gyms and indoor sporting and recreational facilities and organized indoor group recreational classes and activities, and indoor recreational businesses.

Children 11 and under who are not eligible to be immunized will be able to attend events and activities with a fully immunized adult.

These new public health orders complement the mandatory vaccination mandate requiring all designated provincial public service workers who have ongoing contact with vulnerable populations, especially children, to be fully immunized.

These individuals will need to receive their first dose by Sept. 7 and their second dose by Oct. 17 to be fully immunized by Oct. 31.

Designated employees who are not

fully immunized or cannot provide proof of vaccination will need to undergo regular COVID-19 testing up to three times a week for full-time employees and provide proof of a negative test result before they can resume working.

The province is encouraging businesses to follow their lead when it comes to requiring vaccination of their staff.

"I encourage private businesses and organizations to consider mandating COVID-19 vaccine for their employees to protect their customers and staff and to reduce a chance of an outbreak at their workplace," said Rous-

"I'm urging the more than 177,000 Manitobans who have not yet been immunized to make an appointment," he continued. "We need as many Manitobans vaccinated as soon as possible in order to reduce the impact of this coming fourth wave."

## "The delta variant is changing the game"

News of Manitoba's renewed CO-VID-19 restrictions came hours before the province finally released its fourth-wave modelling, which shows the potential for the more contagious delta variant of the virus to have a significant impact on Manitoba's healthcare system.

"The delta variant is changing the game," said Dr. Jazz Atwal, deputy chief public health officer.

"In an extreme scenario, the model shows that COVID-19 can overwhelm the acute care system within two months after a fourth wave begins,"he said."Without higher levels of immunizations, and without stricter public health measures, significant levels of ICU occupancy could be expected this fall."

In the extreme scenario, projections

are for 80 ICU beds to be filled with VID-19, either by choice or because COVID-19 patients within a month of the fourth wave starting.

For comparison, during the week of Jan. 5, 2020 (before COVID-19), there were an average of 63 ICU beds occupied by patients for regular use, including flu, trauma and surgery. COVID-19 bed use will be on top of regular use.

"While additional beds can be added through cancelled surgeries and other service adjustments, this has negative effects on individuals seeking care," the report notes.

Of concern as well is how the increased needs of COVID-19 patients will overlap with the start of the influenza season, further straining the health-care system.

Currently, about a third of Manitobans are not vaccinated against CO-

they are not eligible (there has not yet been a vaccine approved for children under 12).

While vaccination doesn't provide 100 per cent protection against catching COVID-19, health officials stress that it does significantly lower the risk of severe outcomes, including hospitalization.

Of the 27 new COVID-19 cases announced last week Monday, Atwal noted 21 were unvaccinated.

"We aren't seeing people who are doubly vaxxed in hospital or in an ICU bed," he said."What we're seeing is unvaccinated individuals coming into hospital. The best bet to prevent ... overwhelming our acute-care system is to get vaccinated and to practise the fundamentals."

## Unvaccinated Manitoba Housing cleaning staff raise resident concerns

Cleaning staff in at least one Manitoba Housing building in the Interlake are unvaccinated for COVID-19 and residents say they're concerned, especially with the more highly infectious delta variant circulating.

A resident spokesperson, who didn't want to be named for fear of repercussions, said unvaccinated cleaners are working in the Poplarfield housing complex on High Plains Road.

"One of the girls comes in every day to wipe the railings. We asked if she was vaccinated for COVID and she said no," said the resident by phone.

The majority of residents who live in the complex are seniors, said the resident, and are concerned for their health.

"Cleaners don't come into suites," said the resident, "but they're in the common areas of the building."

A Manitoba Housing contractor in Fisher Branch hired the cleaner, who sometimes brings another woman into the housing complex, said the resident. They're not sure whether the cleaners also work in other Manitoba Housing complexes such as the one in Arborg or Fisher Branch.

Manitoba Housing offers a rental housing program in communities across the province.

A spokesperson for the provincial Department of Families, which oversees Manitoba Housing, said it is requiring all frontline staff to be either vaccinated by the end of October or undergo regular COVID-19 testing.

"Manitoba Housing is mandating all front line staff to be vaccinated or tested as per recent public health direction. The purpose of the public health order will be to have people who work in close contact with the public and vulnerable people to be fully immunized by Oct. 31," said the spokesperson by email. "If people choose not to be immunized and refuse to get tested, it will be addressed between the employee and employer on a case-by-case basis."

## **Chambers of Commerce extends staycations to end the summer**

The Manitoba Chambers of Commerce has extended their Tourism Rebate Incentive Program (TRIP) until Sept. 12 to give Manitobans an opportunity for last minute outings and adventures before school starts.

"You know the feedback that we've got is for a lot of them (hotels) this really saved their summer, I mean what it did is it filled hotels over pretty much a two-week time frame which is something they haven't had for, you know virtually the last 18 months," said president of the Manitoba Chambers of Commerce Chuck Davidson.

The TRIP program offers a \$100-dollar rebate on hotel stays, \$150 on some hotel stay packages, and 50 per cent off star attractions in Manitoba. The only requirements for the program are that a receipt is submitted before the program is over.

"We didn't just want this to be a Winnipeg only package. This was something that, you know, we saw people taking advantage of hotels in places like Churchill even," said Davidson.

The program was extended because the Manitoba Chambers of Commerce had funds left over that was to be allocated to the program which allowed them to extend it. Over 1,000 Manitobans took advantage of the program in the initial weeks.

"What we're also trying to do is to is to let Manitobans know that it's, you know these are safe places to go and so they've got an increased comfort level and we start to rebuild that consumer confidence as well," he said.

With the tourism industry struggling during the pandemic the program was created to help the hotels and star attractions out while giving Manitobans a safe way to take vacation this year.

"We want to give you a bit of a break, and we want to help you out and at the same time we're going to help local businesses as well," said Davidson.

Oak Hammock Marsh is on the list of star attraction eligible for the rebate.

"It's a great support system, it doesn't cost us anything. Basically, visitors can just submit their receipt when they go back home and they can just get refunded so it doesn't really affect their hotels, or the attractions, so it's a win win situation," said Jacques Bourgeois communications for Oak Hammock Marsh.

He said they have seen an increase

lately due to migration and that the incentive is good timing for people to take advantage of the interesting season.

"If you've been, like, wanting to see a place when attractions or visit a region in the province that's even a long time this is a good time to do it," he said, "lots of birds come by from the north so it is spectacular its natures greatest show in my opinion so that's a good time to come and visit."

Marine Museum of Manitoba in Selkirk is also on the list for the rebate incentive.

"We have noticed there's been quite a bit more traffic through the museum lately. So, it's been a welcome incentive. It's getting people out and checking out the star attractions," said museum manager Shay Nordal.

She said they have been letting visitors know they can apply for the incentive when they come to visit so as many people as possible can take advantage of it.

"It's a great time. I mean not only do you get to explore something that you may not have known what was in Selkirk," she said.

Hotels such as the Arborg Hotel, Ashern Motor Hotel, Fisher Branch Motor Hotel and the Lakeview Resort & Conference Centre are on the eligibility list for hotel rebates. For the full list of eligible hotels and attractions go to Tripmb.ca.

The Manitoba Chambers of Commerce is also urging Manitobans to take part in their buy local campaign called Buy Brag Tag, where they are asking people to post about their local purchases using the hashtag #buylocalmb and tagging friends to do the same.

"So the whole concept behind our buy local campaign is what we're really trying to do, rebuild that consumer confidence and what we want Manitobans to do. They've done a great job throughout this campaign of supporting local," said Davidson.

He said posting about local purchases can help businesses who have struggled through the pandemic get more customers and help support communities.

"We're really looking to encourage Manitobans to take advantage of these, we want to give Manitobans a bit of a break and we want to help some local businesses as well," he said.

## Armstrong farmers flooded by the province and municipality say they've been ignored

Armstrong farmers say they've been asking the province and the municipality for decades to do something about the flooding that has made large portions of their land useless, but have had little success.

Evita Kalski said her family's cattle farm has been flooding since the 1960s after the provincial government built a major drainage ditch called the Fish Lake Drain. Water also comes across municipally owned roads.

The family owns two quarters and rents another two quarters, she said. It was originally a hobby farm that they"put money into" and developed. But they've got water coming from practically all sides and she estimates they've lost about 70 per cent of their land.

"We have two culverts that come from north side which is the Fish Lake Drain that drains onto our land all the time. When there's water, there is no stopping it," said Kalski during a break during Armstrong council's regular meeting Aug. 10.

"On the west side of our land there's a [municipal] service road; the water comes across that road. We've asked [the RM] for gravel to be put in so the water doesn't go over it. On the south side, there's a culvert that comes across what is called the market road (Road 117) that drains onto our land. It comes under the road, and the ditch there is the same level as our land so it just moves onto our land."

The family tried to improve their land and create new business ventures in addition to cattle farming. The ventures would have contributed to the local economy, but they were destroyed by flooding, she said. They built a runway on part of the land because her brother has a pilot's license but"the RM drained water across the end of the runway." Then they built a large fish pond and purchased 1,500 rainbow trout fingerlings. "Once we had the fish in, the water came across onto the land. We tried putting chicken wire across the top of the pond so the fish wouldn't escape."

One of her cows calved on an island created in a flooded pasture. The calf was trapped there for a whole week because the water was too high, she said. What was once pasture is now swamp. Trees are dying because they're sitting in water. Some of their cattle have broken through fencing when water inundates pastureland and they go in search of grass.

Kalski said she's been trying since the 1970s to get some action and stop both government's from flooding the land. She has spoken to the province, the municipality, local politicians and organizations that advocate for farmers.

"Who else can we talk to? I've had [the provincial department of] Water Stewardship come out here, [MP] James Bezan was here, [MLA] Ralph Eichler was here, the Cattle Association was here. Everybody and their son have been here and they've all said they're flooding us out."

The family has received no compensation from the province or the municipality, she said, and the RM overlooked them when a grant for fencing was available for farmers.

Kalski said she sent the municipality a letter roughly five months ago to look at culverts causing flooding.

"They said they'd send someone out to look at them, but no one has contacted me," said Kalski. "The stress is getting to us, but we figure they should be fair to everybody."

Kalski's neighbour said he too has been flooded for the "past 40 years" by the Fish Lake Drain and that they've been fighting since for improvements to the drain.

"All in all, it's been a very long time that we've been asking for Fish Lake Drain to be upgraded so we could reclaim some of our land," said the farmer, who asked that his name not be used because of the potential for reprisals.

He estimates he has lost a couple of hundred acres.

"I own a mile and a half of land along the Fish Lake Drain," he said. "The elevation of the water is higher than the elevation of my land. They put dykes along that drain so any land adjacent to it can never drain off properly. It's just rendered the land useless pretty well."

There are several abandoned culverts sitting at a spot where an upgrade to the drain was supposed to have been done around the time of major flooding roughly 10 or so years ago, said the farmer, but the project never proceeded.

"They were supposed to upgrade the drain, drop it down deeper and widen it so it can do its job," he said. "But everything is just at a standstill. It's become more than frustrating. We own a lot of land adjacent to the drain and there's absolutely no drainage."

In addition to flooding his own land, the Fish Lake Drain has also flooded land a couple of miles away from the drain because the water has nowhere to escape, he said.

He's aware that the province was supposed to start upgrading the Fish Lake Drain at the spot where it empties into Lake Winnipeg [around

Camp Morton], but he said he has no idea what improvements were made.

"From what I understand there has been some work done close to the lake," he said. "But nothing has been done at this end where we're being flooded, other than they did a little cleaning of bullrushes every couple

of years so the water will flow a little better, even though that's not the case."

The Municipality of Armstrong did not respond to a request for comment by deadline about its role in the flooding of Kalski's land, whether it has offered any compensation and why no one has contacted her in regard to her latest request.

The Express also asked the province for comment on the flooding of farmland along the Fish Lake Drain, whether farmers were compensated, why culverts have sat in a field for over a decade, and the status of the upgrade. The province acknowledged the request, but did not provide any comments by deadline.

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## Interlake Co-op supporting fundraiser

The COVID-19 pandemic won't be stopping Arborg's Terry Fox Run from going ahead this year.

Organizers are inviting people to run, walk, ride or rollerblade on their own or in family groups to help raise funds for cancer research.

Chair of the Arborg & District Terry Fox Committee Donna Gislason, who has been involved in the annual event for over a decade, said it's easy to lose sight of important causes with the ongoing pandemic and the stress it's causing.

"It is important we pay attention to COVID, but people are still getting cancer and this fundraiser needs to go forward," said Gislason last week. "Right now, I have two close friends undergoing cancer treatment and battling the disease. It really hits home, making you realize that we still have to continue to support these types of fundraisers."

People from Arborg and the surrounding communities are generous supporters of the Arborg Terry Fox Run, said Gislason. Last year the committee raised a significant amount of money for research.

"Even though last year we didn't have the run due to COVID, we sold T-shirts and people ran on their own. We raised over \$6,000, which was very good," she said."I'm grateful to everyone who donated or bought a T-shirt or participated in some way."

British Columbia-born Terry Fox inspired the nation in 1980 with his Marathon of Hope, a cross-Canada run to raise money for cancer research after he was diagnosed with the disease and had to have part of his leg amputated when he was 18. Fox started his run in Newfoundland and Labrador in April, but by September the cancer had spread to his lungs and he was forced to stop near Thunder Bay. He ran 5,373 kilometres. He died in 1981 at the age of 22. Since 1980 more than \$850 million has been raised for cancer research, according to terryfox. org. Typically, over 650 communities across Canada help raise funds for cancer research each year by taking part in the run.

The Arborg Interlake Consumers Co-op grocery store will be lending a helping hand to the fundraising effort this year by offering people something they can sink their teeth into.

"On Sept. 17 we are going to be sitting at the Interlake Consumers Coop from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. selling Terry Fox T-shirts and also taking any donations people wish to make," said Gislason. "The Co-op has donated a grocery basket and anyone that purchases a T-shirt will get a free entry for the draw. It's very nice of Co-op. We're very pleased they're doing that."

And on Sunday, Sept. 19, people can take part in their own run or other exercise activity when the national run takes place. Gislason said all the money raised goes to the Terry Fox Foundation for cancer research.

## Anti-mask advocates stage protest march through Gimli

Anti-mask proponents took to the streets of Gimli last Friday to protest against the provincial government's reintroduction of mandatory indoor mask-wearing and the use of COVID-19 vaccination cards to access non-essential services such as gyms, clubs and restaurants.

In the wake of new provincial modelling showing COVID's delta variant poised to swamp Manitoba hospitals, further wear down healthcare workers and kill more people, the provincial government is making COVID-19 vaccinations mandatory for public sector workers such as teaching staff. Those who decline vaccination will have to take up to three COVID tests every week in order to enter their workplaces.

It's unclear who organized the Gimli protest, but bystanders told the Express there were roughly 50-60 people taking part and that they were primarily women and children. A man with a megaphone led the procession through the downtown business core.

and came outside to see what was going on.

named for fear of having their business targeted by anti-mask, anti-vaccine proponents. "There were quite a few families. We thought it was a parade at first because we love parades."

The protest further exacerbated the divide between people informed by science and who believe getting vaccinated and wearing masks help protect them and their community from the virus - which has killed over 4.4 million people worldwide - and those who think such measures are a form of government oppression.

Saveja Ellison shared photos of the protest on Facebook, saying it included a stop at the Evergreen School Division, whose administration office is on Centre Street West, near Sobeys.

"Anti Mask rally that went through town today. Their end destination was the Eve[r]green School Division," wrote Ellison." Luckily the staff at ESD left early when they heard these 'science experts' were coming."

A number of people commented on the post, either criticizing the anti-mask protesters or those who support masks and vaccines.

Heather Wozlowski wrote: "My son gladly wore a mask this past school year. And when he caught Covid, his first concern was his classmates. Imagine a 9 year old having more concern then [sic] some parents. I hope you don't ever have to watch your child's every breath praying they don't endure the same horrible Covid symptoms you do."

> "They looked like a ragtag band of hillbillies," said the man, who doesn't want their names used because of the potential for anti-masker, anti-vaxxer anger."The guy with the megaphone was shouting, 'We have to stand up for our rights, we have to fight for our rights, they can't take our rights away from us,' and that kind of crap."

> The protesters were walking down the sidewalk and weren't blocking cars, said the man, but they were "obstructing traffic" into businesses as people were trying to get their shopping done. And they were "disturbing the peace" with that megaphone.

> "We shouldn't be giving these people oxygen," said the man, referring to giving them a platform for their views, not to denying them actual oxygen in a hospital should they fall ill with COVID.

> Gimli resident Tanis Benson said people have a right to be safe when they're in public places. Masking has been proven to reduce the transmission of COVID, which is spread primarily through droplets created when people talk,



laugh, shout, cough or sneeze.

"People have a right to safety, and the mask mandate in public places will help achieve that," said Benson. "Aren't our public laws and rules for the good of all and the safety of all?"

Benson said hospitals have used masks and handwashing for decades to reduce the risk of pathogens such as viruses and bacteria entering the body and causing illnesses or death.

"Do these protesters not agree with that? Should we go back to mask-less and gloveless surgeries?" said Benson.



# Ashern is revvying up their engines for ATV rodeo

## Lots of family fun planned for Sept. 3 and 4

Engines are revving for the Ashern Rodeo on Sept. 3 and 4, replacing horses with ATVs for the first time in almost 30 years.

"Because of the late restrictions, that's why weren't not having our actual rodeo part of our rodeo weekend," said Tara Schoenberger, an Ashern Rodeo organizer.

Schoenberger is referring to the recent changes to the public health restrictions, which permit up to 1,500 people or 50 per cent of the location's capacity to gather outside for a community event. These updated restrictions were effective on Aug. 7, leaving the organizers less than a month to plan the event.

"It was just too short of time," said Schoenberger."But we still wanted to provide something for our community... We were looking to boost morale and to see some smiles on people's faces."

The two-day rodeo will mostly take place at the rodeo grounds, with an outdoor movie night, fireworks, beer gardens and rodeo events. The only exception is a pancake breakfast from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Sept. 4 prepared by the Ashern Fire Department at the Centennial Hall.

Residents who aren't able to attend the breakfast can also sign up to have their meal delivered.

"We [want to] make sure that they're also feeling a part of the community and they can also join in the celebration," said Christine Michaleski, another organizer with the rodeo.

Children under the age of 12 can compete in the ATV rodeo where they'll show their skills racing and weaving through a barrel course.

"We're keeping safety in mind by putting a cap on the amount of power on the engines of the ATVs, so it's keeping everybody safe but still allowing everybody a little bit of fun," said Michaleski.

Following the parade starting at the rodeo grounds at 11 a.m., the annual Ashern Super Farmer competition

# Saddling up for stem cell treatment in Thailand

## Local equestrians fundraise benefits. "A realistic goal for this first transplant would for Amaya Dawson stem cell treatments

A band of local equestrians has ridden nearly 1,000 miles in support of Amaya Dawson, and they've pledged to ride hundreds more.

Jaime Margetts and her riders from RW Ridgeway Ranch are in the midst of a fundraising drive that has them riding horses and collecting monetary donations for every mile they travel.

Their goal is to ride 1,500 miles from July 1 until the end of September, and so far, the 16 participants have accumulated 895.2 miles.

The riders—who range from age six to adulthood-are soliciting donations from friends, family, and community members and asking them to pay per mile. Each rider is free to determine what a mile is worth, but the basic idea is this-the more miles, the higher the donation, Margetts said.

Of course, the riders are gladly accepting lump-sum donations as well, she added.

The proceeds will go to the Dawson family, who are saving money to finance a trip to Thailand. Once there, Amaya will undergo a specialized stem cell treatment in the hopes of regaining some of her mobility.

The Mayo Clinic describes stem cells as "the body's master cells."They are versatile cells that doctors can use to treat diseased or damaged tissue.

Health Canada identifies stem cell research as promising but considers treatments to be experimental and not federally approved.

Physicians in other countries have used them to treat a variety of ailments, including spinal cord injuries.

"The stem cell transplant in Thailand costs about \$30,000 Canadian. If she was to get the epidural stimulation surgery, that's \$100,000," said Amaya's mother, Alycia Dawson.

A stem cell transplant could help return some sensation to Amaya's lower body, while the epidural surgery could improve her movement. Even a marginal increase in muscle control could bring Amaya monumental long-term

be for her to regain some of her abdomen so then she can sit better and have more control of her body."

Access to her abdominal muscles would help Amaya balance and reach for things on her own, Dawson said.

"It would change her life drastically."

The Dawson's are still awaiting confirmation from Thai doctors about which procedure has the highest likelihood of success.

In the meantime, they are pooling their resources to prepare for the expense.

Amaya was paralyzed in a head-on collision last February. Since then, numerous businesses and community initiatives have fundraised in support of her recovery.

"I honestly don't know the words to properly say it. The way people are so forthcoming about wanting to help my daughter is so heartwarming,"Dawson said.

The Ridgeway fundraiser will culminate on Sept. 25, when the more experienced riders embark on a 13-mile trek from RW Ridgeway to Quarry View Esso.

"That's a long ride. It will take us about three hours to get there," Margetts said.

When they arrive, the riders will enjoy a BBQ with an assortment of drinks and snacks.

Esso owner Clayton Wadge has already reserved a spot for them to corral their horses on the north side of his property, Margetts said.

Before they depart, the riders intend to decorate their horses to look like unicorns.

The unicorn has become a symbol of hope for young Amaya, who wholeheartedly believes in the mythical creatures, said Dawson.

"Since the beginning, unicorn magic is what has held Amaya together and kept her strong. Every time she gets sad, or she has a moment, she thinks of unicorns, and she overcomes her feelings by thinking about how unicorns are helping her."

In 2019, Margetts and her riders hosted a similar fundraiser in support of CancerCare Manitoba. The four riders who participated were able to raise \$4,000.

This year, 16 riders are participating in the fundraiser. Margetts does not have an estimate of how much they will raise.

## **Sustainable Frittata**

Her love of cake decorating during her life led to her being responsible for decorating hundreds of wedding, birthday or any special occasion cake all over Manitoba.

During her life Drew was instrumental in starting Hodgson Royal Canadian Legion Auxiliary in 1958, she was the first President. After moving to Stonewall she was President there also. She held a life membership to both the Auxiliary and Legion. Drew joined the Order of the Eastern Star, Aurora Chapter in 1953 and was a lifetime member.
